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PUGDOM PUNCHES DEMPSEY AGAIN MAULING TIGER OF HIS BEST PERIOD

SARATOGA LAKE, N. Y., July 14.—Flash of old time tigerism, reminiscent of the days of Toledo and Boyles' Thirty Acres, indicate that Jack Dempsey is well advanced on the road that may lead to the most sensational comeback in ring history.

With a long week remaining before Dempsey meets Sharkey in the Yankee Stadium, every increasing inclination to drop boxing lessons for the sheer joy of crushing a sparring partner appears daily in the former champion's workouts. The black scowl so characteristic of the heyday deepens daily as Jack feels the growing tenseness of perfect fighting trim.

The drawn face of the Dempsey of 1926, when legal difficulties beset him, has given way to the fighting visage and the rest of Jack's physical makeup seems to have followed suit.

Despite the constant effort of Jack's handlers to hold him to the grind that comprises learning a defense for Sharkey's cutting left hand, Dempsey showed yesterday that he was unable to keep in leash the terrific punch that he knows is again in his massive fighting arm.

After following faithfully the defensive advice of his manager and ring tutor, Leo P. Flynn, Jack suddenly loosed the full force of his lashing attack against the giant Indian chief, Metoquah, and the full power of three zooming lefts to the body quickly smashed the brave to the canvas. It was the second time in two workouts that Jack had flattened the big Oklahoman.

SHARKEY SURE HE WILL PUT DEMPSEY OUT OF HIS PATH

NEW YORK, July 14.—Jack Sharkey is just about down to fighting weight for his 15-round contest with Jack Dempsey.

Under a broiling sun, Sharkey yesterday worked out four rounds in a short sparring session, some rope jumping and shadow boxing. Because of the fear of getting too fine the former sailor abandoned his usual road grind in Central Park.

"When I whip Dempsey I am going to insist that the championship fight be held in New York," said Sharkey.

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UZZUDUN KNOCKS OUT HARRY WILLS IN FOURTH ROUND

MANDELL TO GIVE MCGRAW ANOTHER FIGHT TOMORROW

DETROIT, Mich., July 14.—For the first time since he won the lightweight boxing championship more than a year ago, Sammy Mandell of Rockford, Ill., will risk his title when he meets Phil McGraw of Detroit in a 10-round bout tomorrow at the University of Detroit stadium.

This will be the second time the two aggressive fighters have met. The Detroit challenger will have a chance to show whether his ring ability has improved more than Mandell's since the pair fought to a draw two years ago.

Mandell, who won the championship from Rock Kansas in a Chicago rainstorm on July 3, 1926, by a decision in 10 rounds, has fought a number of matches since then, but always under weight agreements which kept the title out of issue.
