Paper man is never abused.
"America in 100 years behind the times in the study of crime. We have been making wonderful progress in every other line but have made no advancement in the suppression of crime. We today have more feeble minded that are creating progeny than ever before in the history of the nation."

The speaker drew an interesting comparison between the methods used in crime detection in America and in foreign countries. He showed that in these foreign countries schools are maintained to train men in criminology the same as in other professions so that scientists in the study of crime were available to handle complicated cases. He presented statistics to show the great difference in the amount of crime in these countries.

He drew an interesting parallel in the case of the "dark stranger," who was recently captured in Canada. The man was credited with a long string of murders in the United States and was never captured, but as soon as he was sent across the line into Canada he was picked up within a short time. This, the speaker claimed, was due to the fact that in Canada there is a harmony between the law enforcement agencies so that all departments can bend their efforts to one purpose. In the United States, however, each officer or organization works alone so that his efforts are of little avail.

The efforts of the officers are frequently frustrated by actions of men not qualified to gather evidence. Mr. May declared. Frequently courts throw a case out of court because of some violation of the technicality of law in gathering evidence. For this reason, if for no other, he said, there should be some system provided for the training of officers. He advocated training of officers. He advocated video in every state college or university so that men could be trained to make scientific study of crime.

Pictures Shown
He then turned to an illustrated lecture showing what was meant by scientific study. Circumstantial evidence, which he called "Physical evidence," is much more apt to be right than direct evidence, he stated. He drew his comparison by speaking of the hunter who killed a companion. The hunter thought he was shooting at a deer. The direct evidence was that it was a deer at which he was shooting, but the physical evidence in the form of the body of his companion proved that the direct evidence was wrong. Mr. May illustrated the application of this rule in other cases showing how microscopic examination by scientific instruments resulted in identification of criminals. He presented slides showing how scientific study was used to detect forgeries; how examination of hair could identify

Individuals: how bullets, knives, metal filings, matches, etc., had certain individual characteristics that in many cases had led to the capture of a person committing a crime.

No crime was ever committed that some clue was not left which would yield the identity of the criminal to scientific study. Mr. May declared and he proved his point by showing how a single match and a minute thread, almost invisible to the eye, resulted in the capture of a man wanted for a crime.

He concluded his lecture in the words of the late President Harding, voicing an appeal for cooperation with the vested authorities in the work of law enforcement.

Send Editor Speaks
Another very interesting address featured the afternoon program, Hon. Robert W. Sawyer of Bend speaking on "The Editor's Five Foot Shelf," an address on the books and literature which should be available for reference in the editor's library.

The afternoon session adjourned after a discussion of shop problems and there was a recess until the banquet at the Roseburg Country club at 6 o'clock.

The banquet was provided by the Roseburg business men and was prepared and served by the Umpqua Squares. Mrs. T. H. Nesa acting as general chairman in charge of arrangements. The repast was delicious and the service was exceptionally good and a great deal of praise and appreciation of this hospitality was heard from the visiting editors.

K. E. Brodie of Oregon City, presided over the banquet and called upon several of the editors for short talks.

Hon. J. W. Hamilton, circuit judge, of Roseburg was the principal speaker, and talked briefly on the influence of the press in community life. He spoke in high terms of the great value of the press in local, state and national development and commended the editors for the faithful manner in which they had been true to the trusts imposed upon them.

Following the banquet there was a band concert, given by the Douglas County Concert Band. This fine musical organization gave one of the best programs it has presented this season and the fine music received great praise. Dancing and a general social time concluded the evening's entertainment.

This morning the Country club golf course was the attraction for a great throng of the editors, who entered in the tournament for the beautiful trophy offered by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Hoss Wins Trophy
The golf cup was won by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of the State Editorial association, and private secretary to Governor Patterson. Mr. Hoss made the 9-hole circuit in 45, pressed closely by Ralph Cronin who turned in a 48. Before departing for Bandon bearing the beautiful prize given by the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Hoss expressed his thanks for the hospitality accorded the association by Roseburg people.

"Never before in the history of the organization have the editors been accorded such a warm welcome as in Roseburg," Mr. Hoss said. "We have been made to feel at home and have been delighted by the splendid entertainment. We will always carry a warm remembrance of this convention and of the friendly spirit of the Roseburg people."

LOSE HIS PERMIT

SEATTLE, Aug. 6.—Ethan A. Peyer, deputy prosecutor of King county, this morning filed a charge of reckless driving against Elbert Beltz, 19, of Pendleton, Oregon, in connection with the death of Fern Mason in Kirkland, July 17.

Peyer declared he had considered charging Beltz with manslaughter but that after going into the evidence he decided to take the former course.

Mason was killed when his automobile collided with Beltz' machine.

A coroner's jury recommended that the Pendleton lad's driver's license be revoked. Beltz is believed to be in Pendleton at the present time.

CATTLE MEN LOSE
MUCH BY DROP OF
MARKETING GUIDE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—William Stewart, president of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Breeders association, and R. H. Kipp, manager of the marketing department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, will conduct a series of conferences during the coming week in the cattle producing counties of the state in an effort to get cattlemen to maintain an orderly marketing director at the Union stock yards here.

The orderly marketing department at the stock yards was discontinued on July 1 with the result that cattle men received no knowledge of conditions there. A glut in the market followed with a marked reduction in prices.

Heretofore the orderly marketing director was maintained at the stock yards to keep stockmen apprised of prices, supply and demand and to direct shipments so no glut would develop. The expenses were met by a voluntary assessment against the sales. A number of stock men refused to contribute to the maintenance of the director with the result that the others declared they would not pay all the cost and permit those who did not contribute to share in the benefits.

Prices slumped a cent a pound with the result that cattle men have lost thousands of dollars. It is said the cost of maintaining the director will not exceed \$700 a month and probably will be much lower.
