ERWIN PLANS FLIGHT FROM CALIFORNIA TO JAPAN

MUNICIPAL AIRPORT, Oakland, Calif., Aug. 17.—Captain William L. Erwin, pilot of the monoplane, Dallas Spirit II, was forced to turn back to its starting point in the \$35,000 James D. Dole air race to Hawaii yesterday because of a wind ripped fuselage, declared today he expected to hop off immediately for Honolulu, thence to Tokyo, Japan, despite the fact that he was barred from the Starwood prize and probably would not benefit from the Dole award.

Mechanics had replaced the cloth on the bottom of Captain Erwin's plane today, and after refueling, he planned to start westward across the Pacific.

Erwin explained his accident yesterday by saying that a trap door placed in the bottom of the navigator's cabin had been attached insecurely, permitting the wind to rush through and rip the cloth off the bottom of the fuselage.

McELWEE'S WILL DISPOSES OF \$2,500,000 ESTATE

WAUKESHA, Ill., Aug. 16.—The will of Robert H. McElwee, Lake Forest banker and lumber dealer who died June 6, was filed for probate yesterday listing personal property at \$2,500,000 and real estate at \$1,000.

Mrs. Elizabeth Spalding McElwee, the widow, was named chief heir and residuary legatee. One thousand shares of stock of the Continental and Commercial National Bank of Chicago, all real estate, furniture and household goods were left to her.

Trigg Waller, Highland Park, nephew, now deceased, a niece, Nanette Waller Patterson, of Medford, Oregon, Virginia McElwee Bartolomew, of Palestine, Texas, were each left three hundred shares of bank stock.

Three hundred shares of bank stock were left to Flora McElwee Miller, of Lexington, Va. In the event of her death the stock is to be divided equally between her sons, William and Francis.
