WINE AND BEER TO BE OPPOSED BY THE W. C. T. U.

Organization Will Launch Campaign at National Meet This Week.

BONE DRYNESS IS AIM

3000 Women From Various Countries Will Attend; Diamond Medal Will Be Awarded.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Aug. 22.—Prohibition will not be modified if the "dry" women of the country succeed in the educational campaign they purpose launching. The Women's Christian Temperance Union will hold its 53rd annual convention here the week of August 25. At that time several plans will be presented to the delegates for an educational campaign which shall absorb the full strength of the organization. It is believed by the W. C. T. U. that agitation for modification has reached the point where it must be met with a complete change of public sentiment. This, it says, can be effected only by the concerted efforts of those who favor total abstinence.

Against Wine and Beer
Its efforts will be directed particularly against campaigners for the return of wine and beer. The results of a two years' study of the effects of alcohol on the human system, including 275 percent beer, will be reported by Miss Cora F. Stoddard, of Boston, Miss Stoddard is director of the department of scientific investigation and instruction of the W. C. T. U.

Three thousand women from the United States and from a number of the 52 foreign countries where the "White Ribbons" are represented, are expected to attend.

India, some of the South American countries, Canada, and several European countries will furnish delegates.

Miss Anna A. Gordon, president of the World W. C. T. U., whose headquarters are at Evanston, Ill., will present the plans which she has outlined for greater participation in the fight for prohibition in foreign countries.

The place of honor at the convention will be devoted to Miss Melissa A. Davis, of Delaware, Ohio, who is 88 years old. In the past four years she brought in 89 new members.

To Award Diamond Medal

For the first time in 20 years, the organization will bestow a diamond medal for the greatest contribution towards the education of young people to the value of total abstinence. All but six of the 57,000 girls who originally entered the contest have been eliminated. The winner will be selected from among the following: Bertha Brinker, Los Angeles; Miss Evelyn Domaree Cooper, Sanford, Florida; Miss Mary Haisley, Marion, Ind.; Miss Vera Powers, Minneapolis; Miss Gladys Wadrick, East Syracuse, N. Y.; and Miss Lorraine Profit, Chattanooga, Tenn.

It was in 1886 at a national W. C. T. U. convention in Minneapolis that some of the first steps towards campaigning for prohibition were taken by the organization.

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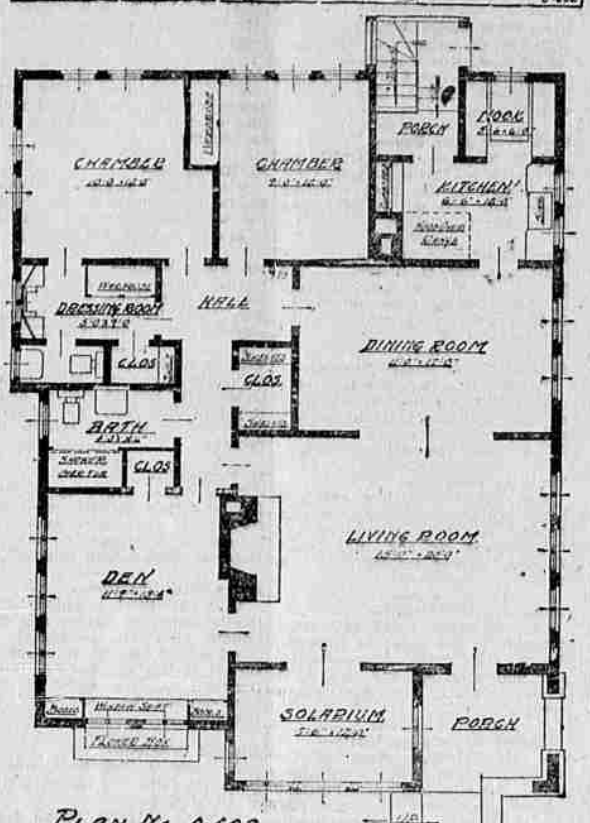
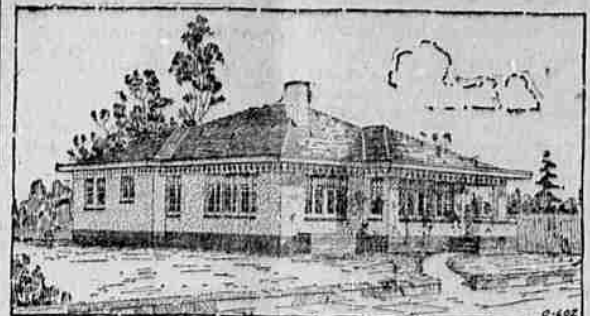
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BUNGALOW ELABORATE; NOT TOO EXPENSIVE

TUNNEY FAVORED 2 TO 1 TO BEAT DEMPSEY AGAIN

Insistent Minority Claims, However, Ex-Champion Will Regain His Lost Title.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The dope takes a strange twist in sports. Jack Dempsey was a 3 to 1 favorite to trim Gene Tunney last September but with their return fight exactly a month off, Tunney is a 2 to 1 shot to repeat his victory.

Apparently the experts who could see nothing but the devastating puncher of old in the Dempsey preparing for last year's battle now are almost as strongly convinced that the erstwhile Manassa Mauler is still mostly a "hollow shell" in spite of his knockout of Jack Sharkey. They believe Dempsey should have been disqualified for fouling Sharkey, instead of being awarded a knockout victory. They further contend that Dempsey, but for his so-called break, would not have gone much further against the Boston job, anyway; in other words, he is through.

It may be in the minority, but there is just as insistent a school of flaccid thought convinced that Dempsey, regaining confidence and punching power if not his old speed, will turn the tables on Tunney at Chicago. Dempsey, these observers argue, still can take it and come back to apply the decisive wallop. He took plenty, they point out, from Tunney and Sharkey, the difference being that he showed against Sharkey an ability to connect that was sadly missing against Gene.

Tunney may figure to be too smart, too fast and too good a boxer for Dempsey. Improved though the latter may be. But the same factors were held to be in Sharkey's favor. They did not work out because Dempsey crowded the Boston sailor from start to finish.

The answer, if any, seems to be that Dempsey must carry the fight to Tunney from the opening gong if he is to win; conversely, that Tunney's main reliance is to hold off the blinding ex-champion, spear him at long range or tie him up at close quarters.
