When Coos Spurred Roseburg Trail

Early Settlers Adverse to Taxing Themselves to Build Means of Ingress for Undesired Addition to the Population—Contented in Isolation and Wanted Resources for Themselves.

The governor of Oregon and the members of the state highway commission have been making an inspection trip over the coast highway, and everywhere they have gone they have heard and seen evidence of the great interest in road development which is apparent in the Oregon of today. But at a banquet which was tendered to the men North Bend they were told of a time when the people of Oregon viewed new roads with suspicion.

Dr. Robert Parker, delivering an address of welcome to the visiting officials, spoke of the proposal a half century ago to build a trail from Roseburg to the Coos Bay country. The proposal, he said, was anything but universally popular in the coast country. People there feared that it would "scare away the game." They were "fanciful" about the outside world "sally" in products and thus destroy the local markets. They were full of doubts as to the availability of the plan because, they argued, the road when once built would have to be kept up and the cost of upkeep might prove disastrously burdensome. And last, they were afraid that taxes would be increased.

It has been a popular pastime in this state to speculate, at chamber of commerce banquets and elsewhere, as to why Oregon has not gone ahead as rapidly in a commercial and industrial way as its neighbors to the north and south, and many explanations have been offered. About the best explanation we have heard is that offered indirectly by Dr. Parker in his historical discussion of the Coos Bay wagon road.

The Oregon of a half century ago did not want commercial development. The people of that time were wholly satisfied with what they had. They loved their state as it was, and their affection for it was sincere and deep. They feared the consequences of an influx of outsiders. It will be noted that in his recital of reasons for opposing a road from Roseburg to Coos Bay, Dr. Parker put the question of cost, with resulting taxation, last in the list. He was right in so placing it. The people of that day were more concerned with the probability of scaring the game away and cutting in a lot of outsiders than with saddling themselves with more taxation. They liked their country, and they wanted to run no risks of changing it.

There are many who will scoff at this attitude. They will say that it is the attitude of the moss back and hill-billy. They will regard it as something disgraceful in Oregon's past; something that ought to be covered up and kept away from the public gaze as one conceals a skeleton in his closet. BALLOT TITLES FOR INCOME TAX AND \$3 AUTO FEE

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 26.—Attorney General Van Winkle yesterday prepared ballot titles for the state income tax bill and the \$3 and \$5 flat automobile license bill, both initiated by George Bylander of Portland. If the petitions for the measures are signed by the legal number of voters, the measures will be voted on by the people at the general election in November, 1928. The automobile bill provides a license fee of \$3 for motor vehicles weighing less than 3,000 pounds and \$5 for those weighing more than 3,000 pounds.

Bancroft Gherardi, vice president and chief engineer of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, also president of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, will this evening arrive in Portland with Mrs. Gherardi. He will be accompanied from Seattle by C. E. Hickman, general manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company in the Pacific northwest.

On his way to California to attend the coast convention of the electrical engineers at Del Monte in September, Mr. Gherardi will remain in Portland Saturday and Sunday, viewing points of interest including a trip up the Columbia highway arranged by Mr. Hickman. Mr. and Mrs. Gherardi came west from New York through Canada and stopped at Vancouver

and Seattle. In each of those cities the local section of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers entertained its national president. The Portland section will also honor him with a dinner Saturday.

Mr. Gherardi was born in California and has made noteworthy contributions to progress in the art of telephony. He has been closely associated with the development of such recent achievements as the establishment of trans-Atlantic telephone service and the Bell System demonstration of television.

He is a son of the late Rear Admiral Gherardi of the United States navy and is a brother of Capt. Walter R. Gherardi, former aide the Secretary of the Navy, now stationed in the first naval district at Boston.

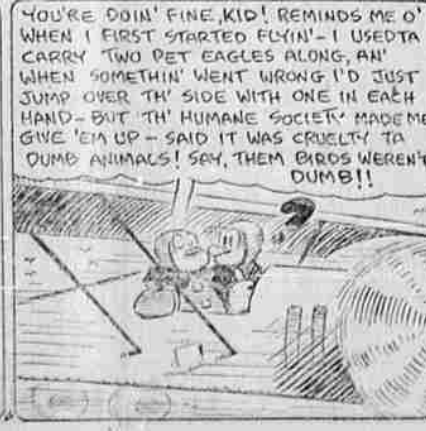
