### TRIAL MARRIAGE IS PYGMIE BELIEF

FRESNO, Calif., Sept. 21.—Trial marriage as such has been practiced by the pygmies of New Guinea for untold generations, Dr. Matthew S. Stirling, noted anthropologist of Berkeley, declared in an interview here last night. Stirling recently returned from a two-year expedition into the interior of Dutch New Guinea.  
Living in a veritable stone age culture with stone axes and bows and arrows for weapons and only the crudest wooden dishes, these diminutive blacks are gradually disappearing so that in only five places on the earth may they be found today, Dr. Stirling said. They have no literature, no art and very little music. Each tribe has its own crude language.  
Marriage is by purchase and that only after the prospective groom has shopped around for a wife, living first with one woman, then another. Finally satisfied that his choice is a good worker and child bearer, he buys her from her relatives, paying for her in shells or some other medium of exchange. The marriage ceremony is simple. Taking his stone axe, the groom cuts off a portion of the bride's "ring finger." That's all there is to it.  
The New Guinea pygmies are peace loving folk, Stirling found, but when finally aroused, get out the old stone hatchet, don the rattan armor and go to war. The largest men are about four feet tall.

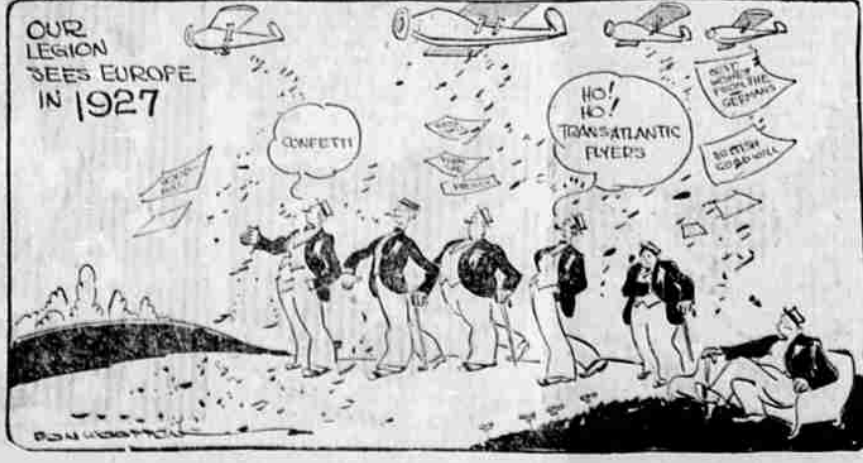
