PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—Influenced by somewhat lighter consumer demand effected by cooler and rainy weather, reasonable fresh fruits moved slowly and in lighter quantities in the early morning trade of the local wholesale produce markets today. Most fruits and vegetables were in plentiful supply and sold at prices unchanged from late last week.

Tomatoes, both local and those shipped from the upper Columbia region were plentiful at from 69 to 65 cents per box.

A few lots of Oregon Crawford peaches were quoted at \$1.25 per box. Lovels are selling around the same price and compose the bulk of the peach offerings.

Wholesale prices were unchanged for butter, eggs, poultry, dressed meats and poultry. Prospects were for reseller prices for real and light hens and slightly stronger for hogs.

ing to destroy storms reported in the lower Caribbean, turned purposely from his course and had descended safely somewhere in the interior of northern South America, perhaps at some point where there is no wire communication.

If Redfern was forced down in the interior and escaped injury, he had sufficient food to last for ten days and safety apparatus by which he predicted before leaving he might almost indefinitely exist in the jungles.
