Excavation Done—

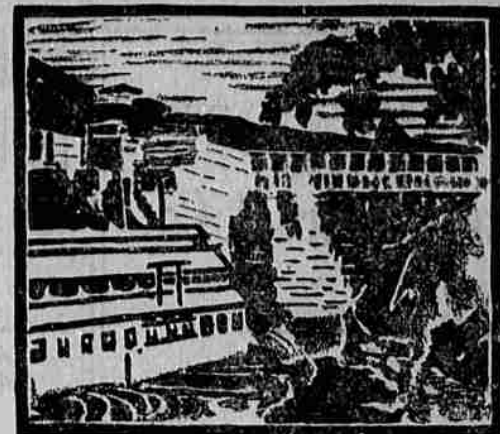
