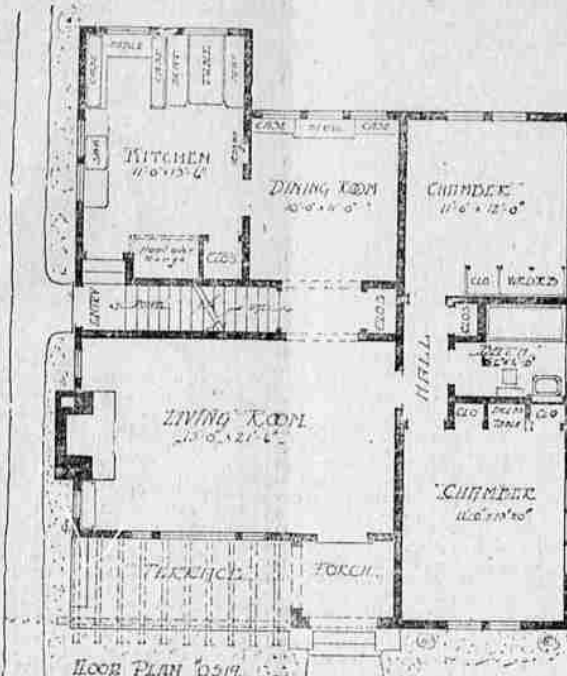
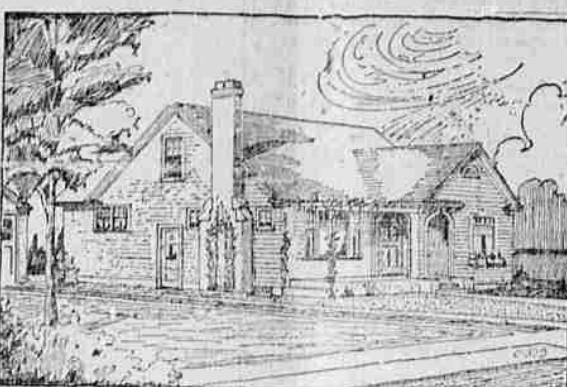

DOUGHBOYS MUST LEARN 300 CHINESE WORDS TO REMAIN

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—American doughboys in China have been ordered to learn at least 300 words of Chinese if they want to be classified as fully trained members of their regiment, the army information bureau announced today.

Colonel Isaac Newell, commander of the 15th U. S. Infantry at Tientsin, issued the order after becoming convinced that the probability of alterations and misunderstandings would be decreased if the American soldiers "improved their present meagre vocabulary of grunts, nods and finger exercises."

ROGUE RIVER IS UNKIND TO CAMERA MAN OF MOVIES

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 15.—The trip of Earl Emley, motion picture man, to Gold Beach by boat down Rogue river ended Saturday when the craft struck a rock at Russian Bar, on the lower river, and went to the bottom of the river almost immediately. The boat was being piloted by Claud Bardon, experienced river man who took Zane Grey to the mouth of the Rogue a year ago. Emley had planned to take a picture of the Rogue river.

The camera and most of the equipment was saved, although Mr. Emley does not yet know if the films which he had already taken were ruined.

Emley and Bardon started down the river last Thursday afternoon. When the accident occurred which ended their trip they were seven miles below Alameda or about forty miles from their starting point.

Finding of an automobile tube and rubber container for films many miles below the scene of the accident gave rise to reports Saturday night that the pair might have been drowned.

MASTER BRAIN OF U. S. STEEL DIES AT EIGHTY

giant merger was the Federal Steel company and smaller concerns of Illinois, of which Mr. Gary was then the directing head. The business created by Andrew Carnegie was purchased in 1901 for \$492,000,100, and in all ten large companies were taken into the merger with a combined capital of \$867,550,394. It was the biggest undertaking in the industrial world and the financial world gasped when the corporation announced its plans for an authorized capital of \$1,100,000,000 in stock and \$304,000,000 in bonds. Charles Schwab became president and Mr. Gary chairman of the executive committee.

Ships On Every Sea
The great corporation under Mr. Gary's direction grew apace until it became a dominant factor in the steel trade of the world with 36 foreign offices and 138 distributors in 44 foreign countries. Its ships sailed the seven seas. Everything about the corporation—property, holdings, output, money invested, dividends—grew to such an extent that the United States Steel corporation came to be regarded as greater than anything that had ever been imagined in the industrial world. At a hearing before a congressional committee in Washington Mr. Gary was quoted as saying that the assets of the corporation could not be duplicated for \$2,200,000,000.

Two weeks ago the United States Steel corporation was one of the three principals in the largest industrial merger in the history of the country. The others were the Du Pont de Nemours and General Motors companies.

Unions' foe, Labor's friend
While Mr. Gary was known as a foe to union labor, nevertheless he always was interested in the welfare and human side of the corporation's employees. It was at his behest that the United States Steel corporation adopted the plan of voluntary compensation to injured workmen long before such action was made compulsory by the laws of many states. He also was largely responsible for the corporation's extensive system of welfare work for the benefit of employees. In this work, which included among other things, playgrounds, schools, clubs, gardens and pensions, the corporation in the 10 years between 1912 and 1922 expended more than \$108,000,000.

Mr. Gary was known as the father of the industrial safety movement and the steel corporation was one of the first large industrial companies to inaugurate "safety first" campaigns among its employees. The corporation has spent millions of dollars in accident prevention measures. Mr. Gary served as chairman of the committee

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—The Evening Post says today that "Bellanca Pete" Brooks, nephew of Lady Astor and "social register mechanic," who helped to groom the Bellanca monoplane "Columbia" for its flight to Germany in June, has purchased an airplane with which he intends to compete in the air race from this city to Spokane, Wash., next month.

The young millionaire jumped from a height of 2,000 feet. He was headed for some telephone wires, when the aviator in the plane from which he made the jump, seeing the danger, dived, roomed his plane near the jumper and literally blew him away from the wires with his propeller.

INLAND EMPIRE WHEAT POURS INTO PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—Golden wheat from the great inland empire tributary to Portland is flowing into this port for shipment to foreign countries.

Great long freight trains each day bring in thousands of bushels to the docks and warehouses. The movement will be at its height during the next three weeks, it is said.

Many vessels chartered for full cargoes, will be in port to take this wheat to foreign markets, largely to Europe.

Shipments during the first ten days of August have reached 845,000 bushels, according to report of the report of the port of Portland traffic bureau.

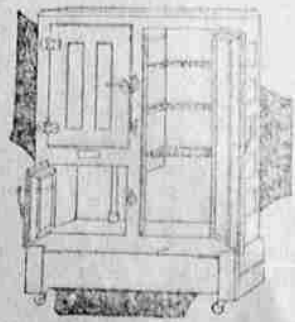
