BRIDGE PROBLEM DISCUSSED BY CITY COUNCIL

Creek bridge would be about \$4,000. New concrete piers would be erected and the approaches made ready so that the bridge could be moved to its new location in three or four days. County Judge Quine stated that if the city desires to adopt this plan that the county will put sufficient braces under the Douglas street bridge east of town to make it safe for a little further upstream. It was contended that the cost of moving the bridge would be taken care of. However, the city would still have to obtain right of way from Fowler or Pitzer street through to Second Avenue and this cost might be prohibitive. It was stated, and this is one of the matters to be considered by the committee.

The council is favorable to the plan of having the bridge, the advantages of such a plan being outstanding. While the bridge is too narrow and too light for highway traffic, yet it is sufficient for many years for all the traffic it would be called upon to carry in the proposed location. New piers, painting and tightening of various members would strengthen it considerably and this would be done if it should be moved, so that its life would be greatly prolonged. It was shown last night that it would be a great benefit to school children, attending the Benson school, providing them with a short cut and keeping them away from the street dangers of the highway. Then too it would carry much of the traffic between North Roseburg and the main part of town, and much of the traffic between Roseburg and Dixonsville, so that it would take some of the congestion away from the highway. Numerous other advantages are also apparent so that there is no question of the need for the bridge, the only matter at issue being the expense.

May Call Alternate Bids
A plan for doing for alternate bids has been proposed. It is suggested that the plans for the moving of the bridge be submitted to contractors and that they be asked to bid in one proposal on the construction of the Deer Creek bridge alone, and in the other on moving the present bridge and building the new one. By setting both bids, it is believed, a contractor would be able to give a much closer figure, and it might be possible that the bid could be brought within the amount of money available.

There were many speakers before the council last night, all strongly in favor of the project, but as there was nothing definite regarding costs, no action was possible. Consequently it was decided to appoint a citizens' committee to work jointly with the street committee to make a thorough investigation and bring in a report at some future session.

PERCENTAGE OF CORRECT LIGHTS ON AUTOMOBILES SHOWS MARKED INCREASE
E. R. Thurber, state traffic officer, returned last night from Eugene where officers of the state motor vehicle department have been conducting a light test. Those tests have been held in several cities during the past month, more than 2,000 cars being tested. Mr. Thurber says that over 50 per cent show correct lighting. The examinations are being carefully made and the officers are requiring strict compliance with the law. At the first of the year the percentage of correcting lighting was around 35 so that the present ratio shows a quite satisfactory rate of increase.

will not become portent of danger until the hour of his planned arrival has passed—early tonight if he flies to Rio de Janeiro, or near noon today if low fuel supply or another cause prompts him to swerve eastward to Pernambuco, on the coast.

One further contingency would land him at Para, northwest of Pernambuco, almost 1500 miles directly north of Rio de Janeiro, the major objective of the daring pilot who catapulted into space from Glynn Isle, near here, at noon Thursday. Para was his intended landing place if adverse winds and weather forced too rapid consumption of fuel. The opinion of Paul J. Varner, chairman of the local committee sponsoring the flight.

Wide Watch Maintained
Radio stations, ships and light houses sprinkled on and near his southeasterly route across the equator are alert to his voyage and plan to flash to the world the first news they have of Redfern or his plane. Amateur wireless operators thrust the southeast, as well as operators of powerful government and commercial stations, are keyed up and listening in for the slightest bit of information concerning the pilot's whereabouts.

Adding to the general belief that Redfern will attain at least his secondary objective, Pernambuco, are reports of government meteorologists that he will encounter favorable weather conditions thru practically all of his trans-equatorial jump, especially over those dubious stretches of lower Atlantic and the Caribbean Sea, whose weather forecasts reaches he has traversed already if his program of flight met no unforeseen mischance.

By his pre-flight computations, Redfern today should be over the northeastern part of Brazil, already across Dutch Guiana and blazing a new aerial highroad over the high mountain ranges.

Amazons Watch Vainly
GURUPA, Brazil, Aug. 27.—No news of Paul Redfern, American aviator, attempting a flight from Brunswick, Georgia, to Brazil, had been received here up to 2:20 o'clock this afternoon. Watchers here were on the alert.

Gurupa is the name of an island on the Amazon river near Macapa, where it was expected that Redfern would drop a flare. The island of Gurupa is near the mouth of the river. The town of Gurupa is a short distance from the island.
