Horticultural Society and Rotary Club to Co-operate in Arrangements.

CHAIRMEN NAMED

Valuable Premiums to Be Offered in Each Division and for Boys' and Girls' Clubs.

The Douglas County Horticultural Society are making arrangements to hold a horticultural and corn fair in Roseburg during the latter part of October. This group of men are being assisted by the Roseburg Rotary Club, who are lending their services in many ways to make the fair a success.

The bringing together of the agricultural and horticultural products produced in any one community or county is one of the widest recognized means of creating a renewed interest in those activities among the farmers and horticulturists. Events of this nature also tend to bring together the producers themselves, who take advantage of such opportunities to discuss their problems and profit by the experience of others.

Mr. C. E. Moyer, president of the Douglas County Horticultural Society, is general chairman of the fair, and will be assisted by several division chairmen as follows: R. A. Busenbark, Prune Division; F. G. Evans, Pear Division; R. H. C. Wood, Apple Division; L. A. Ueland, Grape Division; Mrs. Foster Butler, Floral Division; Wm. Voorhees, Nut Division; R. A. Hercher, Vegetable Division; G. W. Burt, Egg Division; J. C. Leedy, County Agent, Corn Division.

Mr. D. N. Busenbark is the General Superintendent of the fair, and will be assisted by A. Roland Parker, County Club Agent, who also will have full charge of the Boys' and Girls' County Club Fair, which will be held in connection with the horticultural fair.

This horticultural and corn fair will be held at the Armory in Roseburg on October 26, 27 and 28, and all those wishing to enter exhibits should have them in by 8 p. m. Tuesday, October 25.

AUTOS TAKE TOLL OF FIFTEEN LIVES DURING AUGUST

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1.—Fifteen deaths and 348 injuries were the toll of reckless driving in Oregon during the month of August, according to a report by T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic inspector. The whole number of accidents reported was 2506, and 1264 of them were attributed to carelessness. Traffic officers made a total of 255 arrests during the month, and 38 of the cases are now pending in court. Stolen vehicles with resale value of \$6,745 were recovered and the officers collected delinquent fines in the sum of \$5,192.85. Fines imposed for violations of motor vehicle laws totaled \$9,826.45.

FEDERAL AGENT EXONERATED BY CORONER'S JURY

Wound Received While Resisting Arrest—Terry Talent Not Held Responsible.

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 1.—A coroner's jury last night returned a verdict "completely exonerating" Terry Talent, 21 year old federal prohibition enforcement officer, of the death of Mansford Zimmerlee, 46 years old, during a moonshine fight Wednesday. The verdict was as follows:

"We, the coroner's jury, appointed to investigate the cause of the death of Mansford Zimmerlee, find that he came to his death September 30, 1927, from an accidental gunshot wound received on September 27, 1927, while resisting arrest by one Terry Talent, a federal officer, while in the discharge of his duty in an attempt to make the arrest of the said Mansford Zimmerlee. The jury believes there was no intent to kill on the part of said Terry Talent and completely exonerates him."

Hearing of the testimony lasted until midnight. The verbal statement of Zimmerlee was told by the attending physicians and nurses. It was established that Talent fired the fatal shot, and that Zimmerlee was engaged in moonshine operations.

W. R. Zimmerlee, a nephew, at the conclusion of his testimony, demanded the appointment of a special prosecutor. Petitions asking for the appointment of a special prosecutor and special grand jury were circulated throughout the county yesterday. The petitions set forth that District Attorney Newton Chaney "has shown bias by statements after Zimmerlee was wounded, in which he attempted to exonerate the prohibition officers without an investigation."

SMITH INDICTED FOR MANSLAUGHTER; RESULT OF AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—William Smith was indicted for involuntary manslaughter by the Multnomah county September grand jury today in its closing report. The indictment grows out of an automobile accident August 3 in which Mrs. Anna Sulasky was killed on the Baseline Road.

TEACHERS DEFY BOARD'S ORDER TO WEAR LONG SMOCK

DETROIT, Oct. 1.—Ordered by the school board to appear in class rooms Monday morning wearing smocks "reaching to within 10 inches of the floor" 108 women teachers of the Hazel Park public schools last night met in conference and decided unanimously to refuse to obey the board's edict. The teachers were understood to have the backing of the suburb's parent-teacher organization.

