"The Claw" Features Fierce Battle With African Voodoo Men

One of the fiercest battles ever enacted before the camera was staged in "The Claw," the Universal Jewel which will be shown at the Antlers Theatre for the last time today. Claire Windsor and Norman Kerry are the stars.

Battle scenes and fight scenes are always left until the last in making a moving picture because fights are noted for their wear and tear on clothing and likelihood of injury to the participants. The negroes were equipped with spears, which, although rubber-tipped, inflicted painful bruises when they made a direct hit and Olcott in his enthusiasm for realism insisted that the spears be hurled directly at the attacking whites. For many days the valiant whites nursed black eyes and other bruises that showed the accuracy of the negroes' spear tossing.
