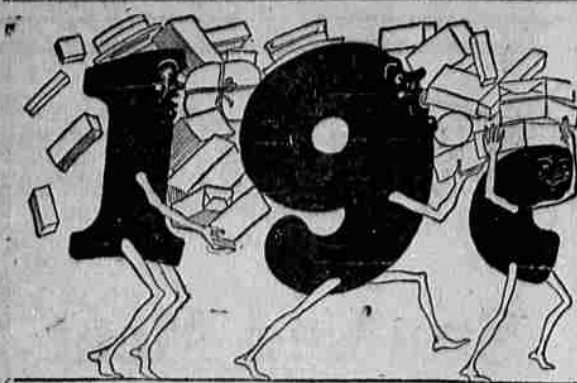

Political Skies Of Roumania Clear For Child Ruler When Leaders Of Rival Factions Publicly Embrace

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

BUCHAREST, Roumania, July 26.—Roumanian political unity around the child king Michael was virtually achieved when the former opposition leader, General Averescu, publicly embraced Premier Bratiano and recognized the authority of the regency last night.

Averescu, who has been a bitter opponent of Bratiano and hostile to King Ferdinand, made his political reconciliation all the more emphatic by stating it in the presence of the full senate. The 300 members, knowing full well the differences that existed between the two statesmen, were amazed when they saw them embrace. Averescu, who had heard General Averescu proclaim his and his party's allegiance to the king and Premier Bratiano, and their support of the regency.

Bratiano, who has been strongly opposed to the return to Roumania of former Crown Prince Carol, succeeded Averescu as premier in June.

Averescu's party is only negligibly represented in parliament, but

it is said to control an important section of public opinion and from this point of view Averescu's reconciliation with Bratiano is considered as adding greatly to the strength of the government and the regency, which it is supporting.

Carol Feels Bitter

PARIS, July 26.—Further assurance that former Crown Prince Carol would undertake no action likely to create difficulties for the government of Roumania, "as lawfully constituted by the wish of his tenderly respected father," was given to the Petit Parisien by Professor Niculesco, of Bucharest university, one of a group of Roumanians who called on Carol at his Neully villa yesterday afternoon.

"His highness," said the professor, "is very bitter at not having been allowed to return to his country to subvert the king's remains. He is also surprised at the comments of certain newspapers, which tend to represent him as leading a life of dissipation, whereas he rarely, if ever, goes out, and spends the greater part of his time in reading."

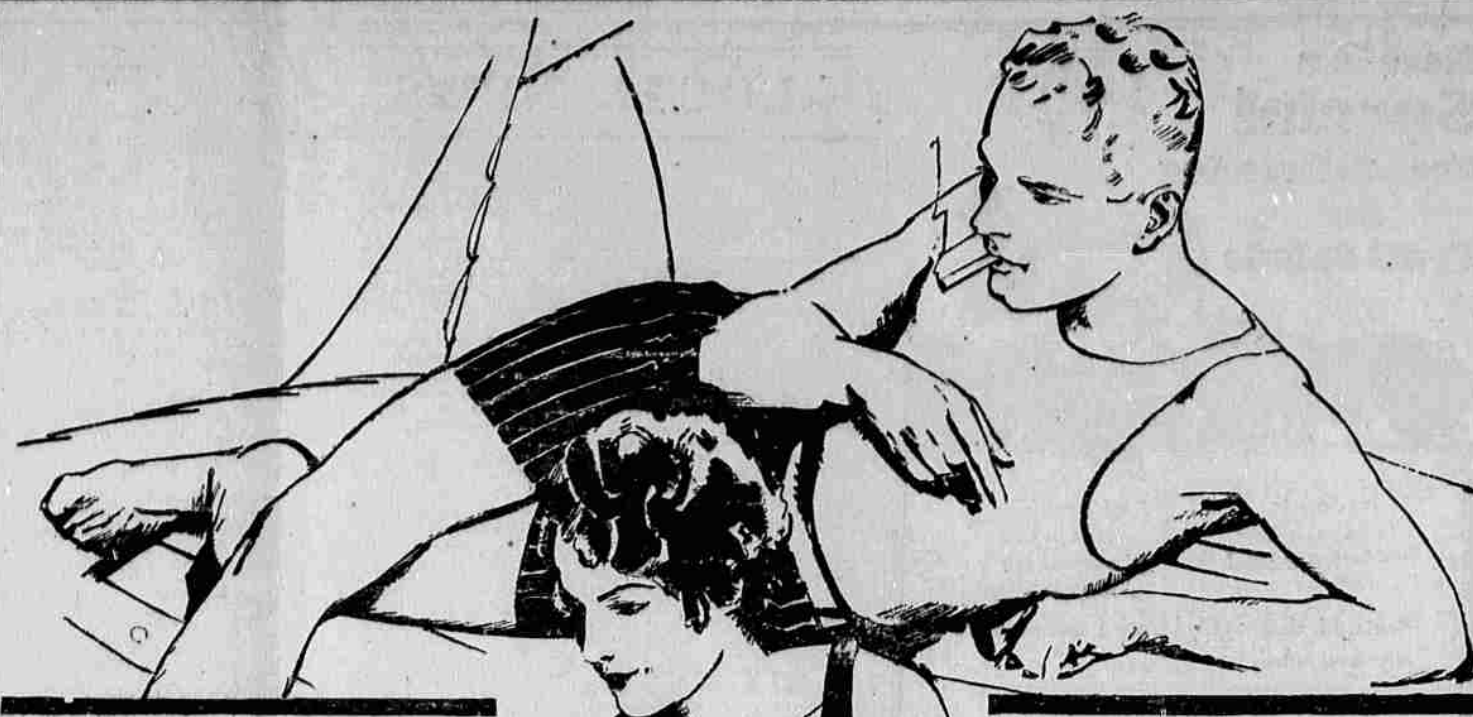

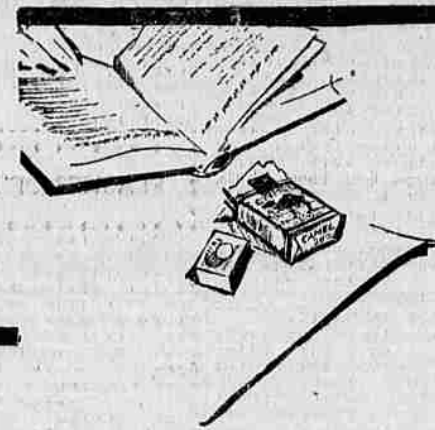

PRUNES MERGER IN CALIFORNIA HANGS ON INDEPENDENTS

SAN JOSE, Calif., July 26.—Success of the newly organized Prune Producers' association in its attempt to secure, jointly with the California Prune and Apricot Growers' association, control of 90 per cent of the state acreage, depends on voluntary action by the independent growers in signing a marketing contract at once.

The agreement calls for 50 per cent of the independent acreage being under contract by midnight July 27. Solicitors will not have sufficient time to call on owners of the 32,000 acres required before the deadline, necessitating voluntary action. It was said.

The California Fruit Exchange, the California Farm Bureau Federation, and the San Jose Clearing House association endorsed the cooperative merger in communications to the prune producers.