Mrs. Lottie Thibos and Sam Durbin, board members and authors of the "smock measure," maintained that their ruling was designed to protect the moral integrity of the youth of Hazel Park.

PERRY BEAGLE, INDIAN WAR VET, DIES AGED 95

Spent Eighty-Four Years of His Life in Oregon Country.

BORN IN KENTUCKY

Crossed Plains When 11 Years of Age—Served Two Years in Rogue River Indian War.

O. H. P. Beagle, an Indian war veteran and a resident of the Oregon country for 84 years, died at an early hour today following a brief illness of but five days. Mr. Beagle attended the funeral of Commandant G. W. Riddle last Saturday, going to Riddle with other veterans to witness the burial service, and was taken ill the following day with pneumonia.

Perry Beagle, as he was familiarly called by his friends, was born in Campbell county, Kentucky, on July 6, 1832, his parents being Wm. and Nancy Thompson-Beagle. In an early hour today following a brief illness of but five days, Mr. Beagle attended the funeral of Commandant G. W. Riddle last Saturday, going to Riddle with other veterans to witness the burial service, and was taken ill the following day with pneumonia.

There young Beagle grew to manhood, and on April 27, 1852, was married to Miss Mary Matvey Crisp, a daughter of Major Crisp, a veteran of the war of 1812. For a few years Mr. and Mrs. Perry Beagle made their home in Yamhill county, Oregon, and during that time three children were born to the union, all of them dying in childhood. Mrs. Beagle, who became blind some ten years before her death, passed to the Great Beyond in 1895, at Moscow, Idaho.

In the earlier years of their married life Mr. and Mrs. Beagle were devout members of the Christian church. Mr. Beagle's Christian experience had its beginning in 1845, at which time, when only 13 years of age, he became a member of the First Baptist church in the Oregon country, which was organized in Washington county during that year. The membership of this church included Mr. Beagle's parents, and practically all of the sturdy and God fearing pioneers who crossed the plains in the first wagon train of 1843, and who settled in the Tualatin valley. The pastor of this church was Rev. Vincent Snelling.

GILL INFECTION KILLS SALMON IN KLAMATH RIVER

YREKA, Calif., Oct. 1.—This year's run of the Klamath River salmon are threatened with extermination, George A. Coleman, state biologist and fish and game commissioner W. Lippencott of Yreka has reported, after having inspected several dead salmon found in the river.

Lippencott reported that the great number of dead and dying fish found from Orleans Bar to the state fish trap above Hornbrook showed gill infection which caused strangulation. Outside of the gill trouble the fish were of good color and flesh.

Drastic measures are planned to save the fish. The majority of Shasta county residents depend on the salmon catch for their living.

MAN WHO KILLED "FRIEND" OF WIFE FREED BY JURY

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Oct. 1.—A 68 year old truck driver who had sworn in an agreement with his wife to permit her to go buggy riding with a 38 year old bachelor, was free today after having stood trial for the killing of the bachelor.

Despite the judge's charge that "what is sometimes called the unwritten law" has no place in a court of justice, a jury of nine men and three women yesterday acquitted Charles Price, confessed slayer of Ed Masterson.

In return for his sanction of rides, Mrs. Price, who was on the verge of leaving her aged husband, had agreed to remain and keep house for the man she had married when she was but 14 years old.

Price admitted that he shot Masterson while the bachelor and Mrs. Price were buggy riding.

RAILROADS BUY LAND FOR KLAMATH FALLS TERMINAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—The Southern Pacific company announced yesterday purchase of approximately seven and one half acres in Klamath Falls, Oregon, by the Southern Pacific and the Great Northern railway for terminal purposes. The railroad property so that each will have 220 foot frontage on the south side of Sixth street. The property was acquired from the Big Lakes Lumber company, The W. D. Miller company, the Lorenz company and the Ewanna Box company.

