## GEORGIA WOMAN AIDS FARMERS TO INCREASE PROFITS

### Methods Once Looked on Dubiously Become the Chief Factors in Prosperity.

(Associated Press Special.) ATLANTA, July 13.—An Atlanta society woman towards whom Georgia farmers looked with skepticism a few years ago but later turned for help in making money, now is an assistant to the director of the State Bureau of Markets.

Mrs. Norman Sharpe, former president of the Atlanta Federation of Women's clubs and an appointee of Eugene Talmadge, State Commissioner of Agriculture, thus has a mission of importance ever given a woman in the department.

A few years ago Mrs. Sharpe, chairman of the market committee of the Atlanta women's club, asked the city for space surrounding the city auditorium for a curb market in order to remedy a shortage in fresh fruits and vegetables at moderate prices.

Debutantes and club women drove to the country before dawn each day to meet farmers bringing produce to the curb and directed them to the curb market. As a result the second month's operation showed produce sales of \$76,000.

The idea for a municipal market developed. Mrs. Sharpe and her associates persuaded the city council to appropriate \$50,000 for a site and public spirited men financed the building, now owned by the city.

"I hope to serve the farmers," says Mrs. Sharpe, "by giving them scientific information about the cultivation of higher priced food crops, especially those which now are being imported by the state."

She will distribute most of her information as a contributing editor to a weekly market publication.

## PRUNE MARKET PLAN TO BE PUT IN EFFECT SOON

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 13.—The committee of nine fruit growers and packers whose report of amendments to the grower-packer marketing plan was accepted here by the growers' convention Saturday is proceeding with utmost speed in the preparation of actual contracts in order that the campaign for signers, which will direct through the convention of 100, may be completed in time to handle the 1927 crop.

All elements concerned in stabilizing the prune market were unanimous in pronouncing the modified plans just and workable if sincerely entered into by the industry. All parts of the program adopted at the first convention now in printed form, remain in full effect except where specifically amended.

The perfected plans provides that independent and cooperative growers will be federated into one growers' body made up of units as large as practicable. Probably on a county basis. The cooperatives will retain their identity and do all packing for their members. Present private packers will pack the independent tonnage.

All sales will be under supervision of the central marketing board of nine made up of four grower and four packer representatives and one disinterested party. Cooperatives will retain their present organizations and will be allotted practically their present tonnage, which, however, will be handled from a common pool standardized as to size and quality under the direction of the marketing board.

At the end of a specified period an audit will be made by this board of all sales by both private and cooperative packers at which time it will reallocate half the quota of any packer who has not disposed of 80 per cent of his specified portion. Sales competition is further stimulated through a provision that if any packer, private or cooperative, sells out before that date he can call for a reallocation at once. All packing and selling charges are to be paid for at a flat rate per pound. Thus if the cooperatives perform this service for a less amount their members will receive a return from plant operation aside from sales returns. Price determination will be handled through a growers' committee as previously provided. Initial contracts will run for two seasons instead of one as the growers asked and five as the packers wanted. A 30 per cent sign-up is required to put the plan into effect.

## MORE BOYS NEEDED TO MAKE UP CAMP FOR LONE SCOUTS

A. Britton, scout executive, who is in charge of the arrangements.

It is also possible that some of the younger boys, 9 to 12 years of age, may come over from Myrtle Point and Marshfield. The boys of the Episcopal Pioneers have also been invited to attend, along with the Lone Scouts, so that from this number it is thought that there should be enough youngsters to make up the camp, which will be at Wolf Creek, following the Boy Scout camp which is now in progress.
