ALLEGED DRUG ADDICT ESCAPES EUGENE JAIL

EUGENE, Ore., July 16.—Part of a steel window frame was ripped from bolts set in a weakened brick last night, several bricks were taken from their place in the wall, and Albert Pierce, alleged drug ad dict, escaped from the Lane county jail.

Two other men whose identity was not revealed, tried to get out the small opening, but could not make it, according to the officers.

VERNONIA CITY ATTORNEY INDICTED BY U. S. JURY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16.—Les ter Scheele, 34, city attorney of Vernonia, Oregon, was arrested yesterday on two secret federal in dictments charging conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act by sale and possession of intoxicat ing liquor.

Mr. Scheele, when served with two bench warrants, immediately furnished necessary bond and an nounced he would appear in fed eral court in Portland later and en ter a plea of not guilty.

Federal prohibition agents in Vernonia on the night of June 13 arrested on liquor charges Roy Rickman and his sister, Mabel Rickman, and Bobbette La Rue and Violet Chambers, M. Willoughby, George Snipe and Edith O'Connell. All were released on bond, pending trial.

Mr. Scheele, who has been city attorney of Vernonia since Septem ber, 1925, is married and has three children.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16.—In creasing annual favor of Portland consumers for honey ball, or honey dew, melons, is being felt at the local produce market.

Although the supply of them is plentiful, these melons top the mar ket at \$1.50 for flats, wholesale, and \$1.25 to \$1.75 for pony crates.

From The Dalles have come egg plant selling at 25 cents per pound and lemon cucumbers for 20 cents a pound, \$1.25 per box.

Cucumbers have dropped down to 80 cents per box, following a week of higher prices. Best sold from 50c to a dollar.

Yellow transparent apples sold in half boxes find a weakly sup plied market and sell at the high price of \$1.75 per half box and \$2.75 to \$3 per standard box.

Butter and eggs are generally steady in price with the market firm. The only change for today on the dairy exchange is a decline

SWIMMING SIMPLIFIED

Scissor Kick of Legs Is Merely One Leg Moving Up, Other Down

All crawl stroke swimming leg drives are the combination of the scissor kick, which can best be described as a front and back opening and closing of the legs. One leg moves up as the other moves down, each going all the time without stop or pause. A good way to practice the leg thrash is to lie face downward in the shallow water, hands on bottom, or if you are in a swim ming pool hold onto the side of the pool, with the legs straight out.

Practice thrashing them up and down. Have the knees straight, but let the legs relax somewhat. The feet should be separated about six or eight inches. Start slowly at first, until you master a steady and even thrash. Practice until you can quicken the kick, until you are able to churn the water considerable. Your only real care or worry is to see that the legs are set in motion before the arms and to see that they follow closely back and forth roll of the body.
