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NEWCOMERS BUY BIG STOCK RANCH NEAR RESTON

Will H. English and his son, Paul, recent arrivals from Crescent City, Calif., who have been seeking a location for some time arrived in Roseburg Tuesday and immediately got in touch with the McLendon Realty company and purchased a tract of land owned by the company consisting of 160 acres located near Reston.

The place has about 20 acres of tillable land and is well watered making an ideal place for stock and turkey raising. GERMAN LEAGUE TAKES UP CAUSE OF NICARAGUANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) BERLIN, July 28.—The German league for human rights has issued a protest against American activities in Nicaragua, the protest being forwarded to Senators Borah, Proctor and Wheeler, to President Coolidge and to the commission for intellectual cooperation, now in session at Geneva.

"The American troops have no business on the soil of other independent states, and it is not the business of American cabinet members to abuse other nations," the protest says.

The protest condemns the bombing of Ocotit, (presumably this refers to the bombing of the forces of General Sandino which attacked Ocotit and an American marine outpost there July 16) and demands that American public opinion be roused on the removal of the responsible commander, as was done in the case of the late British general Dyer on the occasion of the "massacres of Amritsar," India.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 28.—Major Floyd's column of marines and constabulary are slowly following General Sandino's retreating forces. Information from airplanes indicates. The planes bombed some of Sandino's rear guard, scoring direct hits and killing or wounding a score. The main body of Sandino's troops was not seen by the planes, having evidently been deployed.

Sandino has made two unsuccessful attempts to ambush Major Floyd's column.

BRAMWELL ANSWERS SUIT OF PILOT ROCK BANK

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PENDLETON, July 28.—Thru local attorneys, Frank Bramwell, state superintendent of banking, has filed an answer and cross complaint to the suit brought by ex-officers of the First National Bank of Pilot Rock, seeking recovery of certain promissory notes. Bramwell alleges that if the notes are cancelled the assets of the insolvent institution will not be sufficient to pay depositors the amount of their respective deposits. He seeks a judgment of \$10,000 with six per cent interest from August, 1925, and a further judgment of \$4,558 from last year.

WIFE FAINTS WHEN JUDGE SENTENCES HUSBAND

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—Sentence of nine months in jail was passed upon C. J. Daklos, by Federal Judge John H. McNary today and as Daklos' wife heard it pronounced she fell to the floor of the court room in a faint. Her four children screamed.

Deputy marshals carried the wife from the court room. The session continued as though nothing had ever happened.

Daklos, one of ten defendants in a still case originating three months ago on the George Abernethy farm near Seaside, pleaded guilty to participation in the conspiracy, and, like four other defendants, sentenced two weeks ago, was given a jail term.

MERCHANTS BILKED WITH OLD PORTLAND WARRANTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—With a book of city of Portland police pension fund warrants from the office of George R. Funk, city auditor, some one posing as a retired Portland policeman is traveling throughout the smaller cities of the state and collecting cash from unsuspecting store owners with worthless warrants. This information was given out by officers here today.

Five of the warrants have reached the office of William Adams, city treasurer. They were all cashed by store owners. The first was for \$50. The remainder were \$40 each.

The warrants—an obsolete issue, discontinued in 1919—were in a book serially numbered from 280 to 1,000.

PACIFIC COAST STATIONS ASK BETTER WAVE LENGTHS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, July 28.—Representatives of five Pacific coast radio broadcasting stations today sought more favorable power or wave length assignments from the federal commission. Their arguments were taken under consideration and decisions will be announced later.

Stations KEX, at Portland, Oregon, and KJR and KGA, at Spokane, asked permission to use 20,000 watts for power instead of their present 5000 watt maximum. KYA, at San Francisco asked an increase from 500 to 1,500 watts, while KXL, at Portland, wanted to use the 770 kilocycle instead of the 1560 kilocycles the commission has allotted.
