RECEIPTS FROM NATIONAL FORESTS SHOW BIG GAIN

The national forests of Oregon and Washington showed the largest receipts of any of the eight federal forest districts, taking in \$1,309,473.16 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1927. This was a gain of \$155,017.72 over the receipts for that district in the preceding fiscal year, according to the district forester, Portland, Oregon. The California district was second in total receipts, taking in \$1,162,581.35.

Sales of timber, permits for grazing and other uses of all the 150 national forests brought a total of \$5,106,609.29 into the treasury of the federal government during the past fiscal year.

The total receipts from the national forests for the last fiscal year were an increase of \$10,948.37 over the amount received in the preceding fiscal year, and exceeded any previous year, except 1923 and 1924, when the receipts were \$5,335,818.13, and \$5,251,903.11 respectively.

The total national forest receipts last year came from the following sources: Timber, \$3,206,832.82; timber settlements, \$21,863.93; timber trespass, \$3,473.02; turpentine sales, \$18,872.73; grazing fees (cattle and horses), \$874,611.82; grazing (sheep and goats), \$447,040.54; grazing trespass, \$9,205.75; special uses, \$277,611.53; occupancy trespass, \$399.07; water power, \$98,749.34; fire trespass, \$5,600.84; property trespass, \$50.

In sales of national forest timber the cutting is done under the supervision of forest officers in such a way that the future timber production of the area will not be impaired. Grazing permits on the national forests likewise are issued with due regard to permanent maintenance of the forest resources.

Under the federal law, 25 per cent of all the gross receipts of the national forests is turned over to the state and counties in which these forests are located, to take the place of taxes which might be collected if the lands were in private ownership, government lands being exempt from taxation. These funds are used for schools and roads in the local communities.

MAYOR IS ADMIRAL

LONDON, Aug. 8.—The Lord Mayor of London, looking through some misty records, discovered that he also is an admiral. By hereditary right, he is admiral of the port of London. He assumed his robes of office and went to the docks where he was piped aboard a liner with all the ceremony accorded an admiral of the fleet.

HERE'S 1927 MODEL

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—According to experts of the National Hosiery Exposition in New York City recently, the perfect feminine leg of 1927 is just a little more rounded than it was in 1926. The approved measurements are: ankle, 9 inches; calf, 11 inches; knee, 14 inches; thigh, 20 inches. Last year's winner had a 7 1/2 inch ankle, 13 inch calf and knee and 20 inch thigh.

FULL LENGTH PLAYS

PARIS, Aug. 8.—A demand for old drama in its original form has swept Paris and many a theatre-goer has to watch the stage for five and six hours without intermission. Hamlet is given in its full, five-hour length. Mercutio's love scene was played for the first time since Sarah Bernhardt in its eighteen tableaux, without intermission.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Aug. 8.—Caret R. D. Johnston was piloting his airplane on a practice flight when one of the wheels on his landing gear came off, fell far to the ground. Later, when he had come down without mishap, a farmer presented a bill for \$5, saying the wheel had struck the ground and bounced to the back of a heifer, injuring her.

CITY SURVEY SHOWS VACANT HOUSES TO BE ON DECREASE

A survey of the city at present shows a very satisfactory condition in the way of filling up of empty residences and improvement of homes. In line with the general depression which has been felt all over the country in recent months, Roseburg has had quite a number of vacant houses. Persons having residences for rent have had considerable difficulty in keeping the buildings filled up, but at present these homes are rapidly being occupied and at the present time it will be only a very short time until every residence will be occupied.

The change has been very noticeable during the last two or three weeks and the number of people seeking homes for rent seems to be increasing daily.

The classified advertising columns of a newspaper form a good barometer to this situation, for when there are numerous houses unoccupied the advertisements are numerous and often run for several days, but when houses are becoming scarce there are fewer advertisements and they change frequently. There has been a noticeable decrease in house for rent ads recently and many persons who have inserted ads to run for several days cancel the subsequent insertions due to the fact that the homes are occupied soon after the notice is published.

All indications at present are pointing to a very favorable condition in this respect.

There is also another very interesting factor in this connection. Owners of residences apparently are doing a great deal of improvement work. It is almost impossible to secure services of painters, carpenters, paperhangers, and decorators at present. Nearly all of these workmen have work contracted for several weeks ahead and in order to obtain their services a person must often wait for considerable time. As there is very little new building going on at present, this must mean that improvements are being made to existing homes.

FARM NEWS

GAPES IN CHICKENS PREVALENT THIS YEAR—CONTROL MEASURES OUTLINED

There has been an unusual prevalence this year over the United States of the disease known as "gapes," a condition occurring in little chicks as the result of the presence of gape worms in the windpipe. These worms are blood-red and the male and female worms are joined together in such a way as to form a letter Y with a long stem from which the worm is sometimes known as the Y-worm.

These worms block the windpipe in such a way as to cause great difficulty in breathing, and the sick chicks show a very characteristic form of breathing, the mouth being opened wide and the breathing having in many cases a peculiar hissing or wheezy sound. A few birds, usually those with few worms in the windpipe, recover spontaneously, but many die. This year losses amounting to two-thirds or three-fourths of hundreds of chicks in a flock have been reported.

The two most important precautions

to be taken in connection with gapes are as follows:

First, keep little chicks away from turkeys and from areas ranged by turkeys. The reason for this is that turkeys may carry gape worms at any age, the grown birds showing no evidence of their presence, although young poult may die of gapes. The turkey is therefore of major importance as a carrier and spreader of the disease. In most of the cases of outbreaks investigated, turkeys have been found to be present on the place. It is sometimes reported that no gapes were present until turkeys were introduced on the owner of the sick chicks reported that he had raised chickens for five years without gapes, but that he had allowed some one with a drove of turkeys to range them on his farm for a day while in transit from one place to another. The outbreak of gapes in his chickens followed.

Second, put little chicks on clean ground, plowing and fencing an area for this purpose if necessary, and keep them there from the time they are hatched until they are two or three months old. It is always advisable to keep young animals away from older animals and areas used by them, as many older animals are carriers of disease germs and spreaders of parasite eggs, even though these older animals show no evidence of disease. Young animals are more susceptible to many of these diseases and parasites than are older animals. This precaution of plowing should be taken when gapes have been present on a place. It may not serve to dispose of the worm eggs entirely, but if any chicks develop gapes are promptly taken from

the area on the first sign of trouble and isolated until they recover or die, this method will give a measure of protection to the rest of the flock and avoid the necessity of missing a year's hatch to order to allow the eggs present on the soil to die. Sanitation, as regards the condition of the runs and houses, the drinking water and feed, and in other respects, is helpful in the control of gapes.
