were tears in the prisoner's eyes as he patted his sister's hand and shoulder and kissed her again. They had not seen each other for 19 years.

Warden Hendry informed Miss Vanzetti that she might stay with her brother for an hour today and might come back tomorrow. When he left them they were conversing eagerly in Italian. Miss Vanzetti speaks no English.

Mrs. Sacco meanwhile visited her husband. When Miss Vanzetti left the prison she would make no comment on her interview with her brother but she said she would visit him again tomorrow.

New York Again On Guard
NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—New York's entire force of 14,000 policemen, ordered out when word reached here of the Massachusetts supreme court's decision adverse to Sacco and Vanzetti, were back on emergency duty today for their vigil against possible disorder.

U. S. Judge Says No
BOSTON, Aug. 20.—Arthur B. Hill, chief counsel for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, said today that he had been informed by Elias Field, associated counsel, that Justice James M. Morton, Jr. of the federal district court had refused to issue writ of habeas corpus and also had refused Field permission to appeal to the United States circuit court of appeals.

Field visited Justice Morton at his home at Westport yesterday and applied for the writ, which was sought in an effort to stay the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti, whose respite expires at midnight next Monday.

Hill said that he had written a letter to Governor Fuller and that he expected to go to Beverly today to see Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes of the United States supreme court.

In his letter to the governor, Hill asked for a further respite "in order that the cases may be dealt with by the supreme court of the United States."

Giri Firebrand Jailed
CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Still crusading for "the new freedom," 18-year-old Aurora d'Angelo today found herself back in jail for soap box oratory in behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti.

The fiery young high school girl who only a week ago went to a cell for leading a riotous protest parade against the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti, was arrested last night a moment after she ascended a soap box before a crowd of sympathizers and launched a tirade against society.

Review Petition Faulty
WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Counsel for Sacco and Vanzetti were unable to file a petition for review of their conviction of murder in the

supreme court today because the papers presented are held to be not in satisfactory form, no records of the case being presented.

Michael A. Musmanno, acting for the condemned men, was at the office of the clerk of the court when it opened this morning at 9 o'clock. It quickly developed during his talk with a representative of the clerk's office that his papers were not in proper form. He left with the clerk the papers he brought with him, which included two petitions, one to bring up for review the case as developed before the supreme court of Massachusetts and the other for a review of the action of the superior court. He also left at the clerk's office filing fees for the two cases and promised that the records in both would be here early next week. The cases cannot be filed until the records are presented.

Finding that there is no justice of the supreme court in Washington, Mr. Musmanno asserted that his associate, Arthur D. Hill, in Massachusetts, would see Justice Holmes today for the purpose of asking him to stay execution of the two men until the supreme court can pass upon the two petitions for review when it meets in October. Justice Holmes is at Beverly, Mass.

Sargent Won't Act
LITTLETON, Vermont, Aug. 20.—Attorney General John G. Sargent said today that he was away from Philadelphia and that he would not act in the case of Sacco and Vanzetti.

ice cross, was in the war for obtaining valuable information under fire and "strains" machine gun nests to protect American troops. Eight enemy planes were brought down by the young officer—he is now 31—and he himself was shot down in his flying machine several times.

Born at Ryan, Oklahoma, Edwin was educated to be a musician, but when war was declared he abandoned a tour of the country with a composer of religious songs and went to Fort Logan H. Root, Little Rock, to become an aviator. His training was completed overseas and he became a pilot in September, 1917.

Search So Far Failure.
HONOLULU, Aug. 20.—Merchant ships and naval seaplanes early today had searched nearly all Hawaiian waters without finding the slightest trace of the Miss Doran and the Golden Eagle. Dole race entrained, three days overdue in Honolulu and without doubt either wrecked or belated.

Submarines have investigated the windward side of all the islands except Kaula while seaplanes have combed Kauai and most of Maui and Molokai. Submarines also searched the waters between the islands of Maui, Hawaii and Kaula.

Meanwhile other naval vessels are searching from San Francisco and the United States destroyers Sunnadin and Pelican are covering fixed courses at sea north of Maui. The Sunnadin and Pelican have been out since Wednesday night.

PRUNE GROWERS MEET

Prune growers from all parts of the county gathered in Roseburg today for the meeting called for this afternoon to discuss the marketing situation. Good success has been had so far in making up the pool, and it appears that it will be possible to sign up approximately four million pounds, but it is doubtful if a six million pound minimum can be reached. Whether or not a pool is to be made of a smaller amount will probably be decided as a result of today's meeting.

Weather Spells Death.
The Associated Press representative aboard the Sunnadin reported high seas off Makapuu Point, island of Oahu, at midnight of Wednesday which caused naval authorities to express doubt as to the ability of any airplane to survive on the surface of the water in such weather.

The rumor crop Friday was much smaller than on Thursday, principally because of the reaction locally against publication in the Honolulu Advertiser of the erroneous report that the Miss Doran, piloted by John A. Pedlar and navigated by Miss Mildred Doran of Flint, Mich., as passenger, had been found and those aboard rescued.

Residents on all the islands, however, continued to watch the seas carefully, and some reports were received of "mysterious" floating objects. The credulity of the people has been strained, however, and they are seemingly unwilling to guess at anything being an airplane unless it is pretty well proved not to be anything else.

Prayer for Missing.
The successful fliers in the Dole contest were entertained last night by the Engineers Association to which Art Goebel, pilot of the Woolaroo, winner of the flight, declared flights from San Francisco to Hawaii can be made with perfect safety provided proper preparations are made. Those present at the meeting stood for a half minute in silent prayer for the safety of the occupants of the Miss Doran and the Golden Eagle.
