GAS FUMES OVERPOWER DERBY FLIER

Wausau, Wis., came in fourth and behind him came E. K. Campbell, Moline, Ill.; E. H. Lee, Chicago; James Ray, Philadelphia, and E. W. Cleveland, of Cleveland, Ohio. Prizes for the class A derby are as follows:

First \$10,000; second \$5,000; third \$2,000; fourth \$1,000 and fifth \$500.

One plane in the A race crashed, with fatal results, two men being killed. Three others were forced out; three others were delayed, but reported still ready to forge on.

Of the 25 pilots who started in New York Monday in the class B cross country derby, the unofficial winners were declared to be C. W. Meyers, Detroit; Wesley Miller, Des Moines and J. S. Charles, Richmond, Va., respectively. Eugene Deimer, Tarrytown, N. Y., came in third but on the basis of elapsed time got fourth unofficial place. Five others who arrived here yesterday, in order, were: W. H. Emery, Jr., Bradford, Pa.; E. G. Knapp, Ypsilanti, Mich.; Jack Ashcraft, Towanda, Pa.; K. R. Unger, Madison, N. J., and C. B. McMahon, Miles City, Montana.

Five other contestants in this race were to start from Missoula, Mont., today at 1 a. m. Nine others were forced out, most of them early in the race and the two men, E. W. Fleet, Hartford, Conn., and Nimzo Black, were unreported at a late hour last night, but believed safe.

Prizes awarded for the class B New York-Spokane are: First \$5,000; second \$3,000; third, \$1,000; fourth \$500; fifth \$250.

Five planes entered the San Francisco-Spokane Pacific coast class A derby and the unofficial winners were announced as follows: First N. C. Lippitt, Los Angeles; second, Les Schoenhair, San Francisco; third, Vance Breese, San Francisco; Jack Frye, Los Angeles, came in next and last to arrive was Norman Goddard, San Diego.

Prizes for the class A Pacific air derby are: First \$1,500; second \$1,000; third \$500.

C. L. Langdon, Aberdeen, Wash., was conceded first place in the Pacific coast derby class B race yesterday. Next came D. G. Warren, San Francisco and Lee Willey, Los Angeles. The other three planes entered in this race had not finished early today.

Non-Stop Flight On.
GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 22.—Telegrams received here today by the Bonanza Air Line, forwarded from points where they were dropped, by "Duke" Schiller and "Eddie" Hohn, in their non-stop cross-country flight indicated that all is well with the fliers.

One message forwarded from Stratford, Ontario, read: "Still going. All's O. K. Just eating. Weather clear now, but had some rain. (Signed) Duke and Eddie."

A second note from Bay City, Mich., read: "Still going. All O. K. Weather good. 1:50 P. M."

The messages were dropped from the plane in envelopes of which both fliers had a good supply. Long silk streamers mark their descent from the plane and on the face of the envelope is a request to the finder to relay the message.

M. E. CONFERENCE HEARS DR. WILSON

SALLEM, Ore., Sept. 22.—Paraphrasing the program for Friday at the 17th annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church is the election of our ministerial and four delegates of laity to the general conference of the church in Kansas City, Mo., next May.

Recognition of at least four and possibly six new conference members will pave the way for the fourth delegate in each section of the joint session.

Ministers and members of the conference declared to be candidates for election are Dr. A. L. Howarth, superintendent of the Portland district; Dr. Clarence True Wilson, general secretary of the board of temperance; Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette university; Dr. William Wallace Youngson, Portland, and Dr. D. H. Leach, superintendent of the Salem district.

Of the candidates in the laity division, it is thought that Dr. H. L. Steeves, member of the world service commission and active in the First Methodist church of Salem, is the outstanding candidate. Ernest Peterson, a member of Centenary Wilbur church, Portland, is conceded a strong chance from the Portland district.

Jimmy Coffroth, promoter: "I am not picking anyone. I'm friendly with both and not betting at all."

"Balt" Montana: "I feel that Dempsey will win."

Packey McFarland: "I believe Dempsey will win with the wallop."

Among the Tunney adherents were Henry Leonard, Johnny Kilbane, Battling Nelson, Jess McMahon, George White, Irving Berlin, Arnold Rothstein and Ike Dorgan.
