DROWNING DEATHS
INCREASE 25 PER
CENT THIS YEAR

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 18.—Deaths from accidental drowning increased 25 per cent among the 18,000,000 industrial policy holders of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company between January 1 and June 18 of this year, when compared with deaths from this cause for the same period of 1926. These deaths totaled 345. This year's rate is also higher than that for the same period of 1925.

Dr. Louis I. Dublin, statistician of the insurance company, points out that although the general tendency of the mortality rate for accidental drowning has been downward during recent years, the rise in 1927 makes it timely to call attention to the fact that with the advent of the warm season drownings are sure to show a still further increase, with young men and boys the principal victims. "This form of accidental death has a distinct seasonal incidence, July, August and September being the peak months, as the inevitable result of increased indulgence in water sports during the summer."

"Even with the relatively lower death rate of recent years," says Dr. Dublin, "drowning still takes

a serious death toll. We estimate that 7300 deaths were due to this cause in Continental United States in the year 1925 and these deaths were very largely preventable.

"What is needed is a wider application of the principles and practices of water safety which are advocated by the life saving division of the American Red Cross. These are observed very strictly in thousands of summer camps for boys and girls, which are now so popular in America; and the result is that with tens of thousands of campers spending a goodly share of their time in water, deaths from drowning are almost unknown. The reason is that not only is the swimming itself carefully supervised and the risk cut to a minimum but up-to-date rescue work and resuscitation methods are in many instances actually made a part of the camp curriculum."

MARKETS
PORTLAND, Ore., July 18.—Plentiful supplies in most lines marked the opening of trade on local markets today. Wholesale dressed country meats started out quietly but firm at prices ranging quoted Saturday morning. Supplies of prime hogs and veal are barely sufficient for demand, but in the poultry division, light hens threaten a strong over supply. Lights are quoted down to 14 cents for choice birds.

Berries are very firm at last week's prices ranging with strawberries in limited supply at 10 cents a box and around 22.20 per crate to retail trade.

Choice freestone peaches are offered at 30 cents per dozen. Early Italian prunes of excellent quality entered the market at a price of 15 cents a dozen, retail. Prospects are for strong supply of this fruit.

Bunched vegetables continue on a firm basis at three bunches for 10c. Butter and eggs are steady at Saturday's closing prices.
