Glass & Pottery

There is nothing which adds so much to the brightness and cheerfulness to a home as appropriate glass or pottery. The blues, ambers, lavenders and reds of both foreign and domestic glass and pottery, found in our shops, are a joy to behold and possess.

Venetian glass has long been used to give distinctive character to a room which needed its delicate coloring in lemon, yellow and ultramarine blues. There are few things more enjoyable to have correctly placed than a wisteria compote or perhaps a pair of candlesticks in citron and mauve with an intricate design in fruits and flowers.

Domestic Glassware Artistic.

American artisans are now making decorative glass of great beauty. Perhaps we have not developed quite to the skill of the Europeans in the manufacture of elaborate pieces, but our factories in

their products are showing simple and graceful lines, and in many pieces brilliant color. Our American glass is much more reasonable in price, and on that account may be enjoyed by a greater number of people.

One make of domestic glass has the quality of resisting heat. An entire tea set in ray turquoise creates an unusual picture for a five o'clock tea. The tea set belonging to this set may be set directly upon the heat. Your guests can watch the water boil.

Welcome Bits of Color.

Other domestic factories are producing interesting candlesticks, accent vases in pairs, flower bowls in wisteria, Chinese blue, sea green and amber, sparkles from which would brighten any gloomy nook, or corner.

Potters may be skillfully combined with glass for some occasions. Then there is better which

in the form of a plate or a bowl, has the quality of reflecting lights and colors from other objects about it. A Wedgwood vase of soft cream in chaste and classical lines, or a flower basket of Italian faience would make a handsome centerpiece under a mirror, on a table, or perhaps on the mantelpiece. An Italian pottery pitcher of an Altes blue provides a delightful setting for a pair of golden rods, autumn leaves, or golden glow.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK SHOWS BIG GROWTH IN COUNTY

Missionaries Accomplishing Excellent Results in Various Districts of Southern Oregon.

The American Sunday School Union Missionary, Kenneth A. Tobias, of Eugene, and Roy D. Randall, of Medford, will both be working in Douglas county this next week in interest of the rural Sunday schools of the county that are under the auspices of this organization. Mr. Tobias, who has just returned from the Medford field, reports that the Sunday school work for the past year has been very fruitful. A summary of the work in Douglas county is given by him as follows:

Two new Sunday schools were organized, one at Azalea and the other at Leona. Two schools were reorganized at Tiller and Galeville. Nine Sunday schools were maintained by the missionaries during the year, these others being located at Curtin, Green, Glenary, Rice Creek, Pine Grove, The schools have a total enrollment of 166 with 29 teachers in charge. During the summer months Daily Vacation Bible Schools were conducted at Green, Glenary, Rice Creek, Pine Grove, Galeville and Leona. The enrollment from these schools reached a total of 145. Assistance was given also to the Bible school conducted at Edenbow by Mrs. W. L. Scott, in which over forty children were reached with the Bible instruction. On four different occasions group gatherings were held in which two or more of the schools united for the day in services for inspiration, instruction and fellowship. These were held in various parts of the county and reached a great number of workers. The first one was on February 27 at the Green school house, the second on July 10th at Leona; the third in August at Cow Creek sta-

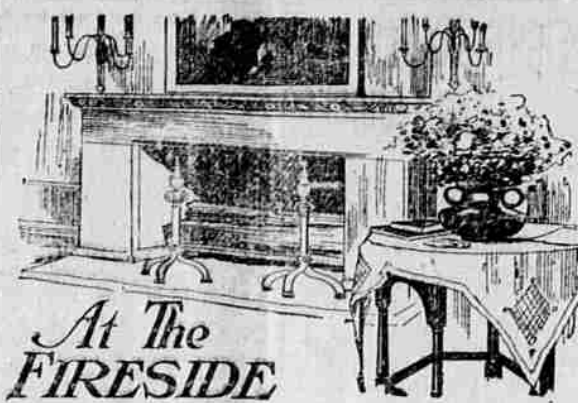
tion and the fourth on August 28 at Pine Grove.

The life of a missionary is quite varied and his duties many as is shown by the summary of the work of Mr. Randall and Mr. Tobias for the twelve months ending September first. Each of the missionaries traveled over thirteen thousand miles in ministering to the rural schools on their field. They each made over seven hundred visits in homes and during the year Mr. Randall made 124 visits to Sunday schools and Mr. Tobias reports 155 such visits. An average of more than four persons each week were reached by each of these men. These messages were delivered to gatherings in homes, store buildings, dance halls, school houses, grange halls, and out doors in groves and by riversides, wherever a few could be collected together. As a result of these services and calls made in the homes, Mr. Randall reports 182 hopeful conversions, while Mr. Tobias reports 160. These conversions were all encouraged to unite with the church of their own choice. The American Sunday School Union being interdenominational and undenominational in its work, is only preparing the way for denominational work to follow. Ten preaching points were opened by these missionaries to preachers of five different denominations.

Mr. Tobias reports this has been the most fruitful year in the history of either of these missionary areas and that he has found that the need is constantly increasing for both Sunday schools and Daily Vacation Bible schools in the rural districts of western and southern Oregon.

In the beginning was the fire and then home was built around the hearth stone. The fire and its place was the center from which radiated all activity and comfort. Today modern equipment with all its efficiency has removed the necessity of having a fireplace in the home as it has also made unnecessary candle light, but modern improvements can never supplant the charm, cheerfulness and homeliness of a rosy fire of glowing embers upon a cool autumn night. There is much conversation and good fellowship when the candles are lit and set above the mantle and a crackling log sizzles and sputters in flames.

