TITULAR BATTLE NOT LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 22ND

Additional Time Requested
by Dempsey Is Refused
by Rickard—Plans
Unchangeable.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—Jack Dempsey's opposition to entering the ring before September 25 today continued to be the chief item of interest in his imminent engagement with Gene Tunney for the world's heavyweight title.

In a statement at Los Angeles last night, the challenging champion made known that he "wanted to be right" when he renews his acquaintance with Tunney, and said he did not see why Rickard would not delay the bout until after September 25, to give him an opportunity of getting into the proper mental condition.

Notwithstanding, Dempsey's close friends indicated that they thought Jack would ultimately agree to Rickard's plans, after learning from his wife's physician that her condition was not so serious as he supposed. The doctor said Mrs. Dempsey would be able to accompany her husband east in time for the proposed fight date, September 15 or 22.

With the stadium rented, the promoters license issued, and all other necessities arranged for, Chicago fight fans and officials were of the opinion that the date of Rickard's choice eventually will prevail.

Rickard and George Getz, the promoter, said they were anxious to hold the match on the original date but might delay it until the 22nd if Dempsey proved obdurate. Dempsey's plea for the later date was vetoed entirely, because the stadium is unavailable after September 25.

LEVINE BICKERS WITH DROUHIN TO BREAK CONTRACT

PARIS, Aug. 3.—Relations between Charles A. Levine, owner of the trans-Atlantic plane Columbia, and the French aviator, Maurice Drouhin, are said by L'Auto, leading French sporting daily, to be so strained that their flying together across the Atlantic to New York is no longer possible.

The Martin openly alleges that Mr. Levine wants to get rid of Drouhin so as to be free to engage the British pilot, Captain Hinchcliffe, by backing over the terms of the contract until Drouhin is disgusted and withdraws of his own accord.

As the Columbia is ready for the flight when weather conditions are favorable, Mr. Levine and Pilot Drouhin tried to come to an agreement yesterday afternoon, but after two hours of heated discussion signing of the final contract was again deferred.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 3.—The Examiner says it is widely reported in financial circles here and in New York that George J. Whelan, tobacco magnate, and William C. Durant, noted automobile maker and financier, are negotiating for the purchase outright of Universal Pictures corporation.

The approximate purchase price is reported to be \$10,000,000. Carl Laemmle, founder and president of the film corporation, will remain as president of the board of directors of the new organization, according to the report.

The Universal Pictures corporation owns and operates 400 motion picture theatres throughout the United States and is building other picture palaces at a total cost of \$25,000,000.

Cincinnati took both ends of a double header from the Brooklyn Dodgers, 3-1 and 5-1.

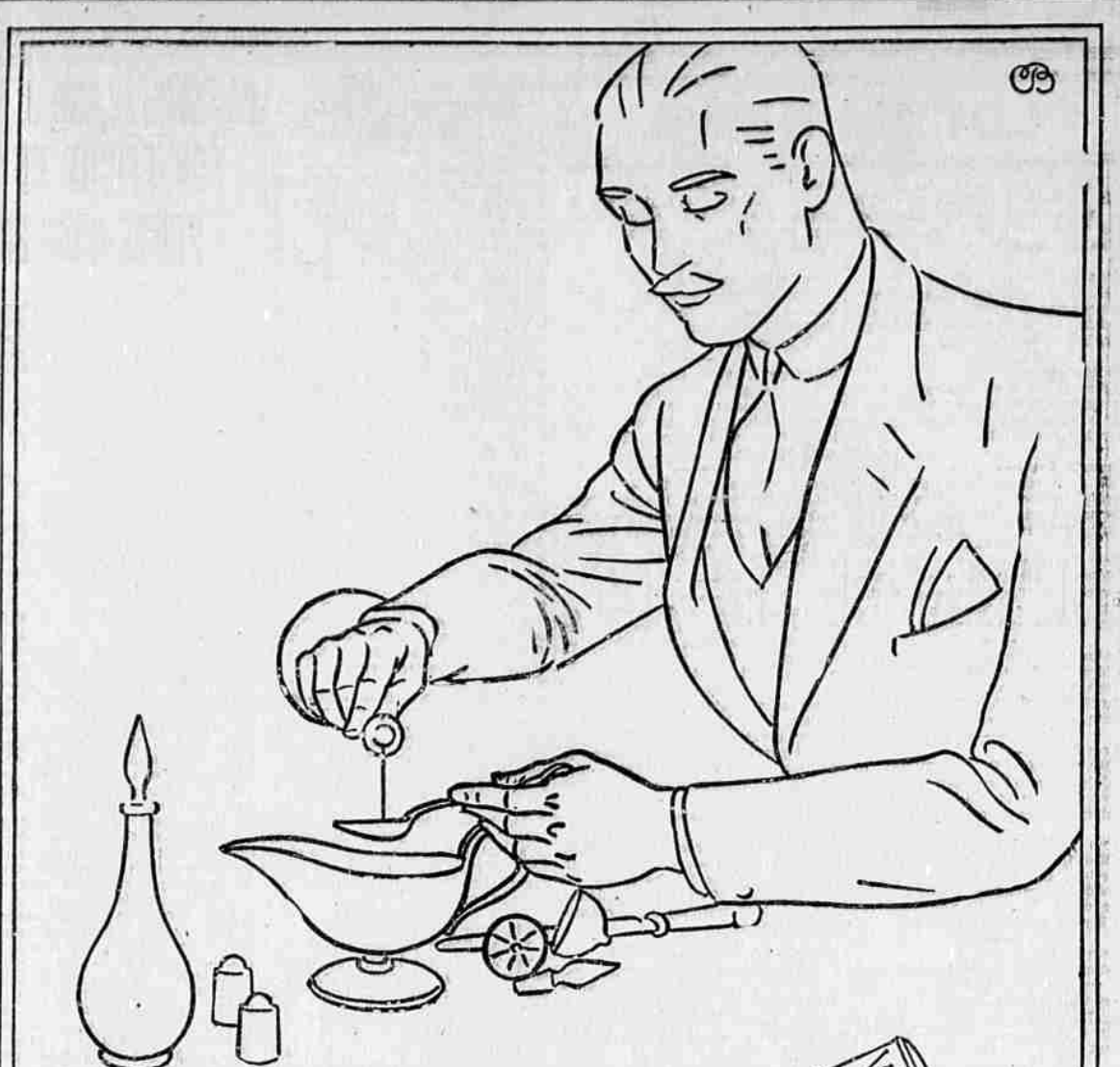
Walter Johnson's 20th anniversary in major league baseball was celebrated at Washington, where the Detroit Tigers won out in a ninth inning rally, 7-6.

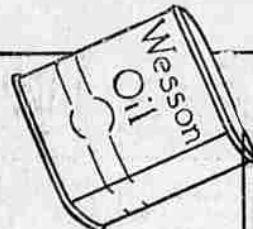
