KANSAS WHEAT RAISERS CROWD CATTLE BARONS

Western Prairie Section Is Bone of Contention Now in the Courts.

PLOW MAKING GAINS

500,000 More Acres Down This Year—Herefords Gradually Pushed Out of State.

TOPEKA, Kan., Sept. 8.—The western Kansas prairie, over which buffalo and cattle have ranged since the time of the pioneer invasion, is the disputed sector in a battle between cattlemen and wheat growers.

As modern machinery and moisture conservation methods have made wheat growing profitable in western Kansas, the most arid part of the state, grain growers have petitioned the governing bodies of wheat counties to abolish the free range. The cattlemen are fighting hard against the wheat invasion, but the plow has taken each year a large area of the land over which cattle graze.

Administration of the herd law has finally come into the courts, which will decide whether this land shall be devoted to the production of beef or wheat. The latest suit filed in the supreme court here involves prairie land in a county on the Colorado border, showing that the cattle men have been pushed to the extreme western part of the state, and that eastern Colorado will soon be the battleground.

Wheat waves like a banner over more and more land that was ruled lately by the Hereford steer.

This year another 500,000 acres of prairie sod have been turned by the plow to be sown to wheat this fall, when the Kansas state board of agriculture estimates farmers will plant the grain over the largest area in the state's history—12,440,000 acres, compared with 11,900,000 acres last year.

SENATOR SMOOT SEES ATTEMPT TO KILL THE TARIFF

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 8.—In a signed editorial appearing in the Salt Lake Telegram yesterday, United States Senator Reid Smoot, Utah, calls attention to the "powerful forces working to break down the American protective tariff."

His article, captioned "Attacks on United States tariff," specifically mentions deliberations of the Geneva economic conference last May and the international chamber of commerce congress at Stockholm June 27 to July 2. "It is perfectly clear that the Geneva international economic conference frowned upon import tariffs, protection and all methods of promoting and protecting industries, that it recommended the removal of import tariffs, and that it meant to apply these recommendations to all nations, including the United States," said Senator Smoot.

"It is also perfectly clear that the international chamber of commerce in session at Stockholm, Sweden, in June and July last, endorsed the position of the Geneva conference in the matter of import tariffs.

"The fundamental principles discussed at Geneva and Stockholm may not have been directly free trade versus protection, but they were essentially the same thing."

WILD GOATS WILL DRAW HUNTERS TO SANTA CATALINA

AYALON, SANTA CATALINA ISLAND, Calif., Sept. 8.—Wild goat hunting will be resumed on Santa Catalina Island this fall for the first time since 1905. On September 10, sportsmen again will pursue the wary and goat which have increased their numbers to between 20,000 and 30,000 under an enforced closed season of more than 20 years.

The Catalina Island goats are descendants of the Spanish goat, first brought here by the explorers of the Don Juan Cabrillo and Sebastian Vizcaino expeditions in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. Historians recount that the Spaniards stocked the channel islands, San Clemente and Santa Catalina, with goats, to provide against starvation should navigators be shipwrecked on their rocky shores.
