REDFERN HOLDS TO THE COURSE HE HAD FIXED

waters of the Caribbean Sea toward the island of Trinidad. The daring birdman had not been heard from since his plane winged its way southeasterly over the Atlantic.

Far out of the path of ships plowing through southern waters during the early stages of the flight before he reaches Porto Rico, Redfern was not expected to be sighted until he had swung over the Caribbean Sea, the cradle of hurricanes. As soon as he enters this log of his trip, passing steamers may give first reports of the plane's progress. Radio advices have been broadcast throughout that region requesting any information.

Darkness Penetrated
If the big ship is aloft today, Redfern has passed a big portion of the 24 hours in darkness, naval navigators and hydrographers at Washington pointed out that Redfern, in addition to bucking head winds over practically his whole course, would be flying without a moon.

The naval men said that if Redfern reaches his objective it would be nothing short of a miracle. They estimated he would miss his objective at Rio de Janeiro by about 450 miles, as they did not believe his gasoline supply would last more than 57 hours, while with favorable conditions it would take 62 hours to reach his goal. They believe when he reaches the northeastern coast of Brazil he will turn east to Pernambuco.

Ship Lights to Aid
The fact that Redfern will be in contact with land during most of his flight, naval men point out in his favor, as he will be aided in keeping his course at night by navigation lights for the network of islands over which he is flying. He will be assisted also by ship lights as his course carries him over the United States-South American ship lines in which there are numerous shipping board vessels.

Not discounting the hazards he faced, Redfern left prepared for any emergency, but at the same time expressed confidence that he would reach Brazil.

Handicaps Heavy
Redfern's 4,600 mile hop is one of the most exhaustive tests of both man and plane. Alone he must chart his course and pilot his ship for more than 50 hours, bucking unfavorable winds, crossing the torrid zone, then over almost impenetrable jungles of the Amazon valley and over the towering coastal mountains of Brazil to reach his objective.

His plane carried 525 gallons of gasoline and 40 gallons of oil in addition to safety equipment for both land and sea.

Sometime during the afternoon of early evening, Redfern was expected to fly some fifty miles east of Trinidad and then head along the fringe of the South American coast to a point about 50 miles and proceed toward the Amazon river. He declared he would drop a flare over the town of Macapa to indicate whether he intended proceeding to Rio.

AMERICANS AND BRITONS HELD BY REDS IN MEXICO

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Seizure of the Amparo company mines near Guadalupe, Mexico, by a "red syndicate," with consequent danger to the lives of 18 Americans barricaded in their homes at the mines, was reported to the state department today by consul Satterwhite at Guadalupe, Mexico.

Satterwhite reported that following the seizure of the mine all foreigners left Piedrabola and Mazata, villages close to the mines, but refugees arriving at Guadalupe reported that 18 American and 11 British subjects were unable to leave Amparo, being besieged in their homes by members of the red syndicate.

DRY CANDIDATES OR INDEPENDENTS, W. C. T. U. EDICT

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 26.—A resolution pledging all its members to united effort toward nomination and election of dry candidates for all political offices from President down, was adopted at today's session of the Women's Christian Temperance Union convention, in session here.

The resolution was adopted on recommendation of Mrs. Ella Boole, national president, who told convention delegates last night that if neither presidential nominee in the next election is "dry" the W. C. T. U. would choose and support a candidate of its own.

FOREST FIRE LOSS IN CALIFORNIA IS NEARLY MILLION

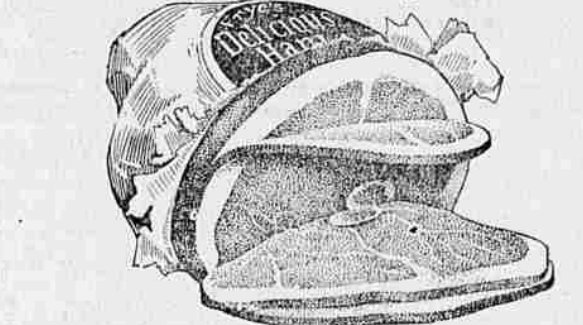

NEWHALL, Calif., Aug. 26.—A blackened area of 40,000 acres smoldered in the wake of the devastating Angeles National Forest brush and timber fire north of here which, as it passed out onto the desert during the night already had done damage to timber stands and resort buildings estimated at \$500,000. Forest rangers at the station here believe that the flames would soon spread themselves in the thinner stands of mesquite and

grease wood on the Mojave. Federal and county forestry officials, alarmed when another fire started yesterday near Elizabeth Lake burned over 80 square miles before being controlled early today, were considering closing all reserve areas to the public. Seventy-five men were left to patrol the fire area while approximately 800 followed the big conflagration onto the desert. Damage estimated at \$150,000 was done to buildings at the Tweedy Lake Club resort. Four elaborate cabins belonging to wealthy people of Los Angeles were destroyed. The flames ate their way thru 2,000 acres of timber owned by the club, defying the efforts of 1200 men to check them. In addition several ranches have been burned over with thousands of acres of privately owned timber.
