walled, 27-year-old navigator. The "City of Peoria," a tiny biplane to be flown by Charles W. Parkhurst, was on the compass testing table and plans were made for the half hour tests. Ralph Lewis, navigator, has the tests of Lieutenant Wyatt before him also. Captain Frederick Giles, British army flier during the world war, is the only official entrant left who has been unable to reach the starting point. He hopped off from Detroit today.

European Fliers Wait PARIS, Aug. 13.—Prospects were not brilliant this morning for trans-Atlantic flights. While there was some hope that three French pilots camping at Le Bourget might take off Sunday on their trans-Atlantic expedition, the idea was not encouraged by French weather men.

Basing their calculations on messages from ships making weather observations on the Atlantic by government orders, these experts insist there is little chance of proper flying weather until the beginning of next week.

Charles A. Levine, owner of the Bellanca plane Columbia, which is ready for a return flight to America with Maurice Drouhin as pilot, appears to share the pessimism of the weather experts.

Levine Again Halted PARIS, Aug. 13.—French misfortune affecting the Bellanca monoplane Columbia cropped up today, and it appeared this afternoon that there was slight chance of her being ready to fly tomorrow, even if the weather over the Atlantic clears.

Maurice Drouhin, French pilot, engaged for the flight by Charles A. Levine, was inspecting the plane when he found a blade of the propeller twisted. The bend was such as might be made with a pair of pliers.

Straightening of the blade will be a delicate operation, as the surface must be absolutely true.

BERLIN, Aug. 13.—Lieutenant Otto Koenigs and Count Solmus-Laubach hopped off this afternoon for Cologne, where they will retell their Caspar biplane for their attempted trans-Atlantic flight to the United States.

CALSHOT, England, Aug. 13.—With unfavorable weather conditions at various spots over the Atlantic, Captain Frank T. Courtney said he had no idea when he might get away for the trans-Atlantic hop in his Dornier "Wahle." One More Gets O. K. MUNICIPAL AIRPORT, Oakland, Cal., Aug. 13.—John Auggy Pedlar, of Flint, Mich., and his plane, the "Miss Doran," were listed today as the fifth official entry in the \$25,000, half air race to Hawaii, after completion of all tests for navigation, motor and plane performance.

That puts Pedlar, his navigator, Lieutenant Viles R. Knops of San Diego and Miss Mildred Doran of Flint, their passenger, fifth on the starting line for the race Tuesday. Lieutenant Knops was substituted for Lieutenant Manley Lawing of San Diego, who failed in his navigation tests.

HOP PICKING STARTS IN LANE COUNTY; HALF SOLD  
EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 13.—Picking of the early hop crop has started in yards of Lane county and there is a big demand for pickers at one and a quarter cents a pound. While no estimate is being made of the size of the crop at this time, Lane county annually contributed about 5000 bales to the market, according to Frank Hever, local buyer. The first bales of the early crop will be ready for shipment in about 10 days. Approximately 50 per cent of the crop has been contracted and the price will be around 19 cents a pound. This is lower than a year ago and is figured from reports of the world hop crops.

who was an expert and experienced baker, was employed by Mr. Hutchings for many years and only recently resigned his position as head baker. He went to Coquille for a short time, returning to Roseburg about a month ago. He had been working for Mr. Hutchings only about a week.

In the fall of 1918 he was married to Maybelle Wilson, who is an instructor in the Roseburg high school. His widow and a small son, Wilson, survive.

He also leaves four brothers, Howard Church, a local mail carrier; George, formerly of Roseburg, now of San Francisco; L. E. of Brinkhaven, Ohio; and Durfee, of Danville, Ohio. A sister, Emma, also resides in Danville. His father and mother are both dead, the father having passed away about two weeks ago.

Howard Church left this morning for Tillamook where the body was taken, and will make arrangements for the funeral.

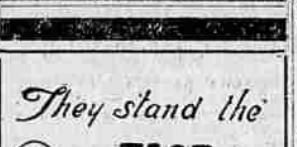
The body will probably be brought either to Roseburg or Yoncalla.
