GAMBLERS, LIQUOR VENDORS TAKEN IN REEDSPORT RAID

Investigation by Special Officer Leads to Arrest of Two Bootleggers and Four Gamblers.

The last official act of S. W. Starnes, who resigned his position as sheriff of Douglas county to take the office of Commandant at the Oregon Soldiers Home, culminated most successfully in the form of a raid on gambling and liquor activities at Reedsport. Under Sheriff Starnes' direction, evidence has been gathered for several weeks on liquor and gambling operations at Reedsport and before his retirement Mr. Starnes arranged for the details of the raid, which resulted in the arrest of two men on liquor charges and four for gambling.

Thomas F. Shelley, a former member of the Portland police department, and who assisted the local officers in a recent gambling raid in this city, has been operating as a special deputy under Sheriff Starnes for several weeks at Reedsport, gathering evidence in that locality. He cooperated with W. C. Grubbe, the deputy sheriff at Reedsport and these officers obtained the information upon which the raid yesterday was based.

Bill Durant was arrested for possession and sale of liquor, and following his arrest the officers found 35 gallons of liquor at his home, in addition to a keg, siphon, and other apparatus used in bottling liquor.

Michael McCarthy was arrested on a like charge and 15 pints were found when the officers made their search. Each of these men entered pleas of guilty before Justice of the Peace Benson and were fined \$350 each and given 30 days apiece in the county jail.

Jim Jennings, proprietor of a pool hall in which a gambling game was being played, was fined \$500 and three players, Andy Strom, Bill Durant and H. B. Sorenson, were given fines of \$250 each. Officers Shelley and Grubbe were assisted by deputy sheriffs Daugherty and Crox, and by the night officer at Reedsport in conducting the raid.

FIGHTERS PAY OFF THEIR CREWS

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The services of Jack Dempsey, who managed Jack Dempsey in his fight with Jack Sharkey and Gene Tunney, were worth \$75,000 to the former champion over a 90 day period. Dempsey has given Flynn a check for that amount under a blank contract in which the Managerial Fee was allowed to accumulate at the expiration of the agreement.

Flynn said at the outset he was willing to accept what Dempsey considered he was worth.

Next to Flynn the biggest check paid by Dempsey was that to Jerry Landis, known as "Jerry the Greek." While the exact amount was not revealed it is understood to be \$25,000.

Lou Flik, the champion's trainer, was scheduled to receive a bonus of \$20,000. Bill McCabe and Eddie Egan, two of Tunney's camp friends, were also to share in the fighter's Chicago earnings of \$1,000,000.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The Big Four of the Yankee twirling staff for the world's series battle probably will consist of Walter Hoyt, Herb Pennock, Urban Shocker and Wiley Moore, the "sinker ball" expert.

This is the expectation of Miller Huggins, pilot.

"That's the way it looks," Huggins explained, "but neither you nor I can say what the play will develop. The first game might upset my whole program. I haven't decided on a starting pitcher."

Experts, speculating on probabilities, regarded Pennock, the veteran southpaw, or Hoyt, as the likely opening game choice.

The selection of Wiley Moore to shoulder a regular share in the mound burden shores Dutch Ruether and Bob Shawkey, two veterans of world's series combat in the background. Unless there are unexpected developments they are likely to remain in the reserve

corps, along with George Pignas and Myles Thomas.

Moore is one of Huggins' 1927 developments. The South Carolina recruit, excelling most of the season in relief roles, has been taking a regular turn in the box and displaying excellent form.

He has been working oftener than a regular would require, in fact, and thriving on the extra work. He is likely to be Pittsburgh's starting choice and, if the series battle is prolonged, figure in three games.

OPPOSITION TO DRY LAW VOICED

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The New York World today quotes J. M. Gibbons, general attorney for the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, as saying that railroad executives have in many instances reversed their attitude on prohibition and now are opposed to it because of its actual effects on railroad employees.

Increase of railroad accidents by approximately forty per cent since the advent of the eighteenth amendment contributed to this change, Mr. Gibbons is quoted as saying in an address before fifty lawyers at a luncheon in the bankers club.

John S. Wise, Jr., another speaker, told of drinking with federal judges who were sentencing liquor law violators, and said that the annual graft from prohibition was four times the cost of the national government.

He estimated \$75,000,000 was paid in graft daily.

HEALTH BULLETIN

Infantile Paralysis in Oregon (Oregon State Board of Health)

Seventy-two cases of epidemic infantile paralysis have been reported to the Oregon State Board of Health. There is no desire to cause unnecessary alarm, but the fact remains that there is an unusually large number of cases of infantile paralysis in this state. Reports from other states indicate an increase in the number of cases of infantile paralysis reported as well as in Oregon. Every available precaution against its spread should be taken. Children should not be permitted to come in contact with sick persons whether they be adults or children who are ill. The essential point in treatment during the acute stage of infantile paralysis is to keep the patient quiet and avoid handling as much as possible. Spinal punctures may be used to relieve pressure. Occasionally splinting may be necessary to prevent deformity. Serum from convalescent cases has been of value. There appears to be much difference of opinion as to the value of stock serum now on

STOP FIGHT PICTURES

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—W. C. Cullen and Sol Pincus, local theatre officials were arrested and a warrant was issued here today by Assistant United States Attorney Eugene Bennett for the arrest of Tex Rickard, promoter, as the first federal step to prevent showing of the Tunney-Dempsey Chicago fight pictures in violation of the interstate commerce act.

The showing of the fight film was stopped in the second round by United States marshals. The theatre had a good "house" witnessing the picture.

Bennett indicated that warrants would likely be issued for Tunney and Dempsey and their managers. He said that the arrests would be a signal for similar arrests throughout the country.