Andirons Lend Charm.

So andirons and fireplace fixtures are becoming more and more regarded as important to the well being and livability of a home as a davenport, an easy chair and a good reading lamp.

The andirons should carry out something of the general design of the house. If the place is a temporary abode, one need not be put to much expense since small cast iron andirons in black would serve. One good thing about the black finish is that they can be easily kept brightened up at times with a coat of paint.

Wrought iron andirons are more permanent in character and strength. They are not so likely to break by falling on the hearth nor will they burn out in the shanks. Wrought iron usually goes well with a red brick fireplace and oak woodwork. One would use wrought iron or cast iron in a home where the general appearance expressed the note of rusticity. Summer homes and cottages would naturally use the iron in preference to brass or bronze.

Hand wrought items can be had in the black finish or in the natural grey color of the metal. This grey color is particularly attractive since it makes the fireplace look a little brighter when not in use, instead of showing a sooty cavity which is often unsightly. If new wood is laid upon the shanks and

the soot rubbed off from the fire clay and a wire screen set in front of the fireplace, it can appear just as attractive as when in use.

If one's furnishings and woodwork are in the more delicate colorings such as French ivory or gray, or perhaps mahogany, brass andirons would be appropriate unless wrought iron of elaborate French or Italian design with a bit of polychrome is used. There are several kinds of brass which are offered. There is the plain polished brass which needs considerable elbow grease to keep in condition. Then there is the lemon or satin lacquered which needs no polishing except an occasional wiping off with an oil rag. The lacquered brass pieces should keep their finish two or three years before needing refinishing again. One of the best finishes for brass is what is known as "burnt brass" or oxidized brass, appearing like dull bronze. This finish requires little care and even if the lacquer wears off the natural tendency of the metal is to imitate the general color of the andiron. The oxidized brass with cleaning such as one would give his furniture should last over a long period. Andirons of this color give that wholly desirable appearance of having been in the home for years.

Attractive and Comfortable.

A beautiful fireplace can be built by using a mantle in gray of Adam design. A good roomy opening would measure about thirty inches high by forty wide. Andirons in oxidized brass or a combination of wrought iron and dull brass in Adam lines are suggested and they should stand about two thirds of the height of the opening. Then kindle a good fire. Have handy the trusty poker and tongs to play with, add a screen of ample height to protect the rug, and what more could one ask with which to spend a quiet evening with his books and comfy chair?

The night is frosty, the moon casts waving shadows across the windows, the fire crackles and flickers. Can't you smell the cheerful roasting of marshmallows over the embers?

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DOUGLAS ABSTRACT CO. SECURES BLUE PRINT BUSINESS

The Douglas Abstract company, Saturday completed negotiations for the purchase of the entire set of township tracings of the Portland Land District owned by the Coving Blue Print company. The abstract company now owns the only set of township tracings covering the Portland and Roseburg land districts embracing some 735 township and covering some eighteen counties in western Oregon. The abstract company has for a number of years owned a set of the tracings of the Coving Blue Print but found upon the moving of the Portland District to Roseburg that its map service was not complete and hence the purchase of the tracings of the Coving Blue Print company. In addition to owning the only set of tracings of the Portland and Roseburg land districts it now has a tracing of every town and platted addition in the county and is equipped to do commercial blue printing on the same basis as the Portland companies operating the only electric blue print machine in southern Oregon.

Paris Divorces Illegal in U. S. Law Dean Says

American Courts Not Required to Recognize Validity of Decree Obtained From Courts Abroad.

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 3.—Men and women who obtain Paris divorces may be heading for trouble, in the opinion of A. A. Morrow, dean of the Drake University law school.

There is no provision in either federal or state constitutions, he asserts, that requires an American court to recognize as valid a decree obtained abroad.

The test will come, he believes, when an American man, divorced abroad, remarries, then dies. Both his "divorced" wife and wife No. 2 could legally claim his property, according to Dean Morrow.

If he did not have a bona fide residence in Paris prior to obtaining the divorce—that is, if Paris was not his permanent home—his first wife would be entitled to her statutory third share of his estate and his second wife nothing except what he had willed her, Morrow believes.

FARM REMINDERS

Sweet cream rather than sour is now generally used for Oregon butter-making, reports the dairy specialists of the experiment station, whereas a few years ago nearly all butter was churned from sour cream. This change calls for delivery of sweet cream by the dairies, an easy task if the right directions are followed. "Once you get the habit of delivering sweet cream you will find it as easy as the old sour cream habit," says the report.

Successful educational work in bookkeeping consists of more than talks and demonstrations, says H. A. Scullion of the state college. It includes reading bulletins, journals and books. The greatest benefits come not directly to the student but to his less intelligent neighbor whose ignorance and carelessness make him an unsafe fellow beeman in marketing the disease control.

To breed ewes to lamb before they are two years old is poor practice, declares the O. A. C. extension specialist in animal husbandry. Only the healthiest active ewes are successful breeders. Liable unthrifty ewes seldom produce good lambs.

House fern scale insects are controlled by frequent application of a common laundry soap, says the Oregon experiment station entomologist. One quart of soap is used to one gallon of water. It is best to wash the solution from the plants about two hours after application.

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