MRS. STEWART DEAD AT AGE OF 69 YEARS; FUNERAL SUNDAY

Mother of Dr. E. B. Stewart Succumbs After Long Period of Ill Health.

Mrs. Flora Lucetta (Byan) Stewart, mother of Dr. E. B. Stewart, died this morning at her home on Watson street after a long illness. Mrs. Stewart's condition became very serious a few days ago and she failed rapidly until the time of her death.

She was born December 14, 1858, at Hopkinton, Iowa, where she spent her girlhood days, attending the public schools there and graduating from the Hopkinton Academy, the leading school of that part of the country, which was then on the frontier. She was married August 25, 1878, to Dr. James Stewart at Nora Springs, Iowa, moving to Mason City, where Mr. Stewart engaged in the mercantile business. There they resided until Mr. Stewart's retirement, when they came to Oregon, reaching Roseburg in 1910. Mr. Stewart, prior to his death, was county judge of Douglas county.

They were the parents of two sons, one dying in infancy, Dr. E. B. Stewart of this city alone surviving. She also leaves a sister, Mrs. W. W. Blood, of Chicago.

Mrs. Stewart was a lifelong member of the Episcopal church, and was affiliated with the Eastern Star, Betsabab and Yeoman orders. She was a woman whose wonderful character and personal attributes endeared her to all who knew her and a great host of friends are grieved by her death.

Funeral services are to be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking parlors. Rev. E. P. Hunnells, of the local Episcopal church, will officiate. Interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

PIRATES NEED ONE VICTORY TO CLINCH TITLE

Defeat Yesterday Delayed Clinching of League Pennant.

ST. LOUIS CAN TIE

Two Victories for Cards and Two Defeats for Pittsburgh Would Result in Deadlock.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 1.—Pittsburgh clinched the National league pennant today by defeating Cincinnati 9 to 6.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 1.—With a single victory needed to clinch the pennant beyond a mathematical doubt, Manager Donie Bush of the Pittsburgh Pirates sent his big right handed pitching ace, Ray Kremer, into action against the Reds today. Pete Donohue was the opposing hurler.

Defeat for the Pirates would postpone decision of the pennant issue until tomorrow, the last regular day of the season. The second place Cardinals have a chance to tie by winning both of their games with the Cubs tomorrow. If the Pirates lose their last two starts, The Pirates scored five runs in the first inning. With one out, Barnhart doubled and P. Waner singled. P. Waner was safe at second when Dreesen intercepted the throw to the bag, tossing too late to catch the runner. Wright singled to right, scoring Barnhart and P. Waner.

Traynor put Wright on second with a single and Grantham tripled to the right field wall scoring both. Donohue was taken out of the box, Kolp replacing him. Harris popped out and Grantham scored on Smith's single.

Walker's triple and an infield out gave the Reds a run in their half of the first.

Kremer Yanked
The Reds knocked Kremer out of the box with a five hit barrage in the fourth which brought in three runs. With one out, Critz singled, took second on a passed ball and romped home on Harry Graves base drive. Kolp bunted for a hit and went to second when Grantham missed a throw from Harris, Hargrave stopping at third. Hargrave scored on Dreesen's grounder but Kolp was out at third. Walker singled, Dreesen pulling up at second. A single by Hipp drove in Dreesen. That was the end of Kremer and Carmen Hill took up the pitching burden, retiring the next man up for the third out. Kolp had injured his leg sliding to second in the Cincinnati rally and Jackie May went to the slab when the Pirates went to bat in the fifth. The fifth inning was scoreless.

Blocked in the first game with the Reds from slipping into the National league championship harbor, the Pirates were still waiting today to breeze over the finish line.

After tossing the Cubs for four straight setbacks, the Corsairs engaged in the first of a three-game series at Cincinnati yesterday and lost 2 to 1.

Pittsburgh has two games to play and needs but one victory to take the banner even though the second place Cardinals capture two remaining contests. St. Louis loathed yesterday. Two reversals for the bushmen and two triumphs for the Cards would throw the campaign into a tie.

Brooklyn pushed the Giants out of the running by whacking out a 10 to 5 victory behind the pitching of Dazzy Vance who stopped the New Yorkers with six hits.

