JAPANESE STORM TAKES 36 LIVES

TOKYO, Aug. 29.—Belated dispatches to the vernacular newspapers today reported a heavy rainstorm Saturday at Kochi, on Shikoku, one of the four islands of Japan, as a consequence of which thirty-six persons lost their lives. Numerous persons are believed to be missing, many were hurt, houses, bridges and roads were washed away and communications interrupted.

Reports from Naganaki show that district was also flooded, seventeen persons also being killed and twenty injured. Houses were washed away and farms in the country districts were inundated.
DODGE
Production of Dodge Brothers new four cylinder line has been increased 25 per cent, according to information received from the factory by M. J. Newland, local Dodge Brothers dealer. Shipments of these cars, which have been widely advertised as "The Fastest Four in America," have been running behind retail sales ever since July 17 when the new line was formally announced. It is stated and dealers have been delivering cars as fast as received.
The present jump in production is the third which Dodge Brothers have made within three weeks. Under the new schedule approximately 1,000 fours are coming off the line each day compared with about 800 previously. "The substantial increase," Mr. Newland states, "indicates clearly the approval with which the new and finer Dodge Brothers four is being received everywhere. It is particularly significant that such sales volume has been reached so soon after the introduction of the new line, as to date only the sedan has been displayed. A new coupe and a new cabriolet roadster were put in production a few days ago and with these body types also on the market a still further increase in production in the near future is indicated."

10 MILLION WOMEN GIVE PLEDGE FOR BONE DRY FIGHT

GERMAN METHODIST CHURCH ASSIGNMENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—Five ministerial changes were announced yesterday at the close of the Pacific conference of the German Methodist Episcopal church.
Rev. A. F. Hilmer was transferred from the church at Salem to succeed Rev. Mr. Wendt at Rosalia and Rev. Edward J. Aschenbrenner, pastor last year at Grand Ronde, was appointed to the church at Salem. Rev. Paul Bolinger of Portland was appointed as ministerial supply at Grand Ronde.
The fifth new appointment was that of R. R. Finkbeiner of Portland who will supply pulpits at Rocklyn and Davenport, Wash. All other ministers were reappointed.

RUSSIA BANS BANANAS

MOSCOW, Aug. 29.—A foreigner who walked into a state-owned fruit store the other day nearly caused a riot when he asked for some bananas. Bananas are taboo in Soviet Russia. They are considered a "bourgeois luxury" and a product unworthy to be imported. Not a banana has been seen in the Soviet Union since the October revolution in 1917.

RATTLER BOUNTY SOUGHT

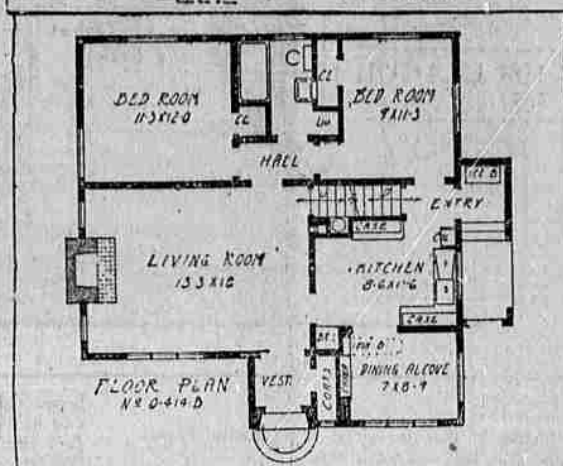
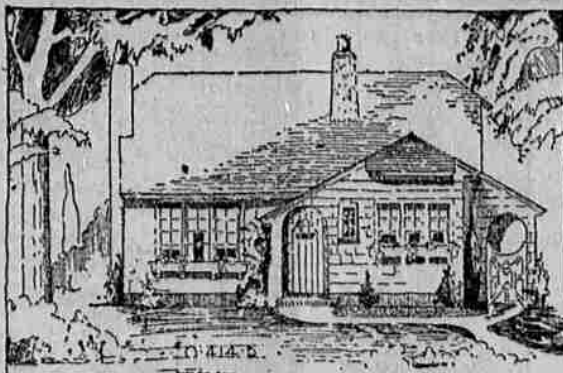

ESKIMOS DIG IVORY TUSKS FROM GROUND

TACOMA, Wash.—Trading ships from the Bering Sea are returning from summer trips with fortunes in ivory tusks which have been bought from the Eskimos of the northern islands.
For centuries before the coming of the white men, Eskimos used only the blubber of the walrus they killed, and threw away the tusks. These accumulated in vast dump grounds of ivory until trading schooners brought men who bought the tusks of freshly killed animals.
Then the natives remembered the stores of ivory left by their ancestors and began to sink mines on the sites of ancient camps and villages. Each tribe so far has salvaged thousands of dollars worth of the precious material, which still is in perfect condition and shows no signs of becoming exhausted.

And the 115-year-old Seneca Indian woman says she'll go right on living so long as she can sell her baskets and buy fuel to keep the old pipe burning.
Nancy comes from a line of long-lived Indians. Her mother claimed to be 150, and she has a sister living who is 100. Nancy herself never was ill a day in her life, but quite often she has to nurse her 67-year-old daughter, Carrie. The old squaw does all the housework, goes to the reservation store for supplies, and weaves baskets in her spare time, if any.
