Roy Totten, two years, larceny; Cecil de Tillan, two years, larceny; C. M. Witt, three years and parole, larceny; Alex. McGrath, two years, receiving stolen property.

The Roy Totten, mentioned in the above dispatch, is a resident of Glendale and was captured in Roseburg a few days ago by Officer George Dietrich upon information telephoned from Eugene where the young man stole an automobile.

tion for a revocation of sentence. With regard to the petition for a writ of error the decision says:

"The wording of the statute is clear and must be construed as meaning that the issuance of a writ of error in a capital case rests in the sound judicial discretion of the single justice to whom the application is presented."

"The petition for a writ of error submitted to the full bench was dismissed because 'a writ of error is not a common law writ but has become obsolete in view of the express purpose of the legislature as manifested by the statute.'"

TENNESSEE CAVE HOLDS GEOLOGIST LAWRENCE ASHLEY

SHELLMOUND, Tenn., Aug. 19.—A granite walled cave, once the stronghold of freebooters, housed within its uncharted regions today the answer to the fate of Lawrence S. Ashley, geologist and underground explorer, who disappeared within its deep recesses Monday morning.

Nick-a-Jack cave, thirty miles west of Chattanooga, held fast the one man that possibly had lauded its wonders more widely than any other person. Ashley, ever fascinated by its marvels, held the cavern in higher regard than Mammoth Cave.

A seventh party of explorers took up the search for the missing geologist last night when the sixth band of weary, heavy-eyed seekers staggered exhausted out of its murky entrance after a futile eight hour tramp through the mysterious windings. A slow painstaking journey through six miles of subterranean passages revealed no trace of the missing man and only a cryptic sign "L. S. A. 196" scrawled on a rock far within, which friends believed was merely a guide marker used by Ashley.

Ashley, advising intimates that he intended penetrating deep into the cave for further investigations, entered the cavern with only a few sandwiches and a small quantity of

carbide for his lamps, both of which searchers conclude were consumed hours ago. They chafed a faint hope that if he escaped a watery grave in the clear river running to unknown avenues, he may be wandering alive within the impenetrable darkness. Others fear he may have met the fate of Floyd Collins, in being imprisoned by a rock slide and left helpless in a sub-cave beyond their reach. A plan was crystallizing today to ask the governor for state police and possibly for state militia to assist in the rescue work.

TRAIN WRECK KILLS TWO

(Associated Press Leased Wire) KEOKUK, Iowa, Aug. 19.—Two men were reported killed in the wreck today at Gregory Landing, Mo., of Chicago, Burlington and Quincy train No. 10, besides Arch McNeill of Brawley, California, who was almost instantly killed, the body of John Griffith was found.

FALSE REPORT OF FINDING OF DORAN PLANE

her life boat, according to T. R. Reed, United States weather bureau expert here.

However, the Miss Doran would not last many hours in the most favorable weather, aviation experts said. The construction of the plane was such that it would give buoyancy to its weight by emptying the gasoline tanks, but it could not ride the waves for many hours, after the first 24.

Little Hope For Miss Doran

The Miss Doran put out into the race on Tuesday after it had been forced back from a first start because of engine trouble.

The consensus of those who watched the plane perform was that it did not get far along its course before the engine trouble recurred and the plane was forced to a quick landing in the sea with more than a ton of gasoline in the tanks. Dropping an airplane into the sea under the most favorable circumstances is considered a precarious job for an expert pilot, but landing there with a heavy load of gasoline would seem certain to invite disaster.

Against this opinion was a popular notion that the plane might have cruised until it went off its course and passed the islands, either to the north or south, coming down with exhausted gasoline tanks. But this was only a most remote possibility.

The Golden Eagle, carrying a crew of two persons, Frost and Scott, presented a different situation. With a cork bottomed fuselage, inflated wing tips and rear end, it could be converted into a sea going craft by the turning of a valve and the closing of its doors.

Gordon Scott, the young navigator is at home on the water, having sailed the Pacific for years.

Food Supply Small

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—How long two gallons of water can last between three people cast adrift on the Pacific ocean, was a matter of conjecture here today when it became known that Miss Mildred Doran and her companions John Auguy Pedlar and Lieutenant Vilas R. Knapp, showed that amount in their plane for the Dole race.

Leader of the Miss Doran contained the following articles showing that the "flying school teacher" and her crew were better equipped for a straight, uneventful flight to Hawaii than to withstand days of drifting about on the ocean:

One dozen chicken sandwiches. Two quarts hot chocolate. One bottle malted milk tablets. Three packages minis. One quart condensed fruit juices. Two gallons of water.

Jack Frost and Gordon Scott, pilot and navigator of the Golden Eagle, the other missing plane, carried provisions expected to last them thirty days and were each equipped with "life cups," devices which work on the face to condense their breath into drinking water.

Prize Money Paid

HONOLULU, Aug. 19.—Art Gobel, Hollywood, and Martin Jensen, Honolulu, successful pilots in the Oakland-Hawaii aerial dash, received their reward today. They were presented with checks of \$25,000 and \$10,000 respectively, James D. Dole, sponsor of the flight, personally making the award. The presentation was made at an informal ceremony at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel.
