OWYHEE HOLDERS OFFER LANDS FOR \$9 ACRE AVERAGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—Private interests with large land holdings in the Owyhee and Vale irrigation projects have signed contracts that they will sell their holdings at the appraised value averaging \$9 an acre. This information was received today by George C. Kreutzer, director of reclamation economics who arrived here on a tour of the west.

The private holdings amount to 50 per cent of the Vale project and 10 per cent in the Owyhee. Signing of these contracts removed the last obstacle in the government development of these two projects. It will be two years before the Vale project is ready for settlers and a year or more before work is finished on the Owyhee.

Plans for settlement of these two projects were discussed here today by Kreutzer with W. G. Ide, of the state and Portland chamber of commerce and W. B. D. Dodson of the Portland chamber.

Kreutzer, who recently inspected the Tule lake division of the Klamath project, told of settlement work being done there. He said he never saw such crops as are being raised on the Tule lake land. "One farmer told me he was harvesting 70 bushels of wheat to the acre, and another that his yield of barley was 110 bushels to the acre."

Kreutzer gave credit to the joint land settlement department of the Portland and Oregon state chambers of commerce for work in getting settlers for the Tule lake section.

ELEVEN NEW FIRES IN MT. BAKER FOREST

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—Eleven new fires, started in the national forest near Mount Baker, added to the troubles today of the district forestry service office here. The Mount Baker fires were small and were expected to be controlled quickly.

One hundred additional men were sent last night to aid in the battle against flames in the Columbia National Forest. Little change was reported in fire conditions in the national forests of Washington and higher humidity was a favorable factor.
