## German Plane Hops Off For Lisbon, Portugal, With Famous Actress One of Crew

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Oct. 5.—The Junkers plane D-1230 flying from Germany to the United States by way of the Azores left at 5 o'clock this morning for Lisbon, Portugal. The plane arrived here from Norderney, Germany, last night with Lilly Dillenz, Viennese actress, as a passenger.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The Land's End wireless station received a report at 11:30 o'clock this morning that the Junkers plane D-1230 had been sighted off the west coast of France in a position about opposite to La Rochelle.

(This point is about 150 miles from Brest in a direct line across the Bay of Biscay to Portugal.)

## CHILDREN FROM SOUTHERN PART OF STATE BARRED

Quarantine Station Established at Canyonville to Prevent Infantile Paralysis.

A quarantine station at Canyonville, in an effort to prevent the entrance of children from districts affected by infantile paralysis, has been established by Dr. T. W. Laraway, county health officer. Dr. Laraway reports that he has discovered an attempt on the part of several families in the Klamath Falls and Medford districts to send their children to Roseburg to attend school, putting them in the homes of relatives. He now has several families in quarantine where such attempts have been discovered and these children will be kept in isolation until the danger of their spreading the disease has passed. The officer appointed to maintain the quarantine has orders to stop every car containing children under 16 years of age coming from the south. In the event the occupants of the car fail to answer the questions of the officer the occupants will be refused admission to the county. The officer will learn from what section

of the state the children come and where they are going. If they come from an affected district and are going to some destination in Douglas county, admission will be refused them. In the event they are going through the county they will be required to go directly out of the county without stopping except for necessary supplies.

The health officer is leaving nothing undone, Dr. Laraway reports, to prevent the spread of the disease in this county. So far, the case at Canyonville is the only one known to exist.
