

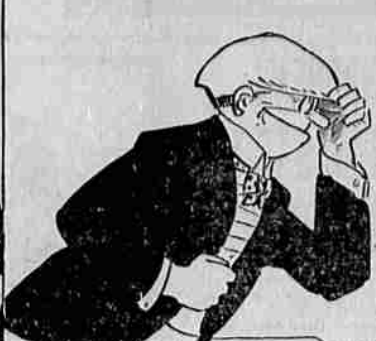

Incendiarism AGAINST TIMBER AREA (Continued from page 1.)

South Umpqua, entering the river at Perdue. The fires are partly within the Umpqua national forest and partly on O. and C. and privately owned timber, protected by the county patrol.

It is in this district that there has been so much trouble from incendiarism within the past few years. The present fires are only a short distance from the big burn of last year and were set apparently with the intention of increasing the size of the burned over area. The motive for this malleousness is not known, as stock grazing has been forbidden in that area and the territory is used only for hunting.

Last year fires were started in this same area and burned nearly all summer long. They obtained a great deal of valuable timber and endangering many lives. Thousands of dollars were spent in an effort to halt the fire and more than 150 men were engaged at a time in combating it.

This year it is not expected that the loss will be so heavy, as the fire protection forces are so well organized in that district. There will be a very vigorous effort made, however, to locate and arrest the person guilty of setting these fires. Experienced men are now at the scene seeking evidence to be used in apprehending the guilty parties and it is possible they may find something that will bring about arrests of the persons responsible.

The county has a standing reward of \$500 for information leading to the arrest of persons guilty of setting out forest fires and the Douglas county fire patrol offers \$100. It is possible that the government may post an additional sum, as some of these fires are on government timber.

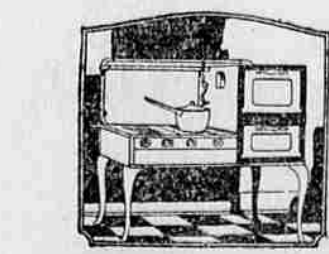
