GENERAL WOOD TO REST BESIDE OLD COMRADES

Grief in Philippines
ZAMBOANGA, P. I., Aug. 8.—The sudden death yesterday of Governor General Leonard Wood has thrown the entire Philippine population into a state of mourning. Half a million Mohammedans, American subjects, were gripped at the news, declaring "we've lost our father—our best friend. There is no hope for Islam."

The Moros are preparing to enter a period of intensive mourning say dispatches from Cotabato, Lanao, Sulu, upon hearing of the death of Wood, whom they regarded as the one man who understood them, as he won their confidence after conquering them at the bloody battle of Bud Dahu.

It was learned that since the decisive attack, the late governor-general had been privately smuggling two Moro children found there immediately after the encounter and picked up for dead by American troops. They later recovered and Wood then took them under his care.

Emilio Aguinaldo, former rebel leader, issued the following statement:

"With the death of Governor General Wood America has lost its best administrator in the Philippines—a governor general who sought to improve in a notable way the administration of public affairs. During his administration he rehabilitated our finances which were on the verge of a precipice. Without violating the principle of separation of powers in democratic government he restored public confidence in the administration of justice."

SACCO, VANZETTI NOT ENTITLED TO PUBLIC SYMPATHY

HOQUIAM, Wash., Aug. 8.—Warning to citizens and all aliens who desire to remain domiciled in the United States, not to let their sympathy or wrong information sway them as the day for the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti approaches, was issued here today by Congressman Albert Johnson, chairman of the Immigration and Naturalization committee of the House of Representatives.

"Aliens domiciled in this country should remember," said Johnson, "that if they partake in anti-government demonstrations here they end their chances of citizenship, which, now that it is harder to get, is that much more desired. Besides, they will be liable to deportation under the 1919 act."

Referring to Sacco and Vanzetti as "handicapped murderers," Johnson's statement said: "They are also anarchists and enemies to this government, but that fact had nothing to do with their conviction nor with their approaching execution. They should never have been admitted to the United States and under the new immigration act could not have been admitted."

"I know Governor Fuller, of Massachusetts and know several of the board of citizens who assisted him in final examination of murder charges and evidence. They are convinced that Sacco and Vanzetti are guilty, and these men in my opinion are as guilty as were the McNamara brothers, who blew up the Los Angeles Times building, killing twenty or more, and who confessed their crime after a great defense fund had been raised by sympathetic working men."

"They are as guilty as those who conspired to and did murder Governor Stuenkel of Idaho. They are as guilty as those who assassinated the world war veterans at Centralia, Washington, on the first Armistice day. They are as guilty as Berkman, who tried to kill Frick in Pittsburgh and dodged deportation for a dozen years after serving his prison term. Sacco and Vanzetti are aliens. That makes no difference. Had they been fairly murdered by Americans, this government would have had to apologize to Italy and pay great sums in damages."

U. S. Not Frightened
"Demonstrations may go on in other lands. That is the affair of other governments. Foreign demonstrations can neither effect nor frighten the United States government or any sovereign state thereof. These demonstrations began originally in order to create a 'situation' for the benefit of the communists of the world without any real knowledge as to the guilt or innocence of the murderers. Don't be fooled in that kind of propaganda. Union labor men and women should read the recent statement of Mathew Wold, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, that there is real danger from violence Soviet Communist activities which rage everywhere without check or restraint."

Johnson added: "We hope soon to put a third congress in law by which naturalized citizens who, after swearing allegiance to the United States, wear black shirts and swear undying allegiance to Mussolini or any other dictator, or who support any other government, shall be deprived of their naturalization. Citizenship is the greatest gift the United States has to bestow. It has been gladly received by millions."

He said that time has come when such acquired citizenship shall not be used by radicals to the danger of this great government."

PORTLAND THIEF LANDS IN HOSPITAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—With a wound through his abdomen, Arthur Rogers, 21, of Cleveland, Ohio, is in a very serious condition today, as a result of an attempt to hold up L. C. McCluskey and rob the filling station at Twenty-Second and Washington streets last night.

He fled from the scene of the holdup in a stolen car after an interchange of shots with McCluskey and a few minutes later George M. Frost cut in front of a car at Sixth and Montgomery, to warn its driver that the rear end of his car was in flames.

Rogers staggered from the car, asked him to call a doctor and slumped on the pavement.

At the police station before being taken under guard to a hospital Rogers confessed to four other holdups.

FOUR BOYS CAUGHT WITH STOLEN CAR

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—An illegal cut across a corner at State street intersection and failure of one of the youths to provide a name for a mythical uncle resulted disastrously Saturday night for four young men who are said to have purloined a car in Portland. They gave their names as Vern Patterson of Tacoma, John Adams of San Francisco, Maurice Goldie of Chicago and Gene Douglas of Tacoma.

One of the youths claimed the car was registered to his uncle, but said he didn't know the uncle's name. A check up at police headquarters and a telephone call to Portland brought information that the car had been stolen from E. C. Curtis, 581 Couch street, Portland.
