### INFORMATION ON OPENING OF SCHOOLS GIVEN

In mind the entrance requirements of that college.

Entrance to the colleges, universities and normal schools of Oregon is contingent upon presentation of 15 units, with at least 10 (except schools of commerce and business administration) units in English, mathematics, foreign languages, laboratory sciences, and history. The remaining five units may be taken in any subject regularly or occasionally offered in the high school course of study of the state, except in citizenship, spelling, physical education or student activities.

#### Registration Days

Students are to register for their year's studies from 9:00 to 12:00 a. m. and 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. on September 12, 13, 14. The seniors are to register on Monday, September 12, the juniors on Tuesday, Sept. 13, and the sophomores on Wednesday, September 14. All students should register at the announced time and have everything ready to begin with the regular classes on the first day of school.

At registration time each pupil must deposit the 75c for locker padlock. Also the towel fee will be paid at this time by those desiring this service and the chemistry fee must be deposited.
