Sidney Cotton and his companion "Cy" Caldwell landed on their return from Newfoundland.

Both men who flew back and forth across the Newfoundland wilderness said they were convinced that Nungesser and Coli had never arrived in that country. "Instead of having been heard by one or two scattered persons, they would have been heard by hundreds," Caldwell said.

The search, financed by Daniel Guggenheim, covered approximately 15,000 miles.
