NEXT SCOUT CAMP TO START AT ELK RIVER SUNDAY

The Lone Scout Camp just finished at Wolf Creek makes the third for this season. Since the formation of a first class scout council here an endeavor has been made to put the camps on a basis whereby they would meet all camp expenses. This year the camps have done this and more.

The Three Sisters camp cost \$57.78 and \$65.00 was paid in by the Scouts; the Wolf Creek camp for Scouts cost \$376.75 while \$406.00 was taken in; the last, which was for one week only, cost \$129.10 while \$125.70 was paid in. The last camp showed a deficit of \$4.40 but on taking all three into consideration they show a balance of \$40.94 on hand.

The members of the council feel that if the people of the community are good enough to support the general Scout program for the benefit of its boys that the boys and their parents should meet all expenses of camp which is being done. No effort is being made to profit from camps, however.

The fourth and last camp begins at Elk River, Curry county, next Sunday. It is primarily for the Coos county Scouts but some from this county are going to attend. Several good hikes are planned to be taken just as soon as the boys have completed their scout work required in camp.

Among those who will attend from this county are Gordon Gendoy, Gordon Applewhite, Charles Hamilton and Clyde Taylor. E. A. Britton and E. E. Applewhite will take the boys to Elk River Sunday.

The camp for the younger boys of Roseburg ended yesterday morning on the arrival of the Campfire Girls at Wolf Creek camp yesterday morning. There were twenty-four in attendance. The program given them was that of the Lone Scout manual.

These boys were taught the simpler things pertaining to the human body. Deep breathing, walking, properly chewing the food, how much to eat or rather, when to stop eating, the necessity of plenty of sleep and other things important to the proper growth and development of the body. Swimming and diving were given plenty of time on the program and were taught under safe conditions.

At the evening campfire each and every boy did his part by making a talk, singing a song or songs or giving recitations. All in all the boys had a fine time.

Each day brings a new caravan of automobile tourists along the winding road which leads past the state game lodge. Few of the travelers, whose cars bear the license plates of many states, are satisfied until they have seen the president or Mrs. Coolidge.

Most of these have learned that on almost every morning, Mr. Coolidge is at his desk in the school building and the street in front is always lined with cars of tourists who usually greet the president with hand clapping as he enters and leaves the building.

In the afternoon if he is not fishing or horseback riding, the president is frequently on the front porch of the state game lodge, usually wearing one of his broad brimmed hats. He is easily visible there to the passing motorists who park their cars in fields nearby and hasten back to get as close as possible for a picture.

SALEM CHURCHES TRYING TO SAVE CONDEMNED PAIR

SALEM, Ore., July 29.—The effort to save Ellsworth Kelley and James Willos from the gallows has extended to the churches of Salem. The pastors of several of the larger churches have been asked to take the subject up next Sunday, and some, it is understood, have promised to do so. Others say they prefer to let the law take its course.

A more determined effort is being made to save the lives of the two men, it is believed, than ever was made before in Oregon in behalf of a condemned man. The fact that the de Autremont brothers, the Stikson turned slayers, were given life imprisonment, and also the Leeb-Leopold case are being cited.

Kelley and Willos were in the prison break of August 12, 1925, that resulted in the killing of two guards.

FOREST FIRE IN KLAMATH DISTRICT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—The local district office of the United States forest service reported that more than sixty men were fighting a fire that started in government timber on the Elk Creek, Klamath Falls district, six days ago and that it was expected the conflagration would be extinguished within the next two days. More than 100 acres were burned, the report stated.

BETTER CONTROL SOUGHT FOR DAIRY COW ABORTION

Inquiries on infectious abortion and nutrition of cattle coming in unusual numbers into the dairy department of the experiment station from Oregon dairymen indicate that the investigation program established at the indication of the state dairymen's association was well founded, says E. M. Brandt, professor of dairy husbandry. The ravages of the disease, for which methods of control have been fairly well worked out by the station, are depicted in letters from one of which the following excerpts are taken:

In the herd of a coast county farmer 17 out of 24 cows due to freshen in the spring aborted. Calves five to nine months along and none saved. Great difficulty in getting any of these animals pregnant since. Probably a number of them will never become pregnant again while the others suffer loss in milk production.

This man, says Prof. Brandt's reply, probably got serious contamination and infection into his herd through purchase of animals or carelessness of neighbors who permitted infected animals to get into contact with some members of the herd. Such carelessness in the herd is a factor in the spread of infectious abortion as it results in infected animals wandering along the highway or getting into a neighboring pasture. Such an occurrence will almost ruin the breeding program of any herd.

It is hoped that when further information is available plans now being worked out by the station will make it possible for the state livestock sanitary officials to improve control and prevent such violent outbreaks of the disease.

FARM REMINDERS

Home planting of fruits of different varieties appeals to many Oregon home growers. Some of the advantages pointed out by the experiment station, horticultural department are the economic value of the crops and the pleasure of picking one's own fruit. The former saves expense of buying fruits thus supplied and the latter adds to the enjoyment of the home. "Fresh fruit direct from the garden in a fully ripe condition has decided advantages over other fruits bought in the market," says the department report.

Lime helps crop production under certain Oregon conditions not alone by sweetening acid soils but by conditioning root membranes for absorbing essential plant food nutrients, says Dr. W. L. Powers of the experiment station soils department. It helps neutralize acids and toxins not alone in the soils but likewise in the plant tissues. Some available lime is needed in the soil solution at every stage of the plant's growth. Limestone has caused marked increase in nitrate formation in trial plots at the station.

Farmers are getting wonderful results from use of ground lime in clover and alfalfa growing in western Oregon. This boosts lime or-

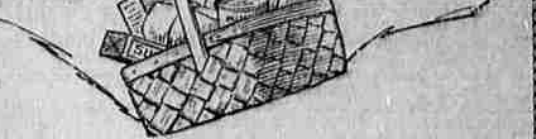

ders which are coming into the state lime plant at the rate of 100 tons a day. The plant is being enlarged, storing facilities increased and plans made to run a double shift to meet the demand, reports Sam Moore, chairman of the lime board.

Soil scientists from nearly every European country and state in the Union visited the Oregon experiment station and state college recently to inspect instructional methods and facilities for teaching soil lore and to take samples of soils from the station fields while examining state crops and methods of scientific farming. Some 200 were in the party and they expressed keen satisfaction with conditions at the college and with the scientific handling of soils and methods of farming in the parts of the state through which they passed. They took liberal soil samples home with them where they will run them through various tests in the home laboratories and thereby learn much of Oregon conditions.

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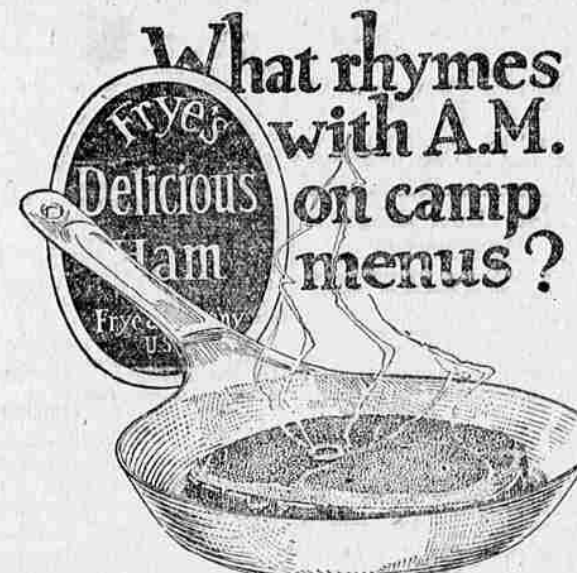
