pedestrians made this spot a necropolis for a day.
The huge municipal airport, 825 acres of reclaimed marsh land surfaced with porous clay, bustled with excitement of an early hour. At the graying dawn, race participants, employees and others connected with the flight, began strolling about. Many had gone through an all night vigil on the field, but the approach of the zero hour proved a stimulus that quickened tardy steps and brought a new glow to fogged minds.

One Plane Ruled Out

MUNICIPAL AIRPORT, Oakland, Cal., Aug. 16.—The Air King, formerly the City of Peoria, was ruled out of the Dole flight by Honolulu by the starting committee at 11:15 a. m. Captain C. W. Saunders, chairman of the Dole flight committee, announced.
The Air King may still take off as it has a department of commerce permit, but the ruling of the committee makes it ineligible for the Dole flight prize. A check of gasoline consumption showed the plane had a fuel storage supply sufficient to carry it 2100 miles, 300 miles short of Honolulu.

A conference between Charles W. Parkhurst, pilot of the plane, and Ralph Lowes, navigator, with factory representatives of the builder, developed that the storage tanks were built on the assumption that the plane would travel 90 miles an hour. Its tested cruising speed revealed that it travels only 80 miles an hour at top speed.

Hawaiian Welcome Ready

HONOLULU, Aug. 16.—Hawaii is ready to extend one of her famous welcomes to the aerial visitors entered in the Dole race. Plans for the reception are complete, even to the promised cooperation of the United States weather man.

Governor Wallace R. Farrington and other officials and prominent residents will be at Wheeler Field at 5 o'clock Wednesday morning to await the fliers. That is 7:30 a. m. San Francisco time. If the fliers have good luck and make the trip from Oakland in 22 hours, they will reach the island of Oahu at 7:29 a. m. Honolulu time.

Military authorities erected grand stands to seat 3,000 at the landing field. Parking space for 5,000 automobiles is provided. Quick lunch restaurants have been built to supply "hot dogs," sandwiches, tea, coffee and other food and soft drinks to the crowd.

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
