NEED OF RANGE RESEARCH TOLD

Continuing research is essential to fully meet the needs of the range livestock industry, said W. R. Chapline, inspector of Grazing in charge of Range Research in the Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, in an address delivered before the Western Extension Conference meeting at Reno, Nevada, July 11-14.

The agricultural extension organization, he said, can be of material aid in the development of range research by suggesting problems needing study and by stimulating the interest of stockmen and other interested parties in research.

The importance of effective range research was emphasized by Mr. Chapline, when it was considered that 25 million sheep, goats and swine and 15 million cattle, horses and mules of the eleven western states obtain but 23 per cent of their feed from harvested crops and from grazing on stubble fields. Nearly 70 per cent of their feed comes from range land. The value of the livestock is approximately 800 million dollars, and of ranches and equipment as much more.

"As early as 1890," said Mr. Chapline, "range grazing lands were stocked to their capacity while some were already overstocked. The continued overstocking over enormous areas reduced the carrying capacity both by cutting down the quantity of forage produced and by increasing erosion of the productive surface soil. Today the carrying capacity necessitated decreased numbers of livestock with resultant excessive per head investments in lands and improvements, and uneconomical production. Furthermore, the erosion has carried millions of tons of silt from the ranges into irrigation and other reservoirs; the floods have ruined many farms by a blanket of sand and gravel, and have destroyed roads and other works. The financial loss to the farmer has been as great as that of the livestock producer. The present loss has doubtless been the lowered productivity of the soil on the ranges and the difficulty of reestablishing a satisfactory protective covering."

"The depletion of our range resources has reached such a stage that definite and earnest effort must be made to solve the problems of forage production on the ranges and to develop satisfactory utilization practices for this type of land."

The beneficial results of range research are illustrated in the administration of the National Forests, according to Mr. Chapline, plans have furnished one of the studies of the pastability of range main bases for determining grazing capacity on National Forest ranges. The open herding and herding out system of handling sheep, developed by Forest Service range research, has resulted in increased grazing capacity of the range, cleaner and better wool production, and heavier lambs.

The deferred action system of grazing is another example of extensive application on National Forests of a better method of management developed by research, which has resulted in increased carrying capacity, a chance for improvement of depleted range, and better growth of animals without any loss through non-use of feed.

TULE LAKE VETS ASK LOANS; LAND SURVEY COMING

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

SALEM, Ore., July 26.—An expert will be employed by the ex-service men's state aid commission to make a survey of about 12,000 acres in the Tule Lake bed of the Klamath reclamation project, and make recommendations to the commission relative to whether loans should be made on the land. The tract is settled entirely by ex-service men eligible for state loans. It was said that possibly an expert connected with the federal land bank can be employed to do the work.

This action was voted by the commission after a plea in behalf of the veterans who are applicants for state loans had been made by a delegation from Klamath county headed by A. M. Thomas, secretary of the Klamath Irrigation district and secretary of the Klamath Wool Growers association.

The delegation appeared, said Thomas, to relieve the commission of an erroneous impression concerning the land as to its value for security. The commission was of the opinion that the \$90 per acre government construction charge constitutes a first lien on the land and that the state's security would be in the nature of a second mortgage. Thomas represented that the government charge is a lien really in name only, since the settlers have 40 years in which to pay it, and it is paid off at the rate of one fortieth a year which is included in the tax payments. He

said they were asking for loans from the state on the same basis as the federal land bank loans on the land.

It was stated that 145 new farms have recently been opened up on the project. A 50,000-acre community pasture available to the land owners made a favorable impression on several members of the commission. James Stewart, investigator for the commission, recommended adversely on the question of loans.

NEWTON, Mass., July 26.—Although Jack Sharkey has suffered from internal bleeding since his battle with Jack Dempsey in New York, Dr. Martin H. Spellman said today he has felt so well that he has declined to follow the physician's suggestion of a period of hospital observation.

Under the simple prescription of rest the condition has much improved since it was first noticed last Saturday, although a slight trace was still noted today. While Dr. Spellman still believes a few days in a hospital would be the wiser course, Jack is planning to leave for a camp in New Hampshire before the end of the week.
