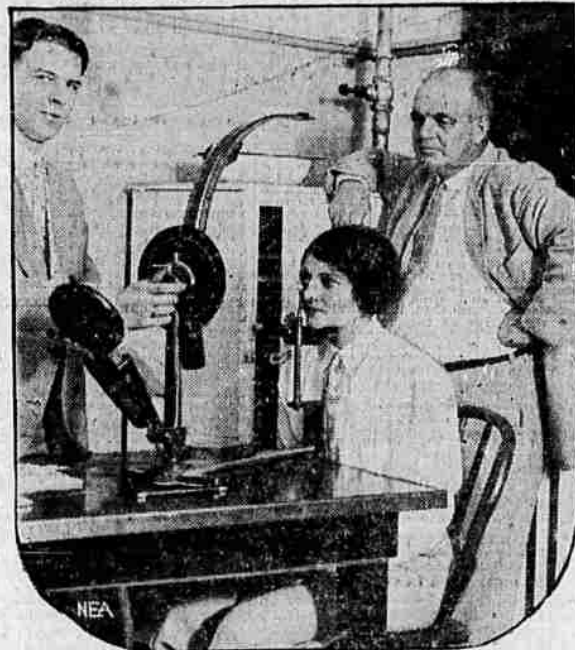

## PIPGRAS PITCHES FINE GAME; SCORE 6-2

les, Manager Miller Huggins today crossed the experts by naming George Pipgras to pitch for the Yankees in the second game. The New York manager, who is always willing to take a chance when he can afford it, in nominating Pipgras, threw the burden on the broad shoulders of a young pitcher who had performed nobly for the American league champions this season but was yet to receive the stern initiation ceremonies of a world series.

Pittsburgh, a game behind as a result of playing yesterday's game for fun, was prepared to put up a desperate battle today to get even and Manager Donie Bush called on Vic Aldridge to throw curve balls at the Yankee sluggers, who did no slugging in the first game.

Aldridge, a veteran, carries a heavy responsibility for it was conceded by the most partisan supporters of the bold Buccaneers that they must win today to continue in active competition. Few fans believe the Pirates can spot the Yankees two games and win four thereafter with a time limit of seven games set.

As the series opened each manager in a most sportsmanlike manner expressed a hope that the better team would win. In the first game it was a case of the worst worst team losing. The Pirates, exhibiting a defense badly run down at the heel, beat themselves. The Yankees, in winning, needed the help of the Pirates. The contest resembled the first game of the season more than the opening game of a world series with baseball's best on parade.

When Huggins came to the Yankees in 1918 after managing the Cardinals, he inherited a sixth place club, but with the help of the owners he built it up steadily to win three successive pennants. In 1923 his club finally was able to shake off the jinx of the Giants and win the world championship

When the Huggins clan won the pennant again last season after a lapse of two years, the National League nemesis again appeared, and the Cardinals downed his team in a hard fought series. If the brainy little commander-in-chief of the Yankees has his way this year his club will not be turned back again with the championship goal in sight.

In his highly successful years with the Yankees, Huggins has gained the implicit confidence of his men. His record has spoken for itself. Another convincing evidence of the effectiveness of his methods was given this year when the Yankees broke the league record for games won.

Although never a great star, Huggins was one of the cleverest players in the business in his own active days on the diamond. He made his professional debut in 1901 and entered the majors in 1904 with Cincinnati, his home city. He was with the Reds six years as regular second baseman and with the Cardinals for eight, becoming manager in 1914, as successor to Roger Bresnahan. The New York club was an ineffectual outfit when he took charge and few envied him his task. The sudden rise of the club to a place almost of dominance in the league raised Huggins his present reputation as one of the smartest managers in baseball.

MARSHFIELD FOLK LOST THIRTY HOURS NEAR OAKLAND

OAKLAND, Ore., Oct. 6.—After 30 hours of struggling with the wet, dense undergrowth of the forest in the South Umpqua section, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Himes and Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Curran, deer hunters from Marshfield, at length made their way back to their camp on Wagner creek, 25 miles west of here, Monday morning. They were exposed all night to the elements without even a fire, as the rain had dampened their matches.

They started early Sunday morning, intending to return after hunting the neighborhood drags, but soon lost their way, wandering, without food, until midnight, when they were forced to halt. Monday morning they were able to sight some ranch buildings from a mountain top and found their way back to their camp just as a searching party, sent from here, reached it.

The hunting party suffered severely from exposure and hunger, and their clothing was badly torn by the dense undergrowth. A searching party was immediately organized when Al Goodman of this place, father of Mrs. Curran, was notified by telephone that the party had not returned to camp Sunday night. The section is heavily timbered and sparsely settled, many persons having been lost in years past.

After several hours' rest in Oakland, Mr. and Mrs. Himes and Mr. and Mrs. Curran left for their homes in Marshfield.

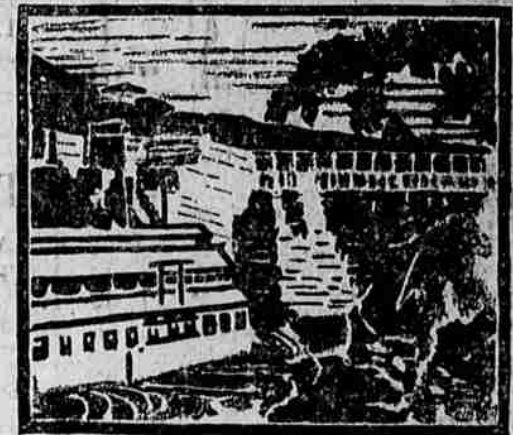
