He's "The Man They Cannot Hang"

Russell Scott, Saved From Gallows for Fifth Time, Has Lost Fear of Death

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—Russell Scott doesn't worry very much any more about whether or not they are going to hang him.

For three years he has had the spectre of death for a cellmate in the Cook county jail here—a grim, silent companion throughout all of his waking hours, a watcher by his cot through the long hours of night. And he has grown used to it. It has exhausted its power to frighten him.

Five times the hangman has prepared the scaffold for him. Five times the state of Illinois has paid the required \$100 for the necessary amount of hemp to jerk him into eternity. But each time something has intervened at the last moment.

So they call him "the man they cannot hang." They speak of "Lucky Scott," and smile ruefully. He is death row's oldest guest. He has often heard the dull booming of the trap as other inmates of the death cells have paid the penalty; and it no longer worries him. He has grown intimate with the thing most men fear above all other things—the scaffold; and he has found it is not so fearsome as he had thought.

Russell Scott is under sentence of death for the murder of Joseph Maurer, a drug clerk who was shot to death during a holdup engineered by Russell and his brother, Robert Scott, who is now serving a life term in prison.

Russell was originally sentenced to hang on April 17, 1925. But at the last minute "something came up" and the execution was deferred. Once, on the very evening preceding the execution date, a telegram (which later proved a hoax) purporting to be a full confession to the crime by Robert, who was then a fugitive, caused the courts to intervene.

At another time his lawyers, at the last minute, won an insanity hearing. Scott was adjudged insane and sent to an asylum. Then

D. G. CLARK IS INJURED WHEN STRUCK BY CAR

D. G. Clark, owner of the Riverside store on the Pacific highway north of Roseburg, was knocked unconscious and considerably bruised and shocked when hit by the machine driven by Ben Roberts, Oakland-Pontiac dealer of this city, shortly before noon today.

The man had gone across the highway from the store to get his mail and returning was struck by the car, the machine hitting him on the hip and throwing his body clear of the car in such a manner that he was not run over. Mr. Roberts applied his brakes as soon as he saw the man, the machine skidding several feet. It is believed that Mr. Clark failed either to hear or see the approaching car.

Clark was taken to the hospital and is now recovering from his injuries.

LUTHER BAKER TO HANG; BROTHERS TO GET LIFE TERMS

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 5.—Luther Baker was convicted by a jury last night of murder in the first degree in connection with the slaying of Sheriff Lester M. Wood, and will be sentenced to hang.

Ellis and Lewis Baker, his brothers, tried jointly with Luther were convicted of first degree murder, but will be sentenced to life imprisonment. The jury deliberated three hours.

Sheriff Wood was shot from ambush in a raid on a saloon alleged to have been operated by the Baker brothers.
