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E. H. TEMME AND MRS. CORSON SWIM ENGLISH CHANNEL

DOVER, Aug. 5.—E. H. Temme, English swimmer, succeeded today in the first attempt of the season to swim the English channel.

Taking off from Cape Gris Nez at 12:42 o'clock this morning, Temme landed two miles west of Dover.

Mrs. Clemington (Mille Gade) Corson, of New York, who last night became the second woman to swim the channel, and who now is training for another crossing, witnessed the last stage of Temme's swim.

Mrs. Corson is preparing to attempt to swim from England to France, the reverse direction of her first swim.

Temme's time, as computed by representatives of Loyds, was 14 hours, 27 minutes. This is four minutes faster than Gertrude Edler's time last year, but has been beaten by three men, Ernst Vierkotter, Georges Michel and Norman Leslie, Durham, in earlier channel swims.

Temme is captain of the Cornhill Swimming Club and has thrice won the Essex long distance championship. He is 22 years old, stands 6 feet 3 inches, and weighs about 205 pounds.

He used the tugboat stroke for his successful channel swim and was escorted by a Boulogne tug.

East vs. West in 1928, Prediction of Chas. Bryan

SIoux CITY, Iowa, Aug. 5.—Withdrawal of President Coolidge from the 1928 presidential race will not materially affect the campaign plans of the democratic party, Charles W. Bryan, former governor of Nebraska, and one time candidate for the vice presidency on the democratic ticket, believes.

"The campaign in 1928 will be against the republican party as a whole for its failure to provide adequate relief for the agricultural west, rather than against any individual," Mr. Bryan said.

Mr. Bryan expressed the opinion that the campaign would be along economic lines. "It will be the east against the west," he said. "Any candidate, in order to be elected, must be from the middle west. The farmers are not so particular what party he comes from."
