JAMES J. HILL'S DAUGHTER FIGHTS PLANNED MERGER

(Associated Press Special Wire)

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Clara Hill Lindley, daughter of James J. Hill, "the empire builder," and her husband, Erasmus C. Lindley, today made public a petition to the Interstate Commerce commission to intervene in the Great Northern-Northern Pacific unification hearings.

The petitioners, who are substantial holders of the securities of both roads, favor unification of the ownership, control and operation of the northern lines and the Burlington, but state that such unification should be effected through the utilization of one of the three roads as a base rather than through the instrumentality of a new Delaware company as proposed in the original plan.

Mr. and Mrs. Lindley suggest that leasing the properties of the Northern Pacific to the Great Northern would be more in the public interest and more consistent with the letter and spirit of the transportation act, because the Great Northern is a Minnesota corporation with broad charter powers. It is also contended that Minnesota is the actual and legal status of a larger portion of the approximately 26,000 miles of railway line involved than any other state. They added it would be more compatible with the public interest for the Great Northern to issue \$250,000,000 additional capital stock in exchange for a like amount of Northern Pacific stock than for the proposed Delaware company to issue about \$500,000,000 capital stock in exchange for stock of the two northern lines.

They describe the proposed holding company as a "paper corporation" of Delaware, without substantial property or credit.

GOOD WOOL MARKET IS PREDICTED BY MANAGER WARD

Camp at Idleyd Park

500,000 CANARIES FROM GERMANY EVERY YEAR

HERLIN, Aug. 17.—Germany, the world's market for canary birds, annually ships about 500,000 of the little feathered warblers in America.

Since the beginning of the 16th century when these songsters were brought from the Canary Islands, they have been carefully and extensively bred in Germany. With the last century the "Harzer Rollers" in the Harz Mountains have acquired world-wide fame.

Through careful breeding the original green color of the birds has been changed to a bright yellow, while incessant and careful training has markedly enhanced their original marvellous vocal qualities.

The features of the canary bird exhibitions regularly held in Berlin are the "song tournaments," at which the birds' vocal abilities are carefully appraised by expert breeders, who have made the surprising discovery that the green birds—resembling in color their wild tropical progenitors—are frequently better singers than their yellow brethren.

He stated that from the best material available he had consumed between 25-30,000,000 pounds more wool from January of this year than in 1926, and that probably 75 per cent of the clothing wool consumed in this country at the present time was now domestic wool, whereas over a ten-year period previously this would run about 50 per cent.

Factors which he did not consider so optimistic were a decrease in domestic production of 12,000,000 pounds, a decrease in sales of men's clothing to date, a financial stringency in Japan caused by the silk decline and the fact that supplies in Germany, Italy, France and England are slightly larger than in 1926.

He concluded that on the whole the situation was quite healthy, and people could look forward with confidence to wool for the balance of the year.
