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BATTLE TO SAVE MAN TRAPPED IN FORTY-FOOT WELL

WORCESTER, Mass., Aug. 26.—Rescuers were endeavoring today to reach Fred Lennau, 37, of Auburn, who has been trapped in a forty-foot well since it caved in on him at 6:30 last night.
Lennau was still alive this morning although he had grown appreciably weaker through the night. Held by timber and earth in an upright position he is unable to move, but his head is protected so that he is able to breathe freely.
Ninety men worked thru the night digging a parallel excavation. Firemen have run a hose down thru the tangled timbers and are pumping an air supply to Lennau.

KGW STATION TO FURNISH PROGRAM FOR COAST CHAIN

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—In a one hour presentation featuring two nationally known artists and a corps staff of vocalists and instrumentalists, western radio auditors will be treated to their first Pacific coast network production from the studio of KGW, Portland. The date of the performance has been set for Saturday, September 3, when the KGW presentation is to be broadcast in lieu of the customary Saturday night review.

Of paramount interest in the concert are the roles of Liborica Hauptmann, piano virtuoso, orchestra conductor and musical director of the Oregonian studios who will be co-starred with Nikola Zan, eminent baritone soloist to New York. Both are artists of high caliber far above the average and their achievements have been nationally recognized by the musical fraternity. In addition to directing the entire production, Conductor Hauptmann will play one solo—the celebrated Liszt "Liebestraum."

Featured also in the cortege of artists are Dorothy Lewis, mezzo-soprano, whose name as a staff artist of KGW and a concert vocalist stands supreme in the west. The KGW Mixed Quartet whose personnel includes Bernice Alstock, contralto, Lucille Kirtley, soprano, Hugh Walton, tenor and Stephen Gaylord, baritone, all consistent staff favorites is also featured. The solos and quartet renditions will be with orchestral accompaniment.

In theme the concert has been compiled to run the gamut of music. Starting with the symphonic overture to "Robespierre," a Liszt composition destined to be the dominant feature of the concert, the program includes a diversity of operatic ballad and popular works. These compositions will be interpreted both vocally and instrumentally.

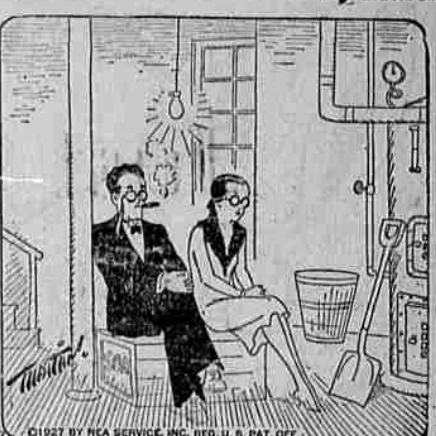
