Why Forests Burn—An Indictment

Bureaucratic Inefficiency at Washington Blamed By Eastern Writer—Lack of Preparation Forces an Orgy of Spending at Critical Times—State Control Timbered Areas Advocated.

"Why our forests are burning up" is told by Arthur M. Baum in the New York Outlook, and his explanation is a general indictment of the United States forest service for those familiar bureaucratic vices—apathy, making easy office jobs instead of strenuous jobs in the forests, and eleventh-hour preparation for action against fire. Mr. Baum should know, for he says he spent fourteen years in the forest service, "most of them on duty in the worst fire region in the country." The consequences of the failure of the forest service are said to be that "the timber of the nation is burning up 25 per cent more rapidly than it is growing" and that, according to E. T. Allen of Portland, who is quoted by the Outlook, "our annual fire bill is well over \$500,000,000."

The article is an indictment of the higher-ups of the forest service, who fail to appreciate their task of fire suppression in its true proportions and they fail to report true conditions to congress and the public. They make no sincere, intelligent effort to secure necessary funds from congress and they fail to make maximum use of the funds provided. They devote "funds intended to strengthen field manpower and equipment to increasing salaries of high officials and building up an unnecessary bureaucratic overhead out of all proportion to the productive field force." They have not made radical changes necessary in the basic organization and have "assigned poorly equipped and often incompetent men to the most important positions in the fire organization." The service has lost sight of its primary job—conservation and administration of the national forests—and "has dissipated its energies through ex-officio leadership in private, municipal and state forestry."

Spending Orgy Forced
Deficiencies of men and equipment continue until the fire season is on, the field force is caught

unprepared, and the service is forced "to spend money like a drunken Indian" though "through centralized purchase and recourse to unused army stores it has been able to buy materials at less than market price. As to this, 'the man in the field knows the facts, but he is muzzled.'"

That is a typical story of centralized bureaucracy in action under long-range direction from Washington. There has been much improvement since Clifford Pinchot was authorized of the forests and converted his bureau into a great propaganda agency for his conservation ideas of forests, waterpower and everything else on the public domain, but the propaganda is still strong and the attempt seems to be made to administer the national forests from offices, not at the front.

State Control Needed
Many a time and oft the west has been informed by lordly bureaucrats from Washington that the states have ravaged, wasted and burned the forests; that their custody must be committed to a great federal bureau, animated by lofty ideals, which will rescue them from fire and human depredation and will save them for future generations. Now we learn from one who has been at the front, with the fire-fighters that this bureau lets fire devour trees twenty-five per cent faster than new ones grow. The forest fire patrol maintained by the states and the firemen better still if in control of all the forests, national as well as state and private.

No valid ground remains for federal administration of forests. The policy of preservation, economic cutting and reforestation is well established in the minds of the western states as essential to their own progress. The states would cut down excessive overhead cost and would put the bulk of their forces in the forest to fight fire and to foster new growth. That is the course of practical evolution in conservation.

CANADIAN LINER IS DISABLED WHEN SHE STRIKES ROCK

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 22.—Two hundred and sixty passengers on the Canadian national coastwise liner Prince Rupert, which broke her rudder when she struck an uncharted rock in Seymour Narrows, about 100 miles north of here, were transferred early today to the Union Steamship company steamer Cardena, wireless advices said.

The Prince Rupert was south-bound from Prince Rupert. She was towed to Plummer Bay by the Cardena. The passengers were being brought to Vancouver on the Cardena which is expected to arrive tonight.

Swept out of the narrows by a swift tide, the disabled steamer was held under control by her propellers until the Cardena arrived. A salvage tug was enroute and it was expected repairs would enable the Prince Rupert to proceed to Vancouver without assistance.

The broken rudder was the only damage reported.

WASHINGTON CREWS STILL BATTLING FOREST FIRES

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22.—Forest fires burning in Skamania county, Wash., were reported today to have reached Silver Star mountain, near the Clark county line. The fires had been driven by an east wind which shifted to the west.

Three days of increased humidity added crew fighting the fires in the Columbia National Forest where the flames were in green

timber, but the atmospheric change had little effect in old burned areas.

The Storm King fire, in the Olympics, was still out of control today. The Quinault fire was checked yesterday afternoon. The Bama-Bama fire was controlled after having burned 110 acres. Fifteen men were sent into the Columbia forest to replace fire fighters there.
