The Cootie patrol placed first in awards with 150; Doodlebugs second with 135; Cowbells 137 for third; Coos Bay Pirates 4th with 121 and Webfeet 95.

On Wednesday evening an outdoor rally was held and was won by the Cowbell patrol who had 26 points.

LAKE ONTARIO
SWIM ATTRACTS
WORLD'S STARS\$50,000 in Prizes Will Be
Awarded to Winners of
21-Mile Marathon.

100 ENTRIES FILED

Canada, Europe, Egypt to
Be Represented; Fair
Sex to Vie for
Coin Lures.

TORONTO, Ont., July 22.—The wide waters of western Lake Ontario are looking up to host of the world's best long-distance swimmers. Preparations are well under way for the \$50,000 marathon swim over a 21-mile course to be held here in connection with the Canadian National Exposition on August 31.

From a half dozen centuries of the Old World and from practically every state of the United States and every province of Canada have come more than 100 applications for entry. The event bids fair to take its place with the English channel and Catalina island swims. Veterans of those waters are entered in large numbers, with others who will be seeking fame and fortune for the first time.

World Stars Enter
Among those who have registered are George Young of Toronto, winner of the \$25,000 Catalina island event early this year; Ernest Vierkotter of Hamburg, one of the conquerors of the English Channel; Jehan Helmy, Egyptian contender for channel honors; and Jane Slon of Brussels another unsuccessful channel swimmer but holder of many women's records in European swimming.

Miss Slon will have plenty of companions of her own sex. Attracted by prizes of \$5,000, \$2,500 and \$500, for the first, second and third places for women contestants, a dozen have entered their names. Neither are Miss Slon, Vierkotter nor Helmy alone in representing foreign lands. Italy and Sweden also have entries.

Both the start and finish of the event will be at the Canadian National Exposition grounds on the lake shore just west of this city. The 21-mile course will be roughly triangular, with the farthest point practically out of sight of land.

Of a total purse of \$50,000 the winner of the event will receive \$30,000, while second place will net the runner-up \$7,500, and third place \$2,500. The fourth prize will be \$1,000, and fifth and sixth \$500. Women's prizes will be in addition.

ONE FAVORITE IS
SURVIVOR FOR THE
SEATTLE FINALS

SEATTLE, Wash., July 22.—With all but one of the favorites, including Frank Doly, of Portland, 1926 champion, eliminated, the semi-final matches of the western amateur golf tournament today found Eddie Held, of St. Louis, paired against Dr. O. F. Willing, of Portland, and Don Stein, of Seattle, playing Fay Coleman, of Los Angeles. Stein, who was runner up to Doly last year, playing on his home course, has been conceded a chance to win the title this season.

Of the men considered strong enough to reach the finals, who were disposed of in the early matches, were Chick Evans of Chicago, Chandler Egan, of Medford, Ore., Keefe Carter, of Oklahoma City, Chuck Hunter, Tacoma, Wash., Radie Wilhelm, of Portland, Forest Watson, of Spokane, and Doly. Evans and Egan have held the title several times while Carter won the crown in 1925.

In the quarter matches yesterday, Doly fell victim to Coleman one up, who the day before had eliminated him. Held was forced to the forty first hole before conquering Roy Moe, of Portland; Dr. O. F. Willing, of Portland, dropped Egan, one up, and Stein took a comparatively easy match from Harold Nel-meyer, his townsman, 3 and 2. Nel-meyer the day before beat Evans at the eighteenth hole.

In one of the big upsets Dr. Willing vanquished Egan when the Medford man missed a five foot putt at the 36th hole for a win, which would have evened up their match. It took Willing three to get it.

Dempsey-Sharkey Fight by Rounds

Round One—Dempsey came out in a crouch and fell into a clinch hammering five short rights to the body as Sharkey missed a left hook Dempsey bored in again, drilling hard smashes to the ribs. Jack hooked two lefts to Dempsey's head. They were close again and Sharkey got in two more to the head. Sharkey stabbed Dempsey with a left to the head. Round Two—Dempsey's seconds worked on him while Sharkey lay back calm and confident. Jack came out slowly and Sharkey missed a left. Sharkey drove Dempsey to the ropes with a right to the jaw. Dempsey fought fiercely at Sharkey's body, but laid on heavily in the clinches. Dempsey missed a wild left hook. In close they swapped jolts to the ribs. Dempsey held as Sharkey clubbed to the body. Sharkey mauled Dempsey with a left to the head and drove Dempsey to the ropes with a short right to the jaw. The Boston boy was landing at will, solid smashes to the chin that rocked the former champion. They slug-ged fiercely in the center of the ring as Dempsey mauled Sharkey with two hooks to the chin. Dempsey was very tired after the flurry but managed to hook his left hand twice on Sharkey's chin. They were in a clinch at the bell.

Round Three—A small cut appeared under Dempsey's left eye from Sharkey's jab. Dempsey drove a long left to the stomach and then took a left and right uppercut as he awayed to close quarters. Dempsey missed a left to the head but landed two right jolts on Sharkey's chin. Jack Dempsey crowded Sharkey with a body attack. They were locked in a clinch. They stood for a moment and looked each other over, tired from the fierce pace. Dempsey whipped over a right uppercut as he drove in. Sharkey caught Dempsey with a wicked right smash to the chin the former champion came in to what at the Boston boy's body. Sharkey bored two lefts to Dempsey's body and Dempsey stepped back. Sharkey slipped and went down in his own corner but was up without a count. No blow was struck and the bell ended the session while Sharkey was on his knee.

Round Four—Sharkey was a bit less confident as he came out and missed a wild right. Jack bobbed out of the way of Sharkey's jab. Dempsey drove Sharkey around the ring with fierce punches to the body. Sharkey breathed hard.

GREEN PRUNE
PRICE OPENED
AT WALLA WALLA

PORTLAND, July 22.—Advises received here state that the fresh prune crop in the Walla Walla, Yakima and Idaho sections will mature in about three weeks and that already dealers are making advance sales around 60¢ per bushel for pack f. o. b. and for packed lugs are obtaining 70¢ to 75¢.

The crop, it is expected, will be not more than two-thirds of last year, but of exceptionally fine quality, which, it is pointed out, should mean a good demand and excellent returns for growers.

Moderate sales, it is reported, have been made at points all the way from Canada to New York City and the outlook is for a very successful year.

There has been no attempt as yet to make purchases of green fruit in the Clark county, Washington, section, according to word received from W. H. Woods, manager of the association handling the prune crop.

Shipping of green fruit is a gamble, Mr. Woods stated, which neither the association nor the growers care to indulge in. Growers are used to curing the crop and handling it in that way, which is vastly more satisfactory to all concerned and eliminates

the element of danger of damage while in transit.

FIRE AT WILBUR

Prompt action yesterday afternoon averted what might otherwise have been a very serious fire at Wilbur. The fire was discovered on the roof of one of the S. P. buildings used as a residence for railroad workers. J. E. Carr, a local business man, who happened to be passing through Wilbur at the time, went to the aid of the residents, and after reaching the roof by means of a ladder extinguished the fire with water passed up by a hastily formed bucket brigade. The fire had gained only slight headway before it was found, and was easily extinguished, but as there was a stiff breeze blowing and as there were other buildings in close proximity and no fire fighting apparatus available, the blaze in a few more minutes would have threatened considerable property.

Larry French, son of G. P. French, a pitcher on the Portland baseball team, was injured in the game he pitched against Hollywood last Wednesday, and is now on the hospital list. In the Hollywood game Wednesday he was fielding a high bouncer, when he rammed the thumb of his pitching hand deeply into the turf and sprained it.
