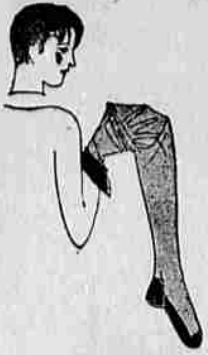

JAMES WILLOS SANE, VERDICT OF 3 DOCTORS (Continued from page 1.)

If Kelley escaped paying the penalty thru the issuance of writ of habeas corpus now pending before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon he (Judge Kelly) would take the matter of securing commutation of Willos' sentence up with the district attorney.

Up to Governor Again

While attorneys are unofficially contending that Willos must hang with the expiration of the reprieve unless further executive clemency is granted, the governor's office has asked the attorney general for an opinion as to whether or not it will be necessary to take Willos back into court and resentence him for execution at a later date.

In the case of Kelley, whose execution was stayed pending the outcome of his petition for a writ of habeas corpus, it is agreed that he cannot be hanged without being resentence by the trial court if his petition is denied.

May Die Saturday
Other than to state that he would hand down no decision today Judge McMahon gave no intima-

tion as to when he might reach a decision on the Kelley petition, and in the face of Judge Kelly's declaration it is the general contention in legal circles here that whether his reprieve is extended by the governor or not Willos will not be executed Saturday. The contention is supported by the argument that even should Judge McMahon hand down a decision denying the habeas corpus writ Friday it would not leave time for Kelley to be brought back into court and be resentence to mount the gallows with Willos.

The pair had been sentenced to hang Friday, August 19.

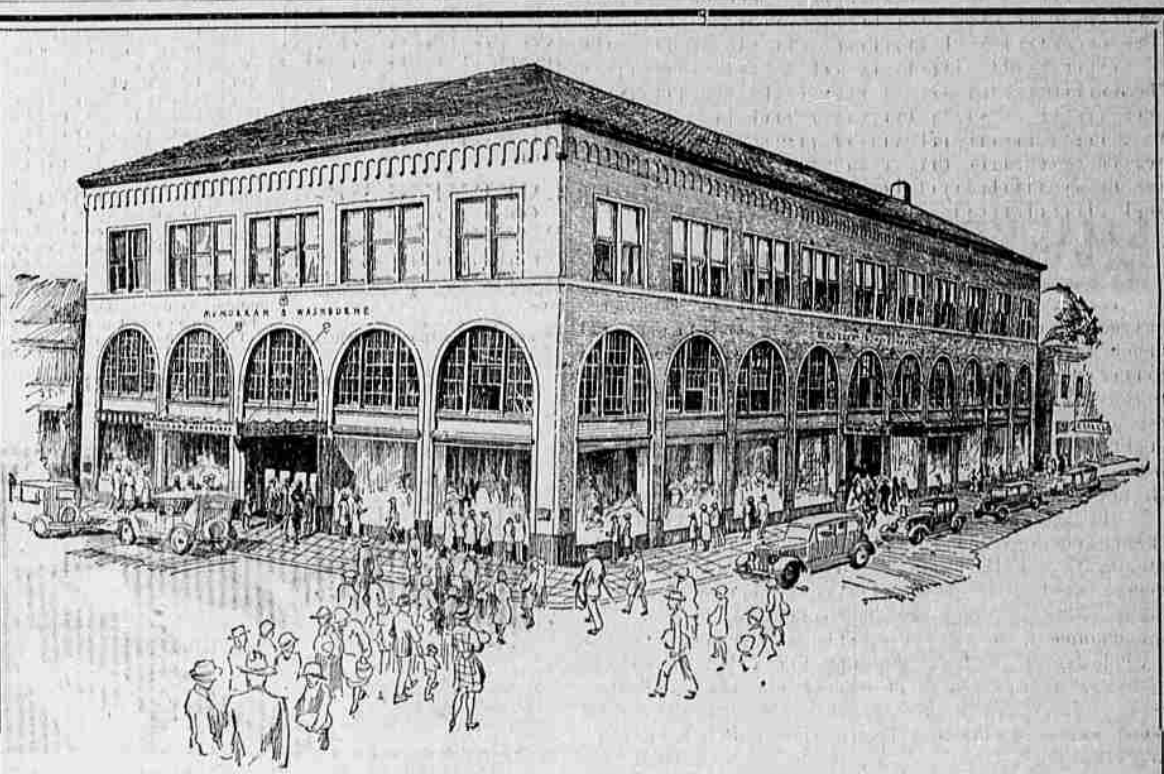
