U. OF O. MEETS PACIFIC

Oregon Aggies Playing California Aggies at Corvallis Today—Oregon Fights Jinx.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—The second week of Pacific coast football was ushered in today with all nine grid teams of the coast conference meeting opponents on their home stamping grounds.

Heading the list in the point of interest is the contest scheduled at Palo Alto between the Stanford Cardinals and St. Mary's. The Saints have an entirely veteran line while the Reds, champions last season, present almost as imposing a lineup this year. A fairly even battle is expected.

The Bears of California are expected to have an easy time entertaining the Wolf pack of Nevada, while Washington is also expected to have a workout playing Williamette.

University of Southern California meets Santa Clara. Montana tackles Mount St. Charles, and the Oregon Aggies and Idaho take on the California Aggies, and Montana State respectively. Washington State clashes with college of Idaho and Oregon meets Pacific University to round out the day's schedule.

Oregon in Readiness.  
EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1.—Final preparation of the University of Oregon football team for the second game of the season on Hayward field today against Pacific University, was completed last night by Captain John J. McKean, head Webfoot coach.

In an effort to make sure that the Oregonians would put up a much better game than a week ago, and also to stage a comeback over the jinx the Pacific eleven has over the Webfoots, Coach McKean sent his charges through a light but snappy drill and sent them around the field on the dead run before sending them in to the dressing room. The Webfoots were not out through a stiff scrimmage and played only to warm up and go through the plays to be used today.

Oregon is far from a mechanical eleven that walks through its plays with precision, but it is fast taking shape. The Redger tilt today will give McKean a chance to really size up his men and place them according to ability and placement under fire. As yet he has not chosen a first team, but after today some semblance of a regular eleven will be forthcoming. As the Webfoots meet the University of Idaho team here next week, the mentor will have to work fast.

The game today will start at 2:30 o'clock, according to announcement of Jack W. Bonifol, graduate manager.

PACIFIC COAST  
DELEGATES WILL  
SUPPORT SMITH

Utah Is Only Doubtful State in Coast and Rocky Mountain District Is Claim.

TACOMA, Oct. 1.—Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, will go into the next Democratic convention with the delegations of the entire Pacific coast and Rocky Mountain states ready to support him for the presidential nomination, according to a special dispatch to the Ledger from Logansport, quoting George P. Christensen, Democratic national committee man, who is attending the convention of the Washington State good roads association.

Christensen named Utah as the only doubtful state following an investigation of party sentiment covering several weeks.

The states that Christensen promises will send Smith delegations to the National convention are:

Washington, Oregon, California, Montana, Nevada, Idaho, Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico, Wyoming and the territory of Alaska.

SEARCH GRAVEYARD  
FOR PISTOL USED  
KILL LILLIENDAHL

HAMMONTON, N. J., Oct. 1.—Search in a graveyard to determine where a pistol was buried today occupied the attention of authorities investigating the mysterious slaying of Dr. A. William Lillendahl.

The burial plot in Oak Grove cemetery owned by William Beach, fugitive accused of abetting in the slaying, yielding no trace of a pistol when partly dug up yesterday and the diggers were ordered to continue their work. A few days before he disappeared, Beach, a poultry dealer and friend of Mrs. Lillendahl, said he had a conference with a tombstone maker in the graveyard September 15, the day the doctor was shot while motoring with his wife.

Albert Langheim, Egg Harbor youth, who claimed to have seen two negroes kill Dr. Lillendahl and whose story corroborated that told by Mrs. Lillendahl, has been released.

Detectives decided his story was an invention. Mrs. Lillendahl is under \$25,000 bail as a material witness.

INDIAN WAR VET,  
DIES AGED 95

both of whom died many years ago. He is survived by two brothers, both of whom reside at Kerby, Josephine county, this state, and who are expected here tonight.

The pioneer mother of this family lived to a ripe old age and died in 1927, her husband having preceded her to the grave some years before. For a number of years following the death of his wife, Perry Beagle, in partnership with his two brothers, were engaged in mining and stock raising in the Salmon River country, Idaho.

Mr. Beagle was among that courageous group of men who took up arms during 1855 and 1856 to settle the Indian trouble and make Oregon safe for those who should come after them. He was a member of Company A, Second Oregon Mounted Volunteers, and saw active service for 42 months, during which time he took part in several of the big battles that finally drove the Indians to ask for peace.

