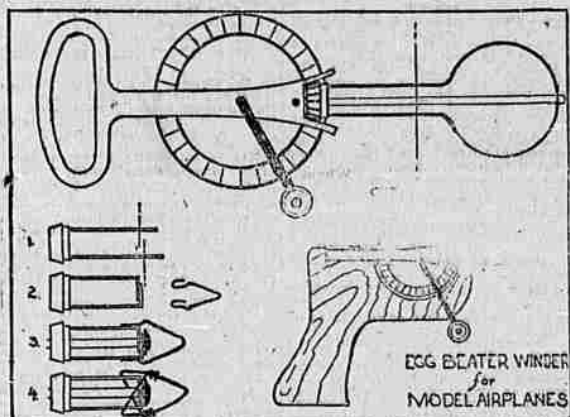

Eggbeater Will 'Crank' Motors of Model Planes



EGG BEATER WINDER for MODEL AIRPLANES

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the eighth and concluding article in the News-Review's series on how to build model airplanes. Information for these articles was obtained from the Playground and Recreation association of America, which is conducting a national miniature tournament for boys.

The motors used for most model aircraft are composed of long strands or rubber bands strung along the frame and attached at one end to the frame itself and at the other end to the propeller shaft. When these rubbers are twisted, when released, causes the propeller to rotate and this gives the airplane through the air.

Model airplanes can be made to fly great distances, but to accomplish this it is necessary to store a large amount of energy in the rubber. This can be done by twisting the propeller in the direction opposite to that which it will turn in flying, but while this method suffices for the smaller models it is very irksome on the larger ones.

An Eggbeater Winder
To overcome this fault model fliers use gear winders. An ordinary hand drill may be used with a hook inserted in its chuck instead of a drill. This will do very nicely for models having a

single propeller but for two propellers which need to be turned in opposite directions a winder made from an eggbeater is very handy.

The drawing shows a typical eggbeater winder. At the top is an eggbeater as it comes from the store. To make the winder the whirling spoons are cut off where indicated by the line. When this is done the small gears with the pieces of flat metal attached can be pulled off. As shown in figure 1 at the left of the drawing, one of these metal strips is cut shorter than the other and where the lines indicate holes are bored through the strips large enough to pass the wire axle. These strips are then bent as shown in figure 2, so that the two holes coincide.

A piece of wire is then formed to the shape shown in figure 2. The above alterations are made in each of the two driving gear assemblies of the eggbeater and they are then placed back upon their shafts.

A washer which has a hole just large enough to pass over the shaft is next placed on the shaft and soldered thereon as shown in figure 3, and the wire fitting is soldered on to the sides of the metal strips. This will complete a very satisfactory winder. In the event, however, that the metal strips are made of aluminum, as is often the case, it will

be found difficult to solder on the wire fitting. Therefore, this fitting can be fastened to the strips by boring small holes in them and twisting the wire into the shape shown in figure 4.

May Alter Pattern

The above directions are general and may be slightly altered where the eggbeater itself is of a different pattern. It should be borne in mind when purchasing the eggbeater that a type must be selected in which the shafts upon which the small gears rotate are solidly fastened in the eggbeater frame. The effort required to make one of these winders is more than repaid by the added pleasure of model flying. Most eggbeaters have a mechanical speed ratio between the large and small gears of 5 to 1, therefore a model may be wound in one-tenth the time with a winder that it requires to wind it by hand.

He left today for Portland to spend a few days attending to matters in connection with the transfer.

ADMINISTRATION POLICIES BLAMED FOR FARM CRISIS

Agricultural Council Head
Lauds McNary-Haugen
Bill and Opposes
Reclamation.

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 25.—Blaming deliberate national policies for the present farming crisis, George N. Peak of Chicago, president of the American council of agriculture, declared today at the Institute of Politics that a rectifying or adjusting measure will have to be adopted possibly within a year.

He eulogized the McNary-Haugen bill and attacked the administration measure as a dole, a distasteful subsidy, allowing farmers to drain the national treasury when in need. The proposal to create a farm board to loan money to co-operating associations he described as an equally repugnant alternative.

The McNary-Haugen measure, he held, would encourage the growth and effectiveness of cooperative organization while the two other proposals would, he said, place a penalty upon co-operatives.

Peak advocated also the removal of government stimulation of competitive farm production through its reclamation and land settlement policies because excessive competition already obtains. He urged development of an extensive waterway system; protection of agriculture from deliberate or international use of instruments of credit against it; expansion of cooperative marketing to lessen the cost of distribution, and the effecting of tax adjustment.

U. S. BUREAU TO CERTIFY ORIGIN OF FIELD SEED

The inauguration of a seed verification service, effective September 1, for verifying the origin and identity of field seeds in commerce, is announced by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, of the United States Department of Agriculture. Buyers of alfalfa, red clover and other seeds, the origin of which is of primary importance will soon be able to purchase seeds with a verified origin seed certificate, issued under authority of the Department of Agriculture.

The proposed service is the outgrowth of recommendations made at seed marketing conferences held in June and November, 1926, in Chicago, to devise and suggest means by which verification of origin may be accomplished. The tentative plan for a seed verification service, developed at those conferences, was later approved by the international crop improvement association and wholesale grass seed dealers' association (now farm seed association of North America), with the recommendation that the details be worked out by the department.

In June of this year, at the time of the regular meetings of the farm seed association of North America and the American Seed Trade association, the details of the proposed service were presented for discussion. A number of seedmen made informal request that this service be established this year and that they be permitted to issue verified-origin seed certificates under the proposed plan. Other seedmen stated that they were considering the matter favorably and, if possible for them to conform to the requirements of this service, would file application soon after the announcement of the organization of the service.

In this service only the verification of origin and identity of seeds is contemplated. There has been considerable discussion in recent years concerning the value of origin of growth of certain seeds, particularly alfalfa and red clover seed. Congress has enacted legislation to furnish protection from undesirable foreign strains of red clover and alfalfa seed by coloring such seed upon entry into the United States. This protects the American farmer from objectionable foreign seed but it is also very desirable to protect him against seed produced in this country that is not adapted for his use. This protection may be accomplished by a seed verification service.

Under this service the origin of a given lot of seed sold by an authorized vendor of inspected seed may, by an examination of records by a federal seed inspector, be traced back to the place the seed was produced. Such records would cover all lots of seed from the time they are received from the grower until they leave the seedmen's warehouses. In addition to the records themselves, files of samples of all lots offered for sale would afford another check on the identity of these lots.

Under the proposed plan, seedmen who comply with the regulations and provisions of the department governing the service, may issue United States verified-origin seed certificates on seeds which have been previously verified as to origin by an authorized inspector.

Seedmen who wish to use the service this season, that is, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, should file their application with the bureau not later than September 1, 1927. As soon as possible after that date, the supervising seed inspector will visit those who

have made application for the service to investigate the methods of keeping records, storing, stocks of seeds, preserving samples, etc., in order to determine whether the applicant can readily comply with the regulations and provisions governing the service. He will suggest such modifications as may be necessary to preserve properly the identity and origin of seeds.

The outstanding feature of the service is the United States verified-origin seed certificate which will be used on tags or labels by seedmen authorized by the department to issue it. Those who are