The loss put the Giants a full game behind the second place Cardinals.

TWO KILLED WHEN IRATE HUSBAND OPENS ATTACK

RAVENNA, Ky., Oct. 1.—When his wife and Calloway Morris alighted from a train here early today, Calvin Conley killed the man, and wounded his wife, according to sheriff Brookshire. As Morris lay dying he raised himself on one elbow and fired six times at Conley, but only wounded him, and killed a railroad detective who had grabbed Conley.

Morris slipped back to the ground and died. The detective, Henry Brown, of Irvine, died in a hospital.

Conley, who suffered a flesh wound, was taken to jail. Mrs. Conley, shot through the hip, was taken to a hospital.

RAIN ADDS TO SUFFERING IN ST. LOUIS; WATER POURING INTO HOMES ADDS DAMAGE

Revised Death Lists Show Total Known Fatalities to Be 83—More Than One Thousand Injured in City and Immediate Vicinity—Over Five Thousand Buildings Wrecked.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.—Nearly 2,000 relief workers, enlisted under the Red Cross, today started a systematic program for aiding the 2,305 families in 195 blocks shown by a survey to have been affected by Thursday's tornado which killed 83 persons and injured more than 1,000 in St. Louis and vicinity.

Revisions of the death list showed several duplications. Jesse Roberts, one of those reported killed, was found to be alive.

The Red Cross survey revealed approximately 1,000 persons were in need of immediate shelter, which was provided.

More than 300 injured were still in hospitals today and more than 800 others have received medical treatment.

A heavy rain early today increased the discomfort of many families, who, because of the mild weather, had chosen to remain in their shattered homes temporarily. The water poured into unroofed houses and did further damage to unprotected furniture and bedding.

Property Loss Heavy
ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 1.—Hospital lists of tornado victims, checked today indicated the number of injured was almost double yesterday's highest figure and reached 1,162. The dead numbered 83, drawing its increase from the injured list, and possibly from the debris which still provide hunting ground for searchers.

House to house canvasses gave 5500 as the approximate number of buildings destroyed or damaged. More than a million dollars worth of automobiles were destroyed.

Survey of the entire storm area showed that the bulk of serious storm damage was done to residences, apartment buildings, small stores, small factories and churches. H. M. Bixby, president of the St. Louis Chamber of Commerce, expressed the opinion that the total loss would be close to \$100,000,000.

Other estimates were between \$25,000,000 and that figure.

Calling upon all members of his organization to respond to the Red Cross appeal, President Bixby said St. Louis would meet the emergency without outside help. He wired President W. R. Dawes of the Chicago association of commerce, thanking Chicago for the offer of help, but adding that "from present indications we feel confident we will be able to take care of the situation."

Ten gangs of wreckers under the building commissioner started to work this morning tearing down and clearing away dangerous parts of damaged buildings. Overhanging walls were the principal menace. Six hundred more men and sixty additional trucks were added to the army of men sent by the department of streets and sewers to restore streets for traffic. Authorities warned sight-seers away.

All last night members of the sixth infantry, U. S. Army detachment, a contingent of the Missouri National Guard and the American Legion, supplementing the St. Louis police force, patrolled the storm zone, in darkness. The storm had splintered poles, snapped standards and shattered \$30,000 worth of street lights. They were prepared to shoot at marauders but evidently none was seen.

Relief was in charge of the Red Cross. The St. Louis Globe Democrat and the Post Dispatch headed the relief fund with contributions of \$5,000 each.

Rehabilitation, already started, has its bright side. Work for skilled and unskilled labor is promised in abundance. Between 40,000 and 50,000 men have been idle here this summer. Bricklayers, carpenters, roofers and plumbers in great numbers were at work today.

SHARKEY WILL FIGHT HEENY

Keeps Gun From Mother, Is Slain

Sixteen-year-old Stephanie Clieff's mother said she would kill herself if Stephanie went to a dance and stayed out late. So the girl took a loaded revolver that was in the house and gave it to her chum, Frank Schlieben, for safe keeping. That night on the way home from the dance, according to police, Schlieben shot and killed Stephanie when they became involved in an argument.
