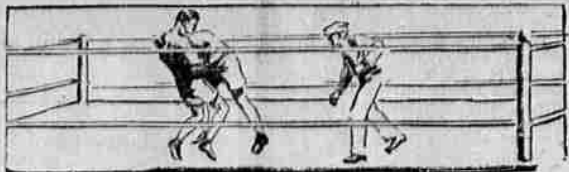


# TRAINING CAMP COMMENT

**Dempsey Striving to Regain Form and Recover Title**



**DEMPSEY LAYS GLOVES ASIDE AND PLAYS GOLF**

**Easy Road Work Is Program of Contender—Will Box With Partners Today.**

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—Jack Dempsey cast aside his boxing gloves for 18 holes of golf today, disappointing a crowd of 4,000 that gathered outside the gates of Lincoln field race track willing to part with \$1.10 each to watch the former world's heavyweight champion take healthy socks at his sparring partners.



Dempsey did no boxing, in accordance with the orders of Leo P. Flynn, his manager, who figured that too much work and no play would be harmful. Dempsey has engaged in strenuous boxing four days in a row.

The former title-holder hoofed seven miles on the road this morning with a better runner than Dempsey ever hoped to be. His continuation on the road was Joe Ray, one-time holder of nearly every middle-distance running record in America.

Dempsey was in a facetious mood on his day off. If seven miles on the road and 18 holes on the links constitute a day off. He took a look at the big crowd outside the gates and said to Flynn: "Leo, guess we better work today. Look at all the dough we are missing."

"No work," said Flynn. That settled it. Flynn announced tonight that there would be boxing tomorrow and Wednesday with Oak Hill, who aided Tunney last year, and Marty Cooper, new men on the receiving end. Cutler has boxed with Dempsey off and on for eight years.

day was brief and ended in disagreement. Both factions announced they would not compromise.

**Union Dictation Irks**  
Jack Miller, manager of the Exhibitors' association, stated the attitude of the theater owners this way:

"The exhibitors are tired of being dictated to by unions and their officials. To hold our self-respect we can give up no more rights as owners. We will remain closed as long as necessary to win our fight, no matter what it costs us."

More complications were predicted inasmuch as agreements between the owners and musicians and stage hands unions expire next Sunday.

Thomas Malloy, business agent for the operators, predicted a nationwide temp of theaters if any effort is made to employ non-union operators.

"If that is done," he said, "the other union men will walk out and we will ask the international union to call a strike directed against the 1600 theaters in the public group of which Halaban and Katz of Chicago is the center."

**Chain Is Affected**  
All the Halaban and Katz theaters here were closed, as well as the Orpheum circuit and other chain theaters with one or two exceptions. The Palace, leading theater of the Orpheum circuit, was affected. The national picture house chain did not close last night because one of its new theaters had made elaborate plans for its formal opening but the group was to be closed tonight.

In advertisements in the morning newspapers, the Exhibitors' association said: "On account of arbitrary demands of the moving picture operators' union, all motion picture and vaudeville theaters have been forced to close. We regret this unpleasant situation exceedingly but we had no other alternative."

Instead of the usual page of movie ads in the morning papers there were only a scattered few today.

**Tunney Reported Be in Perfect Shape For B'ttle**

**TUNNEY TO TAKE OFF SIX POUNDS IN THREE WEEKS**

**Extra Weight Will Permit Him to Go at Top Speed—Will Be Given Great Reception.**

SPECULATOR, N. Y., Aug. 30.—Gene Tunney is fully six pounds over his best fighting weight—and glad of it. A little more than three weeks from today the heavyweight champion must meet the challenge of Jack Dempsey, seeking to snatch back the crown which Tunney won at Philadelphia last fall. Only that extra weight, Tunney believes, will permit him to drive at top speed through the next three weeks of intensive training and insure his entering the ring in Chicago September 22, in the best physical condition of his career.



The burly marine weighed 192 pounds today, six more than when he previously fought Dempsey. The added weight, all on the upper part of the body, apparently has lent power to his punches without taking toll in speed.

Little serious work is in prospect before the champion breaks camp Thursday to entrain for Chicago, where he will complete preparations for the fight at a country club outside the city.

**Reception Planned**  
CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—One of the greatest civic receptions ever accorded any heavyweight champion is being planned for Gene Tunney when he arrives Friday to finish training for the Dempsey battle September 22. Business and political leaders will be on the welcoming committee and the champion will be escorted by a bodyguard of marines to the city hall to receive the key to the city. The American Legion is cooperating.



After a round of golf and a day off from training routine, Dempsey was expected to resume jabbing his sparring partners, with two newcomers, Oak Hill and Marty Cooper, on the receiving end.

Fight tickets were mailed today to those who applied for \$5 to \$100, while the vigilance committee of Tex Rickard and George F. Getz continued sorting the list of applicants for the choicest seats.

## IMPROVEMENT TO BE MADE TO GAS SERVICE UPTOWN

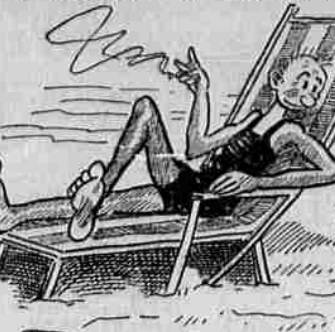

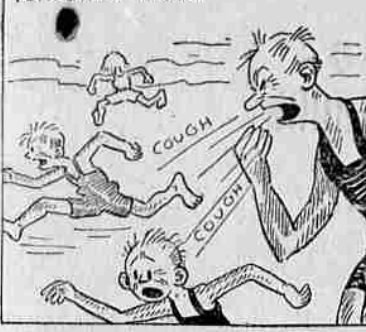

## FRENCH CITY GETS READY TO GREET 'STORMY PETREL'

William Mitchell, Former Colonel in American Flying Corps, to Visit "Home."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—William Mitchell, former colonel and a central figure in the army aviation controversy of two years ago, is on his way to Europe and to his "home" at Nice, France.

He is sure of a hearty welcome when he gets to Nice, for the city that gave him birth, led by a man who held him in his arms as a baby, is planning to turn out to give its long absent son a public reception, with all the French traditions.

Mitchell was born in the old Grimaud Palace at Nice, while his parents were on a temporary sojourn in France. To assure him of American citizenship, his father took his son as soon as possible to the American consulate for registration as a child of American parents. Two witnesses were required, so the father took with him two tradesmen who owned small shops across Grimaud Square.

Years passed. One of the tradesmen died. Mitchell led America's wings to the defense of the country that was his birthplace. The other tradesman became mayor of Nice, but never forgot the small American he held in his arms long ago, swearing to the circumstances of his birth.

Learning that Mitchell would be in Europe during the Paris convention of the American Legion, the mayor promptly wrote saying that his "home town" was eagerly awaiting him and would welcome him as a glorious citizen who has cast credit upon Nice. Mitchell has accepted the invitation.