Twelve years ago, although still quite active, Mr. Beagle was admitted to the Oregon Soldiers Home in this city, where he has since resided. About that time he became acquainted with the Adventist faith and has been a member of the local church since.

Information of his death was sent to the two brothers at Kerby this morning, and as soon as they arrive arrangements for the funeral will be completed. The body is now at the Roseburg Undertaking Co. parlors, and probably the funeral service will occur Monday. Elder T. M. Theisler of Medford, has been summoned by wire, and will conduct the services, the exact hour of which will be announced later.

THE STATE FAIR  
OVER SUNDAY

Precedent to Be Broken by Adding Day to Program.

POOR ATTENDANCE

Exhibitors Agree to Leave Display Intact Until Monday—Only Races Eliminated.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1.—With a deficit of only \$5,184.25 including Friday receipts, the sixty-sixth Oregon state fair still has prospects of financially breaking even with the receipts of last year, a record one, though the hopes of the fair board, raised high with the exceptionally large Friday crowd, were dampened when they woke this morning to find a heavy overcast and clouds during the early part of the day. Receipts last year were \$42,192 against \$37,007.75 so far this year.

For the 32nd consecutive time, for the 23rd consecutive time, the Albert Tozier, in charge of the Champoug Memorial Park, was elected mayor of Tent City at the annual campers meeting Friday night. Other officers elected were George Hoeye, Oregon City, president; Judge J. T. Hunt, Salem, vice-president; Alice Redmond, Hillsboro, secretary; directors: E. T. Weatherford, Portland, chairman; David L. Looney, Jefferson; W. M. Kinnon, Butteville; Fred Vergen, Aurora; W. V. Fuller, Dallas, and Ed Shearer, Estacada.

Final races were held on Lone Oak track Saturday afternoon with a grand prize slated for the concluding number. Saturday was officially designated children's day while tonight will be carnival night.

Showing of all the prize winning animals of the livestock division will be a feature of the night horse show.

The fair will be open all Sunday.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1.—Oregon's sixty-sixth annual state fair, already proclaimed by thousands of veteran fair fans as the greatest exhibition of the state's agricultural, horticultural and livestock products, will establish another precedent in holding over for a seventh day, Sunday.

Comparatively poor attendance due to bad weather during the early part of the week, and prospects of fair weather over the week-end led the fair board to extend the event this year to include Sunday at a special meeting yesterday. All of the exhibitors have agreed to leave their displays intact for the extra day, and the only elimination from the regular daily programs will be the horse races. As a feature of the Sunday program a special horse show, to which no admission will be charged, is being arranged for the stadium in the afternoon. Practically all of the winners in the six regular night horse shows will be shown on this program.

The action of the board in extending the fair to cover Sunday is also inspired by a desire to experiment with the advisability of following this practice every year, according to Mrs. Ella S. Wilson, secretary.

"The development of automobile transportation has brought the fair within easy reach of thousands who could never attend before," said Mrs. Wilson. "But many of them cannot get away from their business on week days. We feel that we have a great educational institution in the fair that should be made accessible to all who care to see it, and the attendance tomorrow should indicate quite clearly whether or not it will pay to keep the gates open the extra day."

Horse Show Pleases  
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1.—Before an audience that was equally vociferous in expressing its favor and disfavor, the nine events of the fifth night horse show of state fair week formed an ever changing two hour picture in the big arena last night.

To Robin Hood, prize horse owner by Mrs. W. F. Turner of Portland and a consistent blue ribbon winner both in California shows and at the show here this week, went both first prizes and biggest purse in the \$500 stake for five gaited saddle horses offered by Governor Isaac Lee Patterson. Both Governor and Mrs. Patterson were prominent figures in the center box last night. The second choice of Judge Matt Cohen in this event was Kitty Beloved, owned and shown by G. L. A. Lauer of estate.

The horses and their riders, as well as the audience, found the most thrills of the evening in the Corinthian Loughspring, Aaron M. Frank, owner, considered by fanciers the leading hunter in the northwest, failed to place in last night's event. First, second and third places in the Corinthian were won by three horses entered by Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Hold of Portland, Flying Fox and Kentucky Bob placing in order.

Three horses owned by Aaron M. Frank, Aloma, Buckley Vedio, and Paloma, were the only contestants for the \$250 stake for heavy harness horses. For the first time this year Buckley Vedio was forced to be content with second place.
