however, as it was freed from the interference of thousands of sight-seers on foot and in automobiles who thronged the district Sunday.

Flood More Menacing.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 3.—The flood menace in southeastern Kansas continued to grow today as record volumes of water poured down many streams.

With train service crippled and highways blocked, water continued to spread out over lowlands, causing heavy damage to crops, livestock and forcing residents to leave homes in boats.

The Verdugo river, fed by the raging Fall and Elk rivers, was 18 inches above the record established last June and was threatening a flood at Independence and Coffeyville.

Farmers near Independence were forced to leave their homes in boats. The Elk river was flooding hundreds of acres of lands and at Elk City was 15 inches above its previous high record.

If takes more than 100 pounds of lime to supply the needs of a cow giving 10 thousand pounds of milk a year and raising a calf, and the best way to provide it in western Oregon is by feeding legumes, say the livestock specialists of the state college. Twelve pounds go into the milk, 35 into the body of the animal and the remainder is undigested in the food.

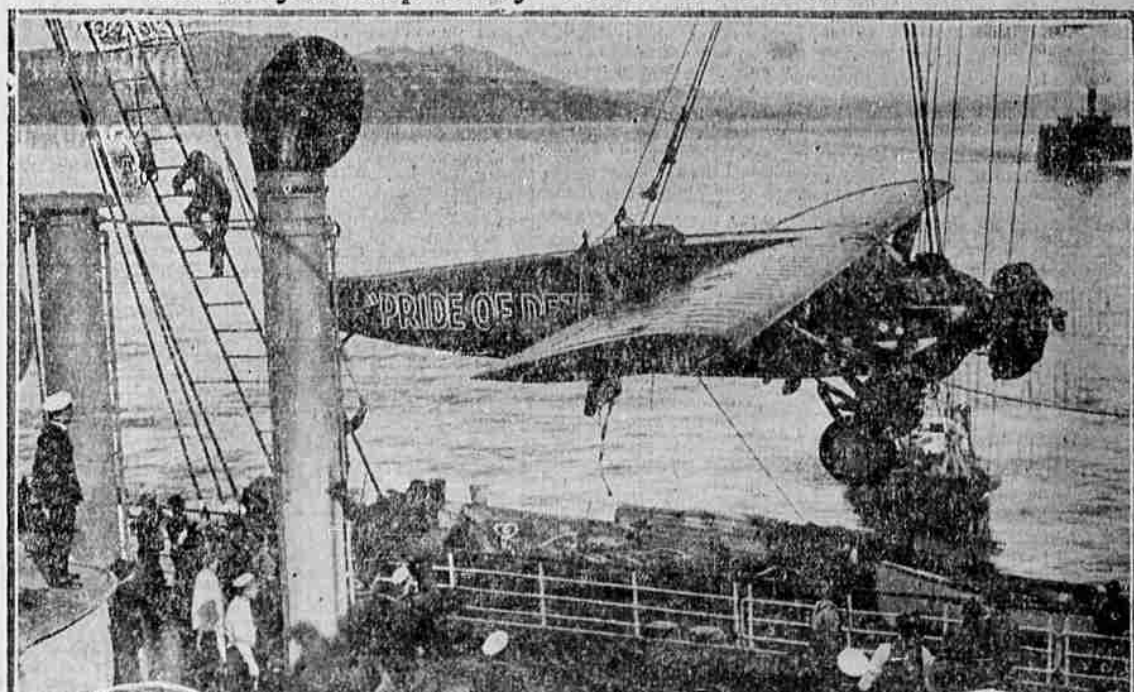
