LUMBER BUSINESS NOTES
WEEK OF EXPANSION

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Reports received from the National Lumberman's association from 348 soft wood and 132 hard wood mills indicate a slight expansion of business last week, as compared with the preceding week. A nominal decrease in new soft wood business is offset by the fact that fewer mills reported last week, while 16 fewer hardwood mills reported a gain of about 20 per cent in new business. Soft wood unfilled orders for the week total \$227,519,232 against \$227,013,991 for the corresponding week of 1927, while hardwood orders totalled \$17,581,000 against \$16,609,257 for the same week last year.

WATER DISPUTE
IN CALIFORNIA
CLOSES 5 BANKS

Institutions Post Notices
Putting Blame on City
of Los Angeles.

4-YEAR FEUD CLIMAX

Ranchers of Owens Valley,
Unable to Close Deals
for Ditch Rights,
Default Loans.

BISHOP, Calif., Aug. 5.—The feud of city and ranchers over Owens Valley water rights, the cause of frequent dynamite explosions in the Los Angeles water system, today was blamed for the complete breakdown of the valley banking system—its five banks having closed their doors yesterday.

"This result was brought about by the last four years of destructive work carried on by the city of Los Angeles," was the bitter note posted on the door of each institution to notify depositors of the bank failures. The banks, according to the last available statements had total deposits of approximately \$2,500,000.

The banks, the First National Bank of Bishop, the Inyo County Bank of Bishop, a state institution, with three branches at Big Pine, Independence and Lone Pine, today were in the hands of bank examiners.

The banks closed voluntarily, according to W. W. Vatterson, president of the state bank and cashier of the national institution. Neither he nor his brother, M. Q. Vatterson, who is president of the national bank and cashier of the state bank, would comment last night on the possibility of reorganization or reopening of the institutions.

Accusation and Denial
"When the state bank examiner arrived here Wednesday, I told him frankly without the formality of any examination of our books by him that we were in such a condition that we would have to close our doors," said M. W. Vatterson. He claimed that the direct cause of the banks' failure was that ranchers who had "failed to negotiate satisfactory sales to the city of Los Angeles, as well as business houses whose business has decreased under the water warfare, had been unable to liquidate bank loans."

From Los Angeles came a quick denial that that city was responsible for the Owens valley banking situation.

"The city of Los Angeles has sent a great deal of money into the valley and it all has cleared these banks," said John R. Richards, a member of the Los Angeles Water and Power company, which has fought the battle to gain for the city the valley water rights. "The cause of the failures appear to us to be internal. Certainly the city can in no way be charged with responsibility."

GROWERS VIEW
EXHIBITION OF
PRUNE DUSTING

Orchard of M. B. Green at
Winston Scene of First
Demonstration.

SULPHUR IS WEAPON

Expert From Agricultural
College Directs Kind
of War to Be Waged
on Brown Rot.

The prune dusting demonstrations being held in the county this week are to be of great benefit to the growers it is expected. The first demonstration was at the M. B. Green orchard at Winston yesterday morning and was attended by about twenty-five growers, the attendance being considered exceptionally good, considering the fact that the meeting was held at 6 a. m.

The meetings are being held for the purpose of showing the methods for control of brown rot by means of dusting with sulphur. Brown rot each year causes great losses in the prune crop. The disease is one which spreads very rapidly under favorable conditions and because of the weather this year it is feared that brown rot will cause a great deal of loss unless special care is taken to prevent its spread in the orchards.

During recent years experiments have been made in controlling the disease by means of sulphur dust and special equipment has been manufactured to perform the operation. Three different types of machines are being exhibited the manufacturers providing a mechanic to show the operation of the machines and to explain the methods of obtaining the best results.

Clayton L. Long, horticultural expert from the Oregon Agricultural College, is in charge of the demonstrations and is assisted by County Agent J. C. Leedy. Today the growers of the Myrtle Creek district met at the Remick Estate orchard at 6 o'clock and tomorrow morning the last of the demonstrations will be held at the John Bacon place.

The demonstrations are being held early because of the fact that there is greater efficiency in the making the applications when there is little wind and when the trees are slightly moist.
